



CUFF-HOLDER.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 617,924, dated January 17, 1899.

Application filed September 4, 1897. Serial No. 650,561. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John M. Crowe, a citizen of the United States, residing at Fort Wayne, in the county of Allen and State of 5 Indiana, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Cuff-Holders; and I do declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which 16 it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the figures of reference marked thereon, which form a part of this specification.

My invention relates to improvements in cuff-holders wherein a wire clasp is secured to the cuff and which is adapted to connect with a particularly-shaped pin secured to the inner side of the coat-sleeve.

20 The object of my improvement is to afford means for securing the cuff in a manner adapted to maintain the position of the cuff in relation to the coat-sleeve. I attain this object by the construction illustrated in the 25 accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective showing the device complete as it appears when attached to the cuff, and Fig. 2 is a plan of the fastener.

The numerals of reference indicate the sev-30 eral parts illustrated in the drawings.

The holder proper consists of a piece of wire formed into a loop 2, the end of the wire being upturned, terminating with a small hook adapted to engage the middle of said 35 wire. The hook 4 is a continuation of the same wire, is turned forward in a plane parallel with the loop 2, and is provided with a downwardly-extending crook 5, which normally rests in contact with the said wire.

The pin consists of a piece of wire in which 40 is formed the loop 7. One end of this wire terminates with the small hook 9, which is adapted to engage the other end 8 of the same wire near its extremity, this portion being slightly curved and terminating with a 45

sharply-pointed end.

In using my improved device the holder is secured to the cuff by releasing the hook 6 and passing that portion of the holder through the registering buttonholes of the cuff. The 50 hook 6 is then replaced. The pin is then secured to the lining of the coat-sleeve by releasing the hook 9 and hooking the pin 8 through a portion of the lining and then securing the pin by said hook to prevent it 55 from becoming detached. The hook 4 of the holder is then passed through the loop 7 of the pin, the crook 5 preventing it from accidental detachment.

Having described my invention, what I 66 claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters

Patent, is—

In a device for securing cuffs, the combination of a cuff-holder consisting of a wire formed into the loop 2 having the hook 6 for 65 closing said loop, and the hook 4 having the crook 5 and a pin consisting of a wire formed into the loop 7 one end of said wire having the hook 9, and the other end being formed into the pin 8 with an upturned pointed end 75 adapted to be engaged by the hook 9, substantially as shown and described.
