## WASHING-LIQUID.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 316,154, dated April 21, 1885.

Application filed February 16, 1885. (No specimens.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Louis Kuhlmann, of the city of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have invented a new and Improved Washing-Liquid, of which the following specification is a full, clear, and exact description.

This invention relates to a new washing-liquid, and is composed of the following ingredients: one dram oil of spearmint, one-half dram oil of tansy, one-half dram oil of pennyroyal, one dram oil of wintergreen, one dram oil of caraway, one ounce of alcohol, one pint of distilled coal-oil. These ingredients are mixed together and bottled up for use.

In use the wash is first soaked during night and then boiled in a mixture of two pails of

water, and one ounce of the compound added after the water boils. The boiling continues for about twenty minutes.

If desired, the more dirty parts of the wash may be soaped. A little dissolved soap may also be added to the boiling water together with the mixture.

I claim as my invention—

A washing-liquid consisting of oil of spearmint, oil of tansy, oil of pennyroyal, oil of wintergreen, oil of caraway, coal-oil, and alcohol, substantially as and for the purpose specified.
