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

## PROTECTION-BELT AND ATTACHMENT.

At the right end of the rope C, Fig. 1, i is strongly fastened, by splicing or otherwise 45 securing, a snap-hook, D, which is of the usual

shape. At the other end of rope C, at left of drawing, Fig. 1, is attached the snap-hook D'. The rope passes through the adjustable collar E, and then through the eye of the hook D', and back again through the collar, and is 50 enlarged at the end, to prevent withdrawal, by forming a half-crown and splice, C'. The rope C is held and adjusted in length by the thumbscrew f, which passes through the collar E, and operates against the surface of said rope.

F denotes the staples or ring-bolt, or any other strong fastening that will answer the purpose, which are driven into the wall aside of the window-casing, or driven or screwed into the casing itself, as shown in Fig. 2.
