

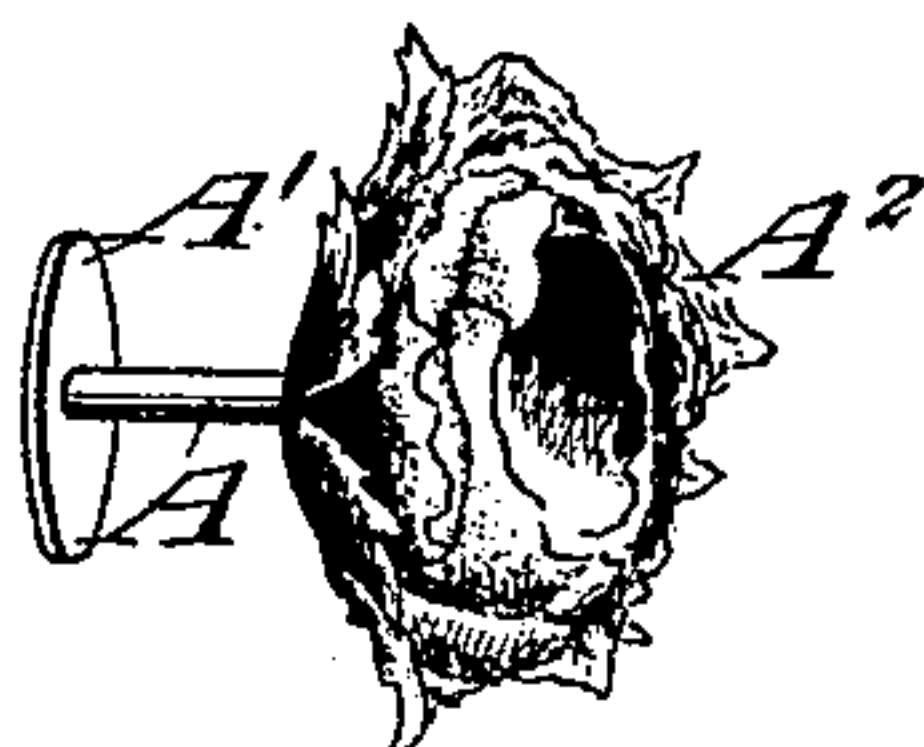

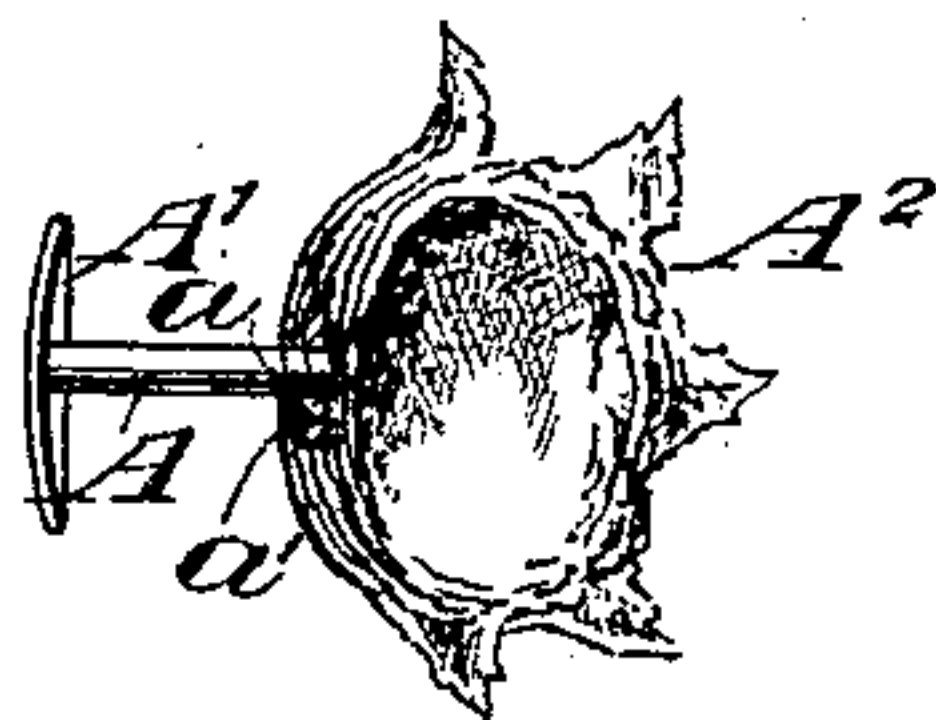

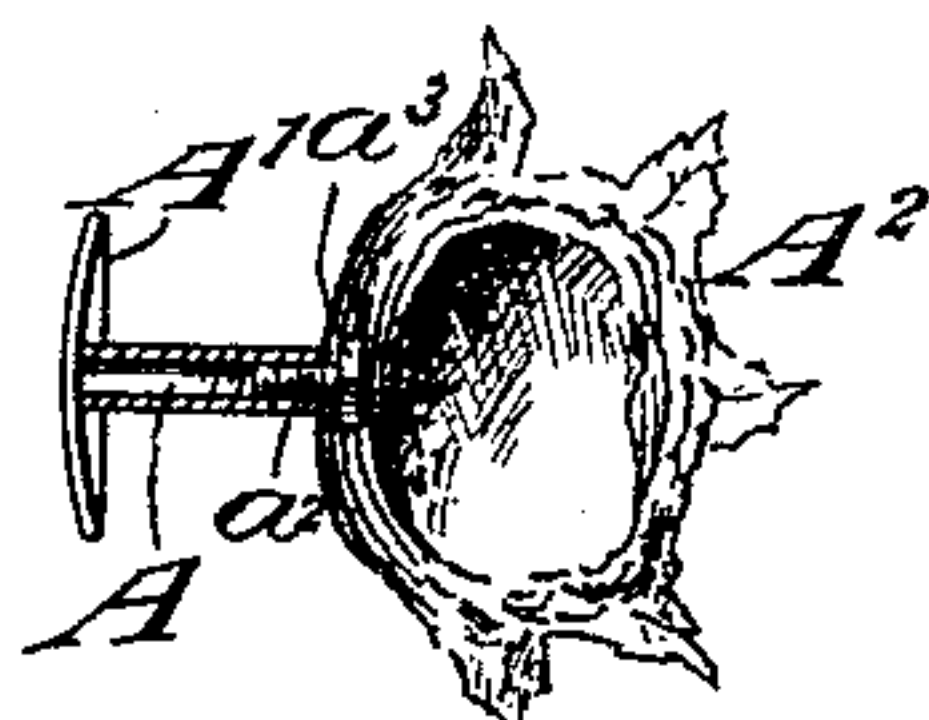

## BOUTONNIÈRE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 500,195, dated June 27, 1893.

Application filed February 20, 1893. Serial No. 462,991. (No model.)

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, HENRY W. FISHEL, of New York, county and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Bouttonnières, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to bouttonnières or buttonhole bouquets, the object being to produce a simple device having an artificial flower adapted to be easily attached or detached from the buttonhole of a garment.

I will describe a device embodying my improvement and then point out the novel features in the claims.

In the accompanying drawings, Figure 1 is a perspective view of a bouttonnière embodying my improvement. Fig. 2 is a partial section thereof. Fig. 3 is a section similar to Fig. 2 but showing a modification.

In both the examples of my improvement the flower is removably secured to the stud portion.

Referring by letter to the drawings A designates the post of a stud and A' the shoe or back plate thereof, and A<sup>2</sup> shows a flower detachably secured to the stud. The flower consists of any suitable material, such as celluloid or porcelain.

In the example shown in Figs. 1 and 2, the post A has an exterior thread  $a$  adapted to engage with a nut  $a'$  secured within the flower.

In Fig. 3 the post A is shown as tubular and having an interior thread with which a

threaded stem  $a^2$  extended from the base of the flower engages. This threaded stem may have a head  $a^3$  secured within the flower.

Having described my invention, what I claim is—

1. In a bouttonnière, the combination with an artificial flower, of a screw-threaded piece secured within the flower, and an externally-projecting screw-threaded post or shank engaging therewith, substantially as set forth.

2. In a bouttonnière, the combination with an artificial flower, of a screw-threaded piece secured within the flower, and a post or shank threaded toward its inner end and engaging with said other threaded piece and having a shoe or plate at its outer end, substantially as set forth.

3. A bouttonnière comprising an artificial flower, a threaded stem secured at its head within the flower and projecting from the base thereof, and an internally-threaded post or shank one end of which engages said stem and having at its other end a shoe or plate adapted to be passed through a button-hole and to retain said post or shank therein, substantially as set forth.
