









COMBINED SHIRT-FRONT AND BRACES.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 708,397, dated September 2, 1902.

Application filed May 22, 1902. Serial No. 108,575. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, MARGARETTA EMILY Poore, a subject of the King of Great Britain, residing at 33 Chaucer road, Herne Hill, Lon-5 don, England, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in a Combined Shirt-Front and Braces, of which the following is a specification.

The object of this invention is an improved to combined shirt-front and braces, whereby the ordinary braces are dispensed with and the front is kept in shape close to the body of the wearer, and thus prevented bulging beyond

the opening at the waistcoat.

My invention will be clearly understood from the following description aided by the

accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a plan view of my combined shirt-front and braces complete. Fig. 2 is a 20 front view of the body and head of a man with my combined shirt-front and braces in position. Fig. 3 is a back view of a man with my combined shirt-front and braces in position. Fig. 4 is a front view of a man with my 25 combined shirt-front and braces, together with a false full-front waistcoat. Fig. 5 is a front view of a man with my combined shirt-front and braces, together with a false waistcoat around the waist only.

For the purpose of this invention the front is made with the usual stiffening or soft portion A with projecting pieces or flaps B at each side of a width and strength suitable for the size of front of the wearer, the flaps B 35 continuing from the top C of the shirt-front A in the form of straps B', which pass down the back and cross each other, as at Fig. 3.

The wings B and the straps B' are provided with buttonholes D E for engagement of 40 hook, cross-piece, or other device F of appliances carrying suspenders G for suspending the trousers back and front, and the wings B may have loops through which the suspenders may be passed to assist in keeping 45 the front in proper position upon the wearer.

Any number of buttonholes D E can be made in the wings B and straps B', so that the suspenders G and their appliances may be positioned to suit the desired height of the 50 trousers on the wearer.

The straps B' cross at the back at a buttonhole portion, so that the hook of the back suspender appliance engages both buttonholes and centralizes the strap, as seen at Fig. 3, but such straps can be lengthened and 55 fastened to the buttons on the trousers direct.

The wings B and straps B' are cut to fit the shoulders of the wearer in any easy manner and so that the whole of the weight and strain of the trousers is equally borne on both 60 shoulders, thus insuring perfect ease and com-

fort during wear.

The neckband H is made to fasten at the back and the stud-holes I are of great length, so as to allow of the front being worn for dif- 65 ferent sizes of necks, which can be done by bars stitched across, making one or more stud or button holes, the connecting-stud having free movement along the stud-holes I, or the neckband may be secured by an elastic or 70 other device.

A front made as above described may be used with a waistcoat, in which case it has attached pieces of material J, cut and made in imitation of the front portion of dress or 75 other kind of waistcoat, as at Fig. 4, or as the lower part of a waistcoat, as at Fig. 5, which imitation waistcoat renders unnecessary the cummerbund or waist-cloth usually worn in hot weather in place of a waistcoat, and such 80 pieces can be attached to the shirt-front by buttons K, secured to the front flaps 3 or other part. The front or the wings may also have buttons or other fastenings to prevent the coat flying open and showing the sides of 85 the front and may be worn over underclothing during hot weather or in hot climates, thus dispensing with the usual shirt.

In some cases my combined shirt-front and braces may form part of an ordinary shirt.

What I claim, and desire to secure by Let-

ters Patent, is—

1. A shirt-front, flaps secured a portion of their length to the sides of said shirt-front and the remaining portion of their length free of 95 the shirt-front and adapted to be passed down the back of the wearer and crossing each other at their ends, said flaps provided with buttonholes at each side of the shirt-front and buttonholes registering with each other in their 100 free ends, in combination with suspenderstraps adapted to engage in the buttonholes at the side of the shirt-front and in the registering buttonholes in the free end of the

5 flaps.

2. A shirt-front, flaps secured a portion of their length to the sides of said shirt-front and the remaining portion of their length free of the shirt-front and adapted to be passed down to the back of the wearer and crossing each other at their ends, said flaps provided with buttonholes at each side of the shirt-front and buttonholes registering with each other in their free ends, in combination with suspenderstraps adapted to engage in the buttonholes at the side of the shirt-front and in the registering buttonholes in the free end of the flaps, and loops secured to the outer face of said flaps at the sides of the shirt-front for retaining said suspender-straps in position.

3. A shirt-front, a flap at each side of said shirt-front, each of said flaps extending a portion of its length the entire length of the side

edges of the shirt-front and suitably secured thereto and the remaining portion of the 25 length of the said flaps being free of the shirt-front and adapted to be passed down the back of the wearer and crossing each other at their ends, each of said flaps provided with a plurality of buttonholes at each side of the shirt-30 front and further provided in their free ends with a buttonhole, the buttonholes in the ends of the flaps registering with each other, in combination with suspender-straps adapted to engage in the buttonholes at the sides of 35 the shirt-front and in the registering buttonholes in the ends of the flaps, substantially as shown and described.
