





INVALID-BED ATTACHMENT.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 653,547, dated July 10, 1900.

Application filed March 27, 1900. Serial No. 10,356. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Anna E. Countryman, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Marcus, in the county of Cherokee and State of Iowa, have invented a new and Improved Invalid-Bed Attachment, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description.

This invention relates to improvements in attachments for invalid-beds; and the objects are to provide a simple device by means of which a person may be easily lifted and removed from the bed when it is desired to make up or rearrange the bedding, and, further, to provide a simple device for supporting a person in a sitting position in the bed.

I will describe an invalid-bed attachment embodying my invention and then point out the novel features in the appended claims.

Reference is to be had to the accompanying drawings, forming part of this specification, in which similar characters of reference indicate corresponding parts in all the figures.

Figure 1 is a perspective view of a bed, showing an attachment embodying my invention as applied thereto. Fig. 2 is a view similar to Fig. 1, but showing the attachment in a different position. Fig. 3 is a sectional side elevation of the bed, the attachment appear-

30 ing in its uppermost position. Referring to the drawings, 1 designates a bed of the ordinary construction. Attached to the inner side of the headboard 2 of the bed is a strip 3, to which is removably se-35 cured a rail 4 by means of angle-irons 5, which at their upper ends are attached to the rail 4 by means of nails or screws, and thumbscrews 6 pass through perforations in the portions of the angle-irons 5 which pass along 40 the lower side of the strip 3. Attached to the bar 4 by means of a thumb-screw 7 is a socket 8, in which a leg 9 of a track or rail 10 is engaged, the said track or rail having a similar leg 11 at its outer end and resting on 45 the floor at one side of the bed. Similar devices are connected to the footboard 12 of the bed for supporting a track 13, one leg 14 of which passes through a socket 15, while the

50 the bed. Movable on the track or rail 10 is a stand-

outer leg 16 rests on the floor at one side of

ard 17, while movable on the rail 13 is a standard 18. These standards have yoke portions 19 engaging around the rails or tracks, and within each yoke is a roller 20, engaging with 55 the upper surface of the rail or track. A sling or hammock 21 is connected at the head end by means of chains or similar devices 22, with the ends of a cross-bar 23 attached to the upper end of the standard 17. At the 60 footend of the sling or hammock 21 is a tackleblock 24, from which a rope 25 extends to a tackle 26, attached to the standard 18.

In operation when the patient is to be lifted or moved from the bed the sling or hammock 65 is to be placed under him. Then after engaging the head end of the hammock with the chains or connections 22 and connecting the foot end with the standard 18 by drawing upon the rope 25 the sling or hammock, with 70 the patient, will be moved upward, as indicated in Fig. 3, after which the sling or hammock supporting the patient may be moved rapidly on the rails or tracks 10 and 13 to the position indicated in Fig. 2. After this it is 75 obvious that the bedding may be made up or rearranged as desired.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

1. The combination with a bed, of horizontal tracks or rails supported at the head and foot of the bed, standards movable on said rails, and a sling or hammock adapted for connection with the standards, substantially 85 as specified.

2. The combination with a bedstead, of tracks or rails removably connected to the head and foot boards thereof, standards movable on said tracks or rails, rollers carried by 90 the standards for engaging with the tracks or rails, a cross-bar on one of the standards, a sling or hammock adapted for connection with said cross-bar, and a rope or tackle connection between one end of said sling or ham- 95 mock and the other standard, substantially as specified.

3. The combination with a bedstead, of strips secured to the head and foot boards thereof, bars removably connected to said 100 strips, sockets connected to the bars, rails or tracks having legs passing through said sock-

ets and also having legs at the outer ends for engaging with the floor upon which the bed is placed, standards movable on said tracks or rails, and a sling or hammock adapted for connection with the standards, substantially as specified.
