

HAT-FASTENER.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 562,556, dated June 23, 1896.

Application filed November 22, 1895. Serial No. 569,860. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Henry G. Scarborough, a citizen of the United States, residing at Bishopville, in the county of Sumter 5 and State of South Carolina, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Devices for Holding Ladies' Hats on the Head; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same.

This invention relates to certain new and useful improvements in devices for holding a lady's hat and preventing the same from be-

ing blown off of her head.

It has for its objects, among others, to provide a simple and cheap device applicable to any style or size of hat, and which may be readily removed therefrom when desired, and which when in position can be easily and quickly applied to the hair to hold the hat to the same. It embodies a flexible adjustable band having hooks to engage in the lining or body portion of the hat, and pins to engage in the hair.

Other objects and advantages of the invention will hereinafter appear, and the novel features thereof will be particularly pointed

30 out in the appended claims.

The invention is clearly illustrated in the accompanying drawings, which, with the letters of reference marked thereon, form a part of this specification, and in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my improved hat-holder shown in position within a hat. Fig. 2 is a detail view of the improvement, showing the manner of adjusting the same to different-sized hats.

Like letters of reference indicate like parts

in both of the views.

Referring now to the details of the drawings by letter, A designates a strip or band of some suitable thin flexible material of suitable width and provided at one end with a series of holes or notches a and at the other end with a hook or analogous device a', adapted to be engaged in said holes to hold the band in its closed position and to adapt to the same to be adjusted to accommodate the

hat with which it is to be used. At suitable points upon the band are placed the hooked pins B, held thereto in any suitable manner, as by being passed through the openings b in the band. These hooks are designed to 55 engage in the lining or in the hat proper in case there is no lining thereto, so as to hold the band to the hat. Near the front of the band are the pins or wires C, held thereto in any suitable manner, so as to be turned into 60 any required position, these pins or wires being disposed substantially vertically, and somewhat curved, so as to be readily inserted in the hair on the top of the head, while to the rear and held in suitable loops or analo- 65 gous devices d on the under edge of the band, so as to have pivotal movement, are the pins or wires D, which have their free ends extending toward each other and are adapted to engage the knot of hair at the back of the 70 head. By these means the hat will be securely held to the head.

Modifications in detail may be resorted to without departing from the spirit of the invention or sacrificing any of its advantages. 75

What I claim as new is—

1. A device for the purpose described, comprising a flexible band having means for its adjustment, hooks on said band for attaching it to a hat, and pins pivotally mounted 80 on the band to engage the hair to retain the hat upon the head and retaining-loops on said band for the pins, substantially as described.

2. A device for the purpose described, comprising a flexible band having means for adjusting it as to size, hooks vertically disposed upon said band to attach it to a hat, and pins pivotally mounted upon said band to engage the hair to hold the hat upon the head and loops on the lower edge of the band in which 90 said pins are engaged, substantially as shown and described.
