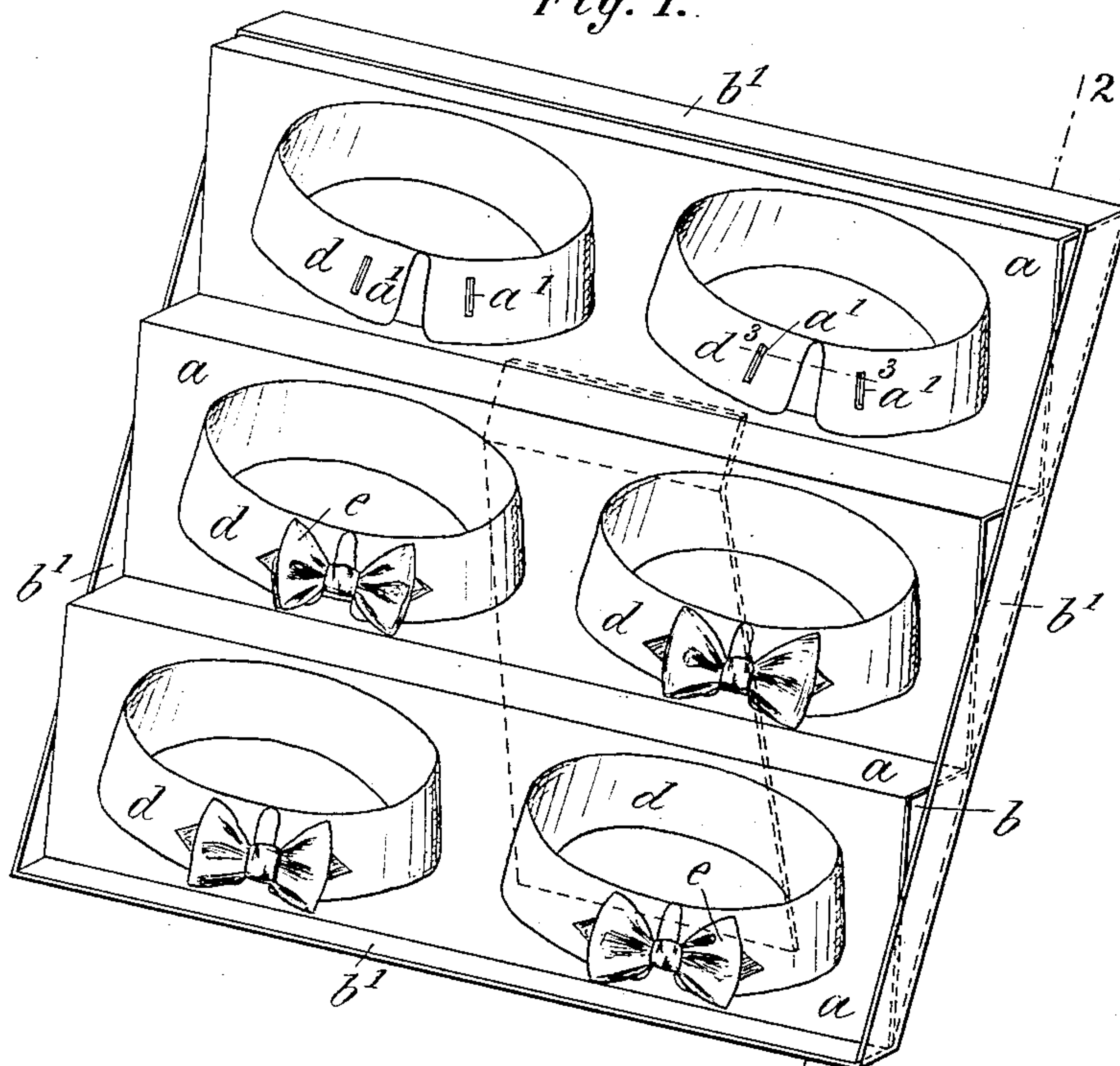

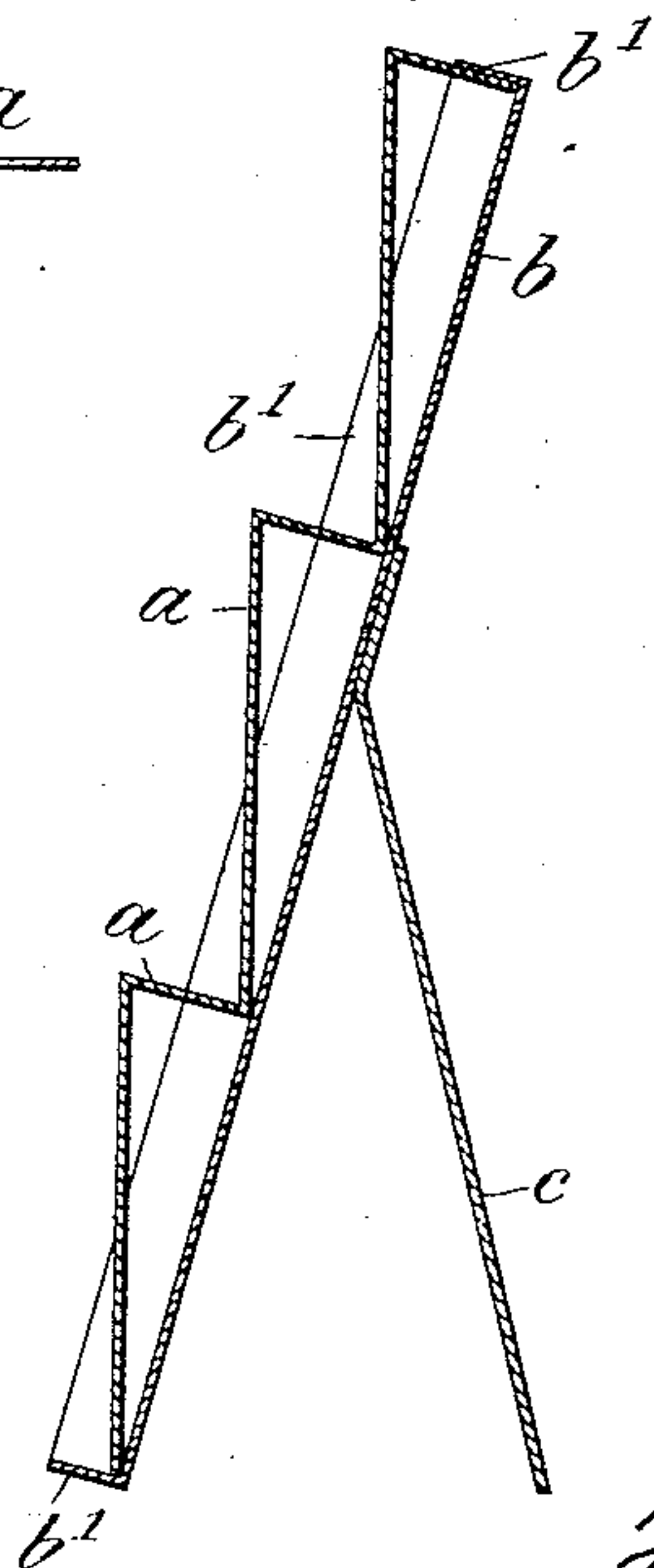
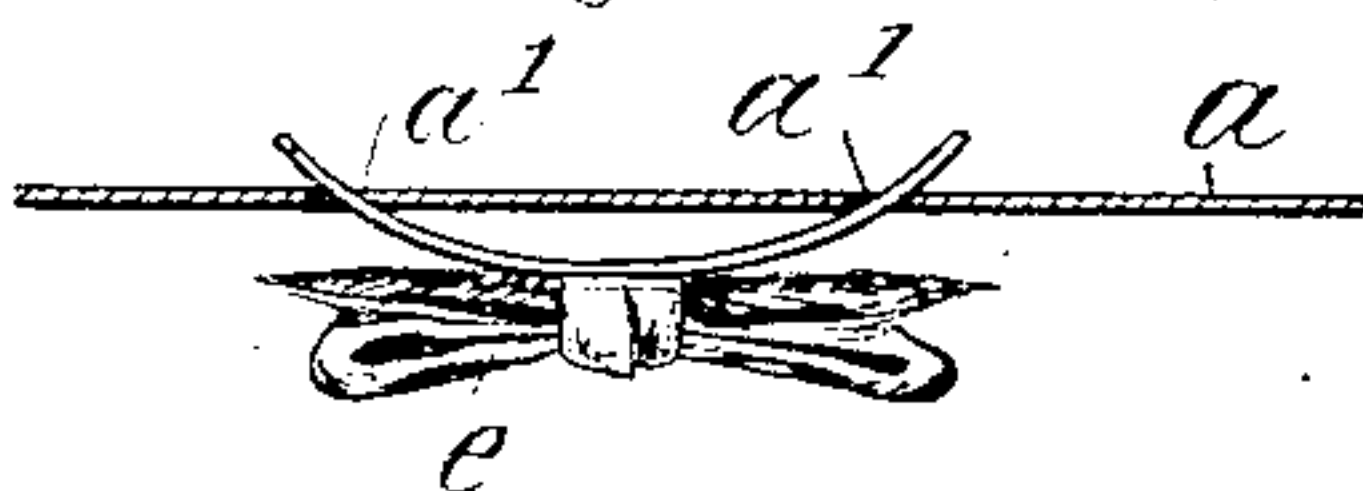

DISPLAY-STAND.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 750,804, dated February 2, 1904.

Application filed October 31, 1903. Serial No. 179,289. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HIRSCH BURNSTONE, a citizen of Russia, residing at New York city, Manhattan, county and State of New York, have invented new and useful Improvements in Display-Stands, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to a stand for displaying neckties in a neat and effective manner.

In the accompanying drawings, Figure 1 is a perspective view of my improved display-stand. Fig. 2 is a longitudinal section on line 2 2, Fig. 1; and Fig. 3, a detail cross-section on line 3 3, Fig. 1, with the necktie in position.

The letter *a* represents a display-card or face-plate bent to form a number of steps, each step being composed of a horizontal section and of an inclined riser. The card *a* is secured to a straight back plate *b*, which is provided with a surrounding rim *b'*. This rim embraces the face-plate *a* and imparts rigidity to the structure. A foot *c*, hinged to back *b*, sustains the stand in an inclined position.

Upon each of the inclined risers of the face-

plate *a* are represented one or more collars *d*, the drawings showing two collars represented side by side. Through each riser are further made two diverging slits or incisions *a'*, one to the right and the other to the left of the center line of each collar.

In use the devices for supporting the neckties *e* are projected with their ends through the slits *a'* and into the triangular chambers formed between the plates *a* and *b*. In this way the neckties will become neatly displayed, being represented as in actual use. A slight pull on the ties will detach them from the card.

What I claim is—

A display-stand composed of a stepped face-plate having inclined slitted risers, collars represented on the risers, a back plate having a rim that surrounds the face-plate, and a foot hinged to the back plate, substantially as specified.
