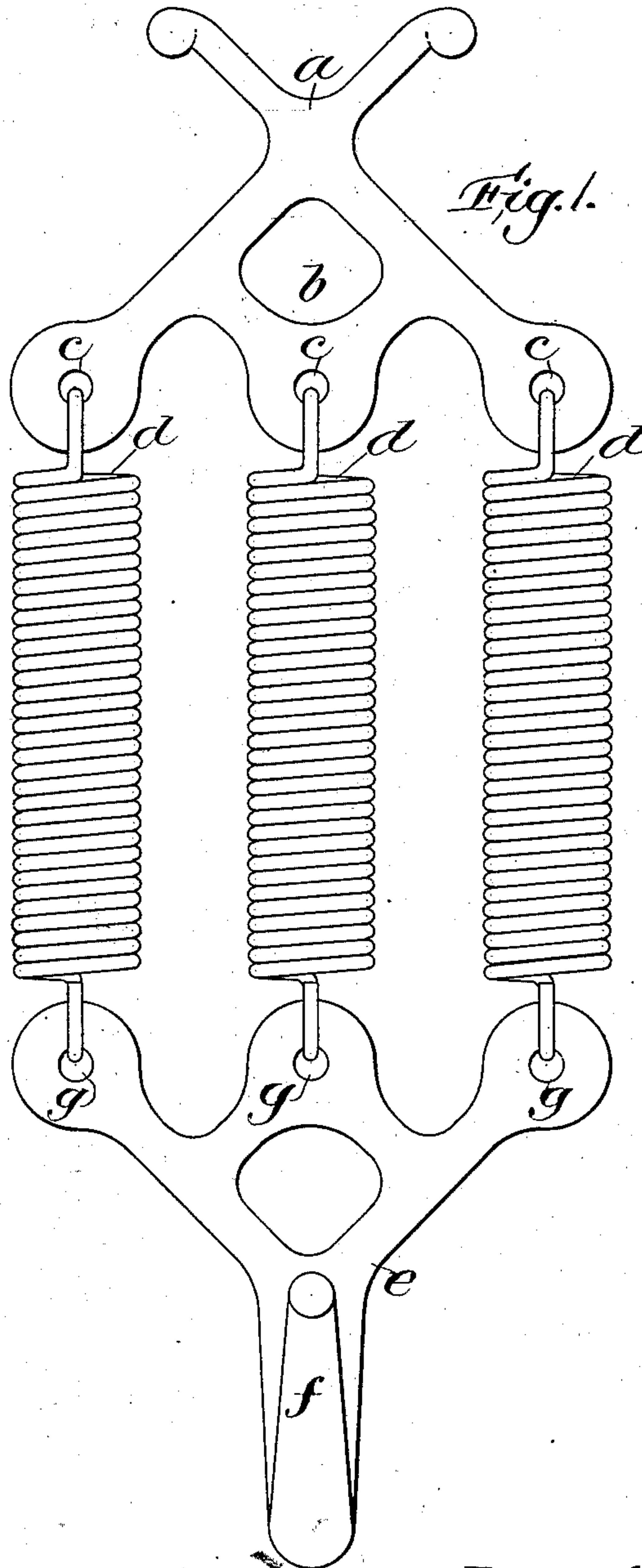
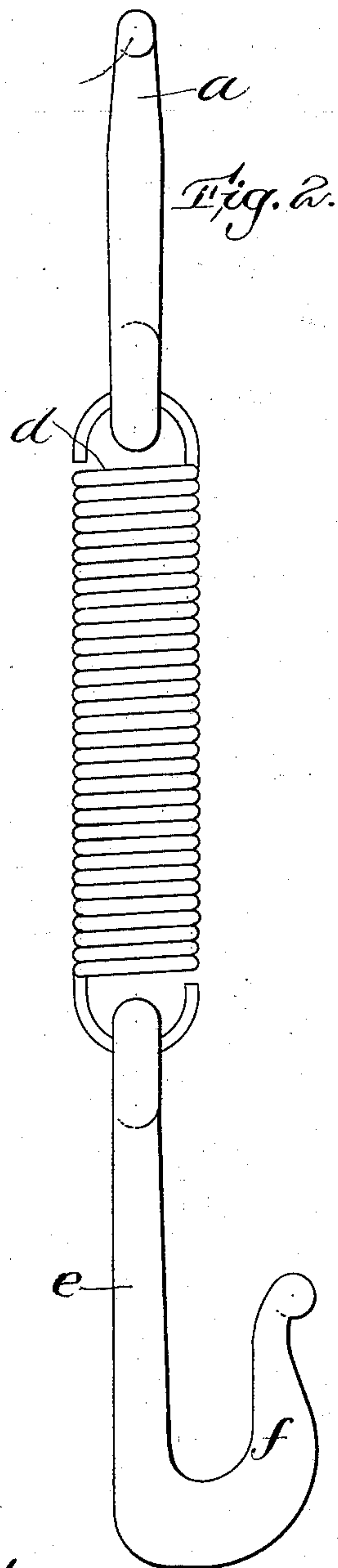

YIELDING SLING FOR HAMMOCKS.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 654,910, dated July 31, 1900.

Application filed May 3, 1900. Serial No. 15,304. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, LANGDON WASHINGTON MOORE, of Boston, in the county of Suffolk and State of Massachusetts, have invented
5 a new and useful Improvement in Yielding Slings for Hammocks, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a front elevation of my new
10 sling. Fig. 2 is a side elevation of my new sling.

My invention has for its object to provide a simple and cheap sling for a hammock, one which will be yielding, and thereby contrib-
15 ute greatly to comfort by its use.

In the drawings illustrating the principle of my invention and the best mode now known to me of applying the same, *a* is the upper member, which may be suitably secured to a
20 tree, post, or other convenient support by passing a hook or tie-rope through the eye *b*. The lower side of the member *a* is provided with holes *c c c*, in which are hooked the upper ends of the spiral springs *d d d*. The
25 lower member *e* is formed into a hook *f* at

its lower extremity, which hook *f* engages the ordinary eye, loop, or thimble with which the extremities of a hammock are provided. The upper side of the member *e* is provided with holes *g g g*, into which the lower ends
30 of the spiral springs *d d d* hook.

My sling is simple, cheap, and efficient for its purpose, and it gives to the hammock the easy restful swinging motion so much desired.

What I claim is—

In a yielding sling for hammocks, an upper
35 member *a* having an eye *b* for the attachment of a tie-rope, and three apertures *c, c, c* for the attachment of springs, in combination with a lower member *e* having a hook *f* at its
40 lower extremity, three apertures *g, g, g* for the attachment of springs, and interposed springs *d, d, d*, all substantially as and for the purpose specified.
