

EMMA RUBY BURT, OF GATESVILLE, TEXAS.

CHEMISE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 453,255, dated June 2, 1891.

Application filed March 24, 1891. Serial No. 386,183. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EMMA RUBY BURT, a citizen of the United States, residing at Gatesville, in the county of Coryell and State of Texas, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Chemises; and I do declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, which form a part of this specification.

My invention has relation to chemises; and it consists in the novel construction and ar-

rangement of its parts.

In the accompanying drawings, Figure 1 is a front view of my chemise. Fig. 2 is a rear view of the same, and Fig. 3 is a pattern of the rear part of said chemise.

My invention is described as follows:

The novelty of my invention consists in a piece A, set in the rear of the chemise in the

following manner.

lar cut a is made, and across the top of a and at a point in the garment that comes just above the hips of the wearer the cross-cut a' is made. Then the parts a² and a³ are gath3° ered back to points x and y, respectively. Then the piece A is sewed to the edges of the parts a² and a³. Then the top of this piece A is gathered, and said top and the gathered edges of parts a² and a³ are then bound securely by the cross-piece a⁴ to the body of the garment. Thus the back B of the garment above the cross-cut a' is without seam or plait and fits closely to the body.

The advantages which this garment possesses over the ordinary chemise are, first, its 40 simplicity and cheapness of construction; second, the wearer is relieved of the annoyance of having it gather about the limbs while walking, which often produces great embarrassment in public places, and, lastly, in its 45 strength and durability, as the improvement is laid exactly where the garment first begins to give or tear.

Having described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters 50

Patent, is—

1. A chemise having the upper seamless rear part B, the cross-cut a' and perpendicular slit a, the parts a^2 and a^3 , gathered back to each side, and the piece A, sewed to the edge of the 55 parts a^2 and a^3 and its upper end gathered in between the edges of said parts, substantially as described.

2. A chemise having the upper seamless rear part B, the cross-cut a' and perpendicular slit 60 a, the parts a^2 and a^3 , gathered back to each side, the piece A, sewed to the edge of the parts a^2 and a^3 and its upper end gathered in between the edges of said parts, and the crosspiece a^4 , binding the top of the piece A and 65 the parts a^2 and a^3 to the body of the garment at the cross-slit a', substantially as described.
