

## PARASOL OR UMBRELLA.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 334,368, dated January 12, 1886.

Application filed July 13, 1885. Serial No. 171,636. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, DANIEL C. FISCHEL, a citizen of the United States, residing at Troy, in the county of Rensselaer and State of New 5 York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Parasols and Umbrellas, of which the following is a specification, reference being had therein to the accompanying drawings.

10 It is a well-known fact that a great number of parasols or sunshades are annually defaced and injured by being exposed to the effects of rain. Ladies are often caught in showers with no other protection for their bonnets and 15 laces than these fragile articles, which are designed only to exclude the rays of the sun.

The object of my invention is to furnish a light cover for parasols and umbrellas that can be rolled into a package sufficiently small 20 to be carried in the pocket of a lady's dress, and that can readily be applied to the cover of the parasol and as readily released therefrom. These covers are made of oil-silk, rubber fabric, or other suitable material, and are 25 preferably impervious to water. They are also light and flexible, and of any color or tint desired. The cover is adapted to be applied to the frames of parasols and umbrellas when the original cover becomes defaced or 3c worn, as an additional cover or as a substitute for the defaced cover.

My invention consists of a cover provided with certain devices for attaching it to the frame or to the cover of a parasol or umbrella, 35 as herein described, and particularly set forth and combined in the claims.

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my improvement. Fig. 2 is a sectional view of a parasol with my improvement applied over 40 the cover of the parasol. Fig. 3 is a plan view. Fig. 4 is a ferrule for covering the stick and the elastic cord.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts in the different figures.

Referring to the drawings, A represents my improved cover, having a circular opening, o, in the top, for the insertion of the stick s of the parasol. The opening is cut somewhat larger than the circumference of the stick, | ing surrounded by a tube and an elastic cord

and is encircled by a hem, h, of the fabric, 50 which contains an elastic band or cord, c. The hem is puckered, so as to be drawn by the elastic cord and hugged to the stick when in position. The socket-tips T are designed to be slipped over the ordinary tips of the bows 55 of the parasol, and are made with shanks b, which are fastened to the fabric some distance above the circumferential edge of the cover, which may be the same size as the original cover, or larger, extending any desired dis- 60 tance below, thereby covering the tips of the bows.

My improved cover is easily attached to the frame of the parasol or umbrella, whether said frame is in the form of a skeleton or is already 65 covered.

Whenever the cover of an old umbrella or sunshade becomes faded, worn, or otherwise defaced, any person of ordinary intelligence can in a few moments, without the use of tools, 70 apply my improved cover to the old frame, and thus save the time in buying and the price of a new article of the kind.

The operation of adjusting my improvement is as follows: The tip of the stick is inserted 75 in the opening of the cover c. The sockettips are then taken hold of by the fingers of the operator and pulled down, causing the elastic cord to yield enough to permit the socket-tips to be slipped over the tips of the 80 bows. The ferrule f is then passed over the tip of the stick and pressed down upon the cover.

Having described my invention, I claim— 1. A detachable false cover having a cen- 85 tral opening surrounded by a tube and elastic cord, and provided at its border with sockettips, in combination with the frame and cover of a parasol or an umbrella, substantially as described.

2. A detachable false cover having a central opening surrounded by a tube and an elastic cord, and provided at its border with socket tips, in combination with a parasol or an umbrella, the said cover being larger than 95 the cover proper, substantially as described.

3. A detachable cover having a central open-

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within the tube, and provided at its border with socket-tips, in combination with the frame of an umbrella or a parasol, substantially as described.

5 4. A cover having a central opening surrounded by a tube, in combination with an elastic cord within said tube, the tip of the stick, and a ferrule covering the tube and cord, substantially as described.
