

PIE-HOLDER.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 369,112, dated August 30, 1887.

Application filed March 29, 1887. Serial No. 232,836. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, MARY JORY, of Salem, in the county of Marion and State of Oregon, have invented a new and Improved Pie-Holder, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, which is a perspective view, with parts broken away to show the internal construction.

The object of my invention is to construct an inexpensive and efficient holder for pies, cakes, and other articles of food, in which such articles may be kept or carried without injury from contact with each other or with the pie-holder.

The invention consists in the peculiar construction and arrangement of parts, as hereinafter fully described, and pointed out in the claim.

In a frame, A, formed of a strip of metal bent twice at right angles, with the extremities arranged parallel with each other, are secured a number of trays, B, of suitable size for receiving a pie or cake. In the present case I have shown three trays, B; but the holder may contain a greater or less number. The central part of the frame A forms a handle by which the trays and their contents may be lifted.

The frame A and the trays B are fitted to a receptacle, C, which in the present case is a pail provided with a tight-fitting cover, D, and 30 a bail, E, by which it may be carried. The holder may be used independently of the receptacle; but when it is desired to carry the pies from one place to another the receptacle C furnishes the necessary protection against 35 dust and moisture.

Having thus fully described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

As an improved article of manufacture, a 40 pie-holder consisting of the trays B and the frame A, in which the trays B are secured, one above the other, the said frame being composed of a strip of metal bent twice at right angles, with its extremities parallel with each 45 other and its central part forming a handle, as set forth.
