

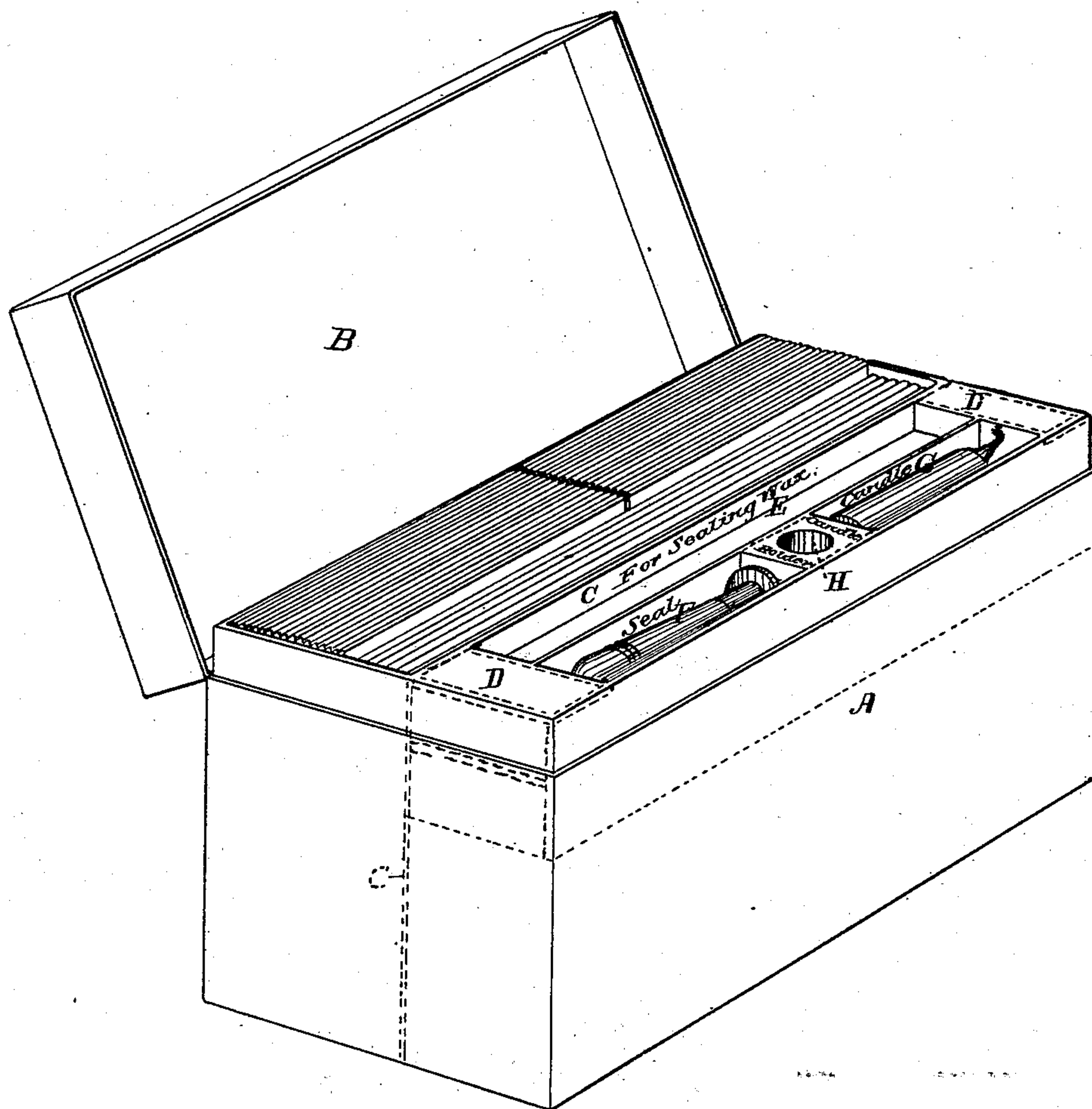

## PACKAGE FOR STATIONERY.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 312,756, dated February 24, 1885.

Application filed November 14, 1884. (Model.)

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, EDWARD S. PECK, (as-  
signor to THE NEW YORK STATIONERY AND  
ENVELOPE COMPANY,) of Brooklyn, Kings  
5 county, New York, have invented a new and  
useful Package for Stationery; and I do declare  
the following to be a full, clear, and correct de-  
scription of my invention, reference being had  
to the accompanying drawing, making part of  
10 this specification, and to the letters of refer-  
ence marked thereon, in which—

The figure is a perspective view of my sta-  
tionery-package, the cover of the same shown  
open.

15 In the drawing like parts of the invention  
are designated by the same letters of reference.

The nature of my invention consists in the  
construction, as hereinafter set forth, of a pack-  
age for the reception of stationery, the object  
20 of the invention being the production of a  
package for the reception of stationery com-  
pact and convenient for use.

To enable those skilled in the arts to make  
and use my invention, I will describe the same.

25 A shows my stationery-package, which con-  
sists of a box of paper, wood, or suitable ma-  
terial provided with the lid or cover B. About  
two-thirds of the package is intended for the

reception of the writing-paper and envelopes,  
the package or box being divided by insert- 30  
ing in it a division-plate, C. The space be-  
tween this division-plate C and the front of  
the package is provided with a shelf, D, sub-  
divided into a receptacle, E, for sealing-wax,  
a receptacle, F, for a seal, a receptacle, G, for 35  
a candle, and a circular support, H, for the  
candle.

It will be seen that by the construction of  
the package as shown the various articles of  
stationery are packed in compact shape, and 40  
when necessary to use them this particular  
form of package will be found of great con-  
venience.

Having now described my invention, I claim  
as new—

A package for stationery, A, provided with 45  
a cover, B, division-plate C, shelf D, recepta-  
cle E, for sealing-wax, receptacle F, for a seal,  
receptacle G, for a candle, and candle-support  
H, constructed as and for the purposes indi- 50  
cated.
