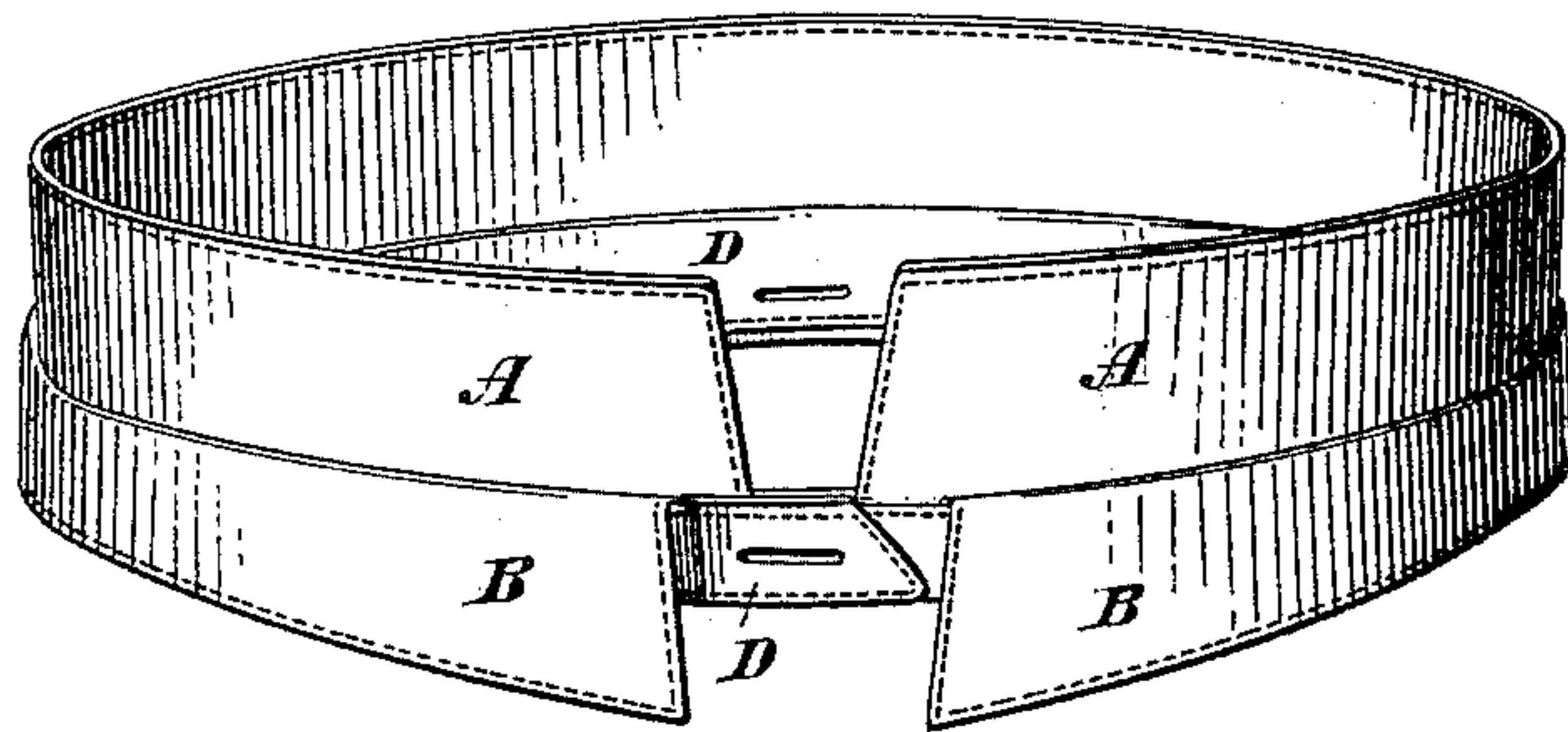

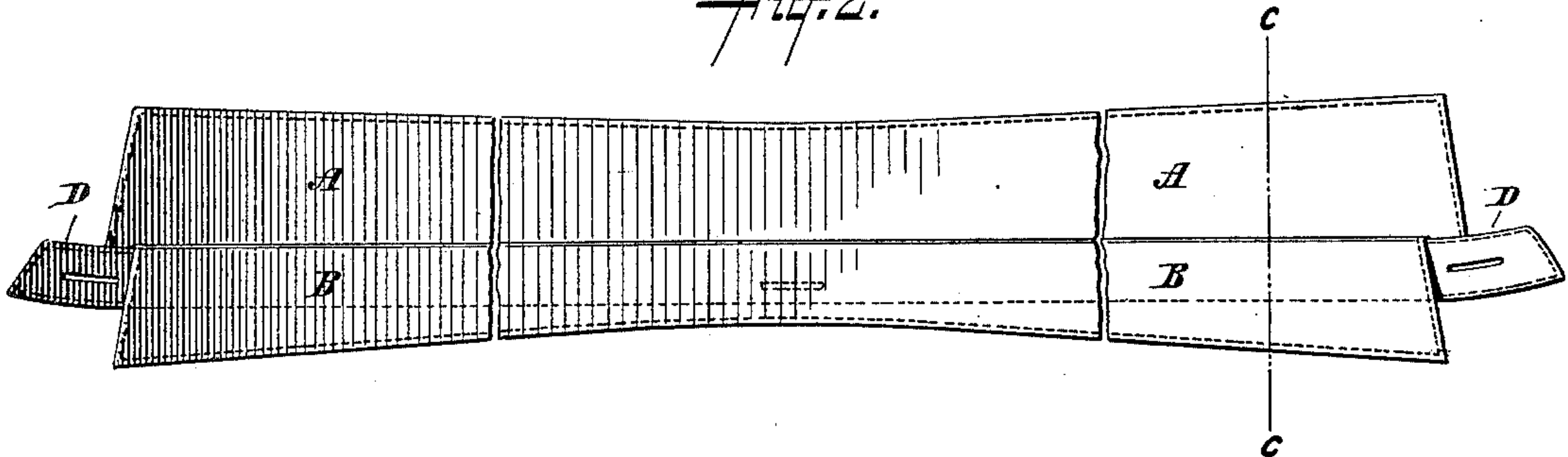
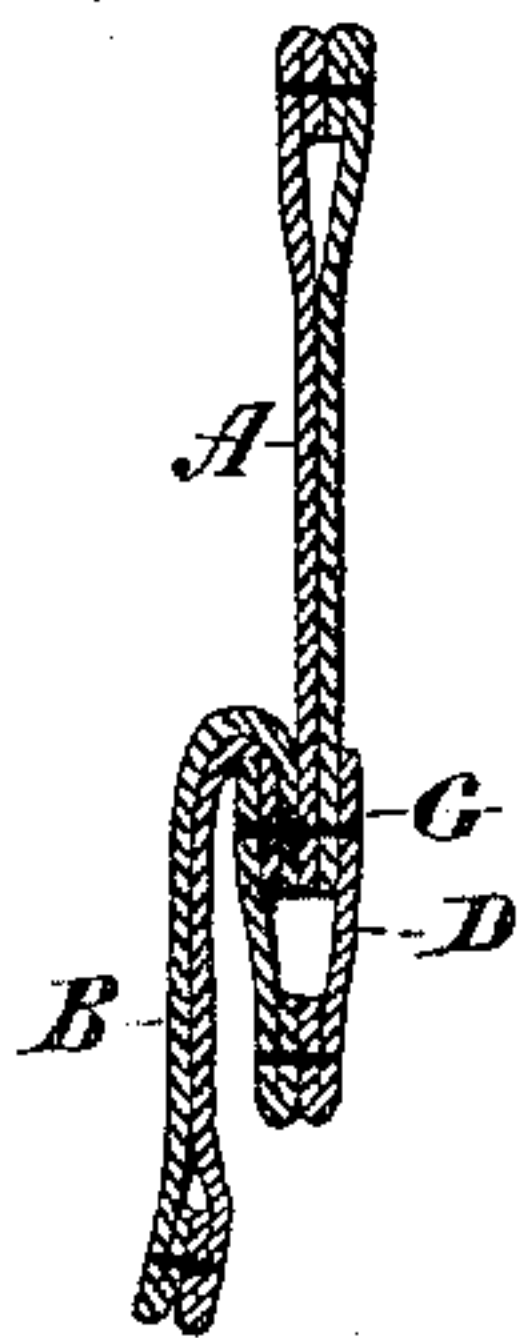

COLLAR.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 460,787, dated October 6, 1891.

Application filed December 27, 1890. Serial No. 375,950. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JEREMIAH A. SCRIVEN, a resident of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented an Improved Collar, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to a new and useful improvement in collars, the object of which is to construct a collar that shall combine both a stand-up and a turn-down collar.

The accompanying drawings clearly show the construction of my improved collar, in which—

Figure 1 is a front perspective view showing the appearance of the complete collar.

Fig. 2 is a longitudinal view of the collar when straightened out. Fig. 3 is a cross-section of Fig. 2 on line *c c*.

Similar letters refer to similar parts in all the figures.

A represents the upright or standing part of the collar; B, the turn-down part of the collar; D, the collar-band. The collar is formed by inserting into a collar-band, as shown in Fig. 3, the lower edge of the upright flap A and the upper edge of the turned-down flap B, and then by a single line of stitching G retaining the same in place. Midway in the

collar-band and at either end may be a button-hole.

It will be seen that I retain the flaps A and B and the neck-band D together by a single line of stitching. What I mean is that but a single line is necessary. Of course double or treble rows of such stitches may be used in close proximity to one another; but they would still be my single row of stitches.

It will be seen that in my collar the parts A, B, and D are joined by a single line of stitches, leaving each part its freedom of play and springiness and producing at very small expense the effect desired.

Having now described my invention, what I claim is—

The combination, in a collar, of the collar-band D with the standing flap A and turn-down flap B, one edge of each of said flaps being contained within said collar-band and all united by a single longitudinal line of stitches, substantially as described.
