

## ATTACHMENT FOR PRIVY-SEATS.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 625,389, dated May 23, 1899.

Application filed September 1, 1898. Serial No. 689,978. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, NATHAN FISHER, a citizen of the United States, residing at Marshall, in the county of Clark and State of Illinois, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Attachments for Privy-Seats; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, which will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, which forms part of this specification.

My invention relates to that class of attachments for privy-seats which are provided for sanitary purposes; and the objects of my invention are, first, to provide a detachable and portable seat which may be placed upon any 20 ordinary privy-seat, and, second, to provide a seat which when used by a person will from its peculiar structure obviate the unsanitary and harmful contraction of the parts brought in contact with the seat, as occurs in the use 25 of the ordinary privy-seats used heretofore, thereby lessening injurious pressure upon delicate organs and danger therefrom of causing constipation, piles, and other kindred troubles. I attain these objects by means of 30 the mechanism illustrated in the accompanying drawing, in which the figure is a perspective view of the attachment mounted upon an ordinary privy-seat.

Letters of reference refer to the various parts of the attachment in the drawing.

The letter a indicates an inclined seat-board, the central portion of which is cut away upon the rear end thereof for the purpose of providing a perforation b and two legs c and 40 c', as shown in the drawing and for the pur-

pose hereinafter set forth.

The letter d indicates a support constructed of wood or other suitable material, upon which the raised end of the seat-board a rests and is

45 firmly attached.

The letter e indicates a perpendicular backrest which is attached to and stands upon the two legs c and c'. The back-rest e is curved slightly to conform with the curvature of that 50 part of a person's back coming in contact

therewith and serves as a support adapted to prevent the body from slipping downward and backward upon the inclined seat-board.

To utilize my attachment, it is only necessary to place the same upon any privy-seat in 55 such position that the perforation b will stand immediately over the perforation in the privy-seat, the support d resting upon the privy-seat in front of the perforation therein and the two legs c and c' straddling and extending 66 backward to a point behind the perforation and resting upon the privy-seat, as shown in the drawing.

The attachment is designed to support the weight of a person at or near the front edge 65 thereof instead of upon the edges of the perforation in the seat, and the back-rest e further serves to prevent the body from sliding backward and downward upon the seat-

The advantages of my invention over other similar contrivances used heretofore consist in the mechanical construction, which prevents the delicate organs of the person using the same from coming in contact with the 75 edges of the perforation of the seat, thereby obviating the contraction and cramped condition of the parts such as occurs in the use of the ordinary privy-seat.

I am aware that privy-seats provided with 80 perforations have long been in use, so make no broad claim upon such; but

What I do claim as new and useful in my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

In a detachable privy-seat attachment, the combination of an inclined and perforated seat-board a, provided with two legs c and c', with a support d, adapted to support the seat-board in an inclined position and a perpendicular and curved back-rest e, all substantially as described and shown and for the purpose set forth.
