

FILE OR PORTFOLIO.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 448,816, dated March 24, 1891.

Application filed October 22, 1890. Serial No. 368,921. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be itknown that I, John J. Hanlon, a citizen of the United States, residing at Chicago, in the county of Cook and State of Illinois, 5 have invented certain new and useful Improvements in a File or Portfolio, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, that will enable others to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompany-10 ing drawing, forming a part of this specification.

This invention relates to an improved file or portfolio for the temporary filing of busi-15 more especially intended for use in the office of railway companies for the convenient filing of papers. Files of this character are frequently referred to and subjected to considerable handling, and it is, therefore, necessary that 20 the structure should be strong and durable and at the same time flexible.

The drawing is a view in perspective of a file embodying my improved features.

Referring to the drawing, A A' represent 25 the fly-leaves, and B the different inside or filing leaves. The leaves composing this bookfile are of thick or heavy stock, so as to form a substantial base or back for the papers filed between the same. The back C may be of 30 the flexible character shown or a stiff board back, as circumstances may require. The usual outside covers or binding (not shown) may be secured to the back in any suitable

manner. The cloth binding-strips a are attached to the adjacent faces of the different 35 file-leaves and to the flexible back C, as shown. Considerable space is left between the back edges of the filing-leaves and the backing-strip C, so as to permit of the adjacent surfaces of the respective cloth strips a 40 being joined together over the edge of the file-leaves and thereby afford greater strength and flexibility. The cloth strips a cover a large part of the surface of the leaves, and extend outwardly beyond the point where the 45 temporary fasteners b are inserted in securness papers, such as bills, receipts, &c., and is | ing the filed paper d in place. Having the cloth binding-strips extend out beyond where the fasteners are inserted prevents the liability of the leaves being torn in inserting 50 or removing said fasteners.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters. Patent, is—

In a file of the character described, the 55 combination of the filing-leaves, the backingstrip providing a space between the adjacent edges of said leaves and back, and the binding-strips overlapping the adjacent surfaces of the filing-leaves and joined together be- 6c tween the edge and back and also joined to the backing-strip, substantially as set forth.
