





## PENCIL-CLASP.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 309, 307, dated December 16, 1884.

Application filed April 21, 1884. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY W. MASON, a citizen of the United States, residing at New Bedford, in the county of Bristol and State of 5 Massachusetts, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Pencil-Clasps, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to that class of devices designed to be attached to some convenient | by means of which it is attached to the cloth-10 part of the clothing in order to securely hold a pencil when the same is not being used; and it consists of a piece of elastic sheet metal bent into the form shown in Figure 1 of the accompanying drawings, which figure is a front 15 view of my improved pencil-clasp. Fig. 2 is a view in cross-section of the same on the plane of the dotted line o o. Fig. 3 is a side view of my improved pencil-clasp, showing the pin by means of which it is attached to the cloth-20 lng.

The device is made of one piece or strip of spring sheet metal entire, with the exception of the pin which secures it to the clothing. The side wings, a a, are turned up and rolled

into the form of a partial cylinder whose di- 25 ameter is slightly smaller than that of a leadpencil, and as the device is composed of elastic or spring metal, when a pencil is inserted in said cylindrical or curved side-wing portion of the device it is gently but securely 30 clasped and retained in place.

A pin is secured to the back of the device, ing.

Having thus described my invention, what I 35 claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, 1S---

A pencil-clasp formed of a strip of spring sheet metal, having side wings, a a, integral therewith, and turned up and rolled into par- 40 tial cylinders adapted to receive and clamp pencils, the clasp having a pin secured at its back for attaching it to a garment, as set forth.
