


PHOTOGRAPH-ALBUM.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 439,044, dated October 21, 1890.

Application filed January 7, 1890. Serial No. 336,140. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern.

Be it known that I, Joseph Sutter, a citizen of the United States, residing in the city and county of Philadelphia, State of Penn-5 sylvania, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Photograph-Albums, which improvement is fully set forth in the following specification and accompanying drawings.

My invention consists of a photograph-al-10 bum having a base supporting the same and a receptacle in said base for extra pictures, &c.

Figure 1 represents a vertical section of a photograph-album embodying my invention. Fig. 2 represents a perspective view of the 15 same on a reduced scale.

Similar letters of reference indicate corre-

sponding parts in the two figures.

Referring to the drawings, A designates a photograph-album, which, excepting the fea-20 tures of my invention applied thereto, is of usual construction.

B designates a base, which is hollow or partly hollow, forming the chamber C, the top of which is closed by the lid D, which is 25 hinged to the body of the base and has the album secured to it, said album thus being supported in vertical position on the base, and furthermore held thereon by the prop or brace E.

30 The lid and base are provided with catches F, which may be disengaged or released by means of a push pin or button G; but to such catches I do not limit myself, as any suitable !

form of fastenings may be employed in lieu thereof.

It is evident that the album may be thrown back, as in Fig. 2, in which case the receptacle or chamber C is uncovered and access to the same is had. When the album is returned to upright or vertical position, the chamber is 40 closed and thereby concealed, the lid and body of the base then nicely supporting the album after the manner of an easel, while it is permitted to be opened as usual.

Having thus described my invention, what 45 I claim as new, and desire to secure by Let-

ters Patent, is—

1. A chambered base with a hinged lid, combined with a photograph-album having its one side secured to said lid and normally 50 supported thereby, substantially as described.

2. A chambered base with a hinged lid, combined with a photographic album having its one end secured to said hinged lid and normally supported thereby in an upright or 55 substantially vertical position, substantially as set forth.

3. A horizontal chambered base having a hinged lid or cover, combined with an album secured at its lower end to said lid or cover 60 and a brace connecting the album and lid or cover, substantially as described.
