



SCHOOL-ROOM DIRECTORY AND BULLETIN.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 598,384, dated February 1, 1898.

Application filed April 19, 1897. Serial No. 632,815. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, James S. McClung, of Pueblo, in the county of Pueblo and State of Colorado, have invented a new and Improved School-Room Directory and Bulletin, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description.

The object of my invention is to provide a directory or a bulletin especially adapted for use in schools, being particularly serviceable in promoting the subject of child-study.

A further object of the invention is to provide a bulletin or school-directory upon which the pedigree, the age, and general school-history of every child in the class will be recorded in such manner as to be readily accessible, the arrangement being such that the principal or superintendent of the school may enter a class-room and investigate the history of any one or more of the pupils in the class without disturbing the teacher or the students in said class.

The invention consists in the novel construction and combination of the several parts, as will be hereinafter fully set forth, and pointed out in the claims.

Reference is to be had to the accompanying drawings, forming a part of this specification, in which similar characters of reference indicate cate corresponding parts in all the figures.

Figure 1 is a front elevation of the improved bulletin or directory. Fig. 2 is a section on the line 2 2 of Fig. 1. Fig. 3 is a view of one face of an individual card adapted to be cartied by the bulletin or directory. Fig. 4 is a view of the opposite face of the card shown in Fig. 3, and Fig. 5 is an elevation of a tabulated record adapted to be attached also to the bulletin or directory.

The body of the bulletin consists, preferably, of a metal plate A of suitable dimensions, which plate is struck up at regular intervals in a manner to form clips 10. These clips are arranged in transverse and vertical rows, and, as shown in Fig. 2, each clip comprises two members, which are brought together in a manner to hold between them a card B. A card B is employed for each clip, and, as shown in Fig. 3, upon one face of each card places are made for a number, a name, the age of the pupil, the grade, and the date of entrance, and places for the name and ad-

dress of the parent or guardian, while upon the opposite side of the information-card, as shown in Fig. 4, the nature or condition of 55 the sight and hearing is to be recorded and likewise the character of the diseases from which the pupil may have suffered. These cards are held perpendicularly to the surface of the bulletin, so that they may be read upon 60 either side without turning. The body-sheet A of the bulletin is likewise struck up, so as to form lips 11 at the back of the sheet or body of the bulletin, as shown in Fig. 2, and these lips are adapted to hold in position on the 65 back of the bulletin a tabulated record C, as shown in Fig. 5. The rows of clips are numbered both ways for convenience in locating a pupil. This tabulated record is divided into two sections—namely, a directory- 70 section 12 and a record-section 13. The directory-section is of less dimensions than the record-section, and the said directory-section is usually divided into four or more columns 14, 15, 16, and 17. The column 14, which 75 is the first column, is headed by the word "Names," and above by the words "Year beginning." The next column has the words "Remarks" and "School" as a caption. The column 16 is headed by the words "Ending," 80 "Grade," "Names," and the last column 17 has as a caption the words "Teacher," "Remarks." The first column 14 is prefixed by a smaller column 18, headed by the abbreviation "No.," and a similar column 19 is made to 85 intervene the intermediate wider columns 15 and 16 and is headed by the abbreviation "No." All of the columns above mentioned are lined in like manner.

The record panel or section C of the tabulated record-sheet is provided with longitudinal and transverse lines except at that portion which is adjacent to the directory-section. Between these two sections various panels are formed—for example, a panel 95 20, marked "No.," which corresponds to the column 18 of the directory-section, a second panel 21, marked "Age," and a third panel 22, marked "Grade," these panels being ordinarily longitudinally located. Next to the 100 longitudinal panel, marked "Grade," a transverse panel 23 is formed, which bears the words "Sight," "Hearing," "Entered." Beneath the word "Sight" the letters "R" "L"

appear, reading for "Right," "Left." Beneath the word "Hearing" the same letters appear, and beneath the word "Entered" the letters "M" "D" are produced, standing for "Month," "Date." Adjacent to the horizontal panel 23 a number of panels 24 of the same character is produced, each bearing a name of a month, together with the words "Times," "Standing," and beneath the word "Times" the letters "A" "T" appear, sig-

nifying "Absent," "Tardy."

The tabulated record is folded so that the directory-section will be carried over the record-section, and the number of the names in 15 the directory-section will be duplicated in the number-column of the record-section, and as the directory-section is folded back of the record-section and the record-section is at the back of the body of the bulletin, being held 20 by the lips 11, a student that may attempt to study the bulletin will not be able to ascertain his or her standing, since no names appear, but simply numbers. The principal or superintendent, however, when making an 25 examination, will remove the tabulated record entirely from the bulletin and can therefore make a comparison of the progress of the different pupils or study the standing or record of any particular one.

may be changed upon the bulletin whenever the order of seating is changed without rewriting the card. It is also evident that the chart, directory, or bulletin may be hung in a room or placed upon a teacher's desk or placed in any position without displacing the

cards.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters

40 Patent—

1. A bulletin-board or directory for schools and similar purposes, provided with a series of clips upon one face adapted to hold information-cards and with clips upon its opposing face, and a record-sheet removably held by said clips to said board.

2. A bulletin or directory for school and other purposes, consisting of a board or plate provided with a series of clips upon one of

its faces, information-cards located within 50 the said clips, both faces of the cards being readable without detachment from the clips, and a tabulated card secured to the said board or plate at the back, the said tabulated card containing information as to the school-history and physical condition of the pupils named upon the information-cards, substantially as shown and described.

A school bulletin or directory consisting of a plate or board provided with clips upon 60 one of its faces, information-cards located within the said clips, each containing the name of a pupil and information regarding the same, and a tabulated card constructed in two sections, a directory-section and a record-section, the directory-section being folded upon the record-section and the folded tabulated card being attached to the back of the bulletin, the directory-section containing information relative to the names of the pupils, 70 numbers corresponding thereto and other class information, the record-section containing information relative to the age, grade, sight, hearing, entrance, attendance and standing of the various pupils named upon 75 the information-cards and designated by the same number as the numbers of the names on the directory-section of the tabulated card, as and for the purpose set forth.

4. The combination, with a plate or board 80 having clips formed upon the front face thereof, of information-cards adapted to be received by said clips, the said cards having on one face a space for the name, age, grade, date of entrance of the pupil, and the name 85 and address of the parent or guardian of said pupil, and upon its opposing face a record of the physical condition of the pupil on entering the term of school, and a record-card removably secured upon the obverse side of 90 the board, arranged to present a digest of the record of pupils named upon the information-

cards.
