

JOHN BROOKE BOYLE, OF BALTIMORE, MARYLAND.

CUFF.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 765,122, dated July 12, 1904.

Original application filed October 23, 1903, Serial No. 178,252. Divided and this application filed November 28, 1903. Serial No. 183,031. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John Brooke Boyle, a citizen of the United States, residing at Baltimore city, in the State of Maryland, have in-5 vented new and useful Improvements in Cuffs, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to certain new and useful improvements in cuffs and is a division of application Serial No. 178,252, filed Octo-

10 ber 23, 1903.

The invention aims to provide a new and novel form of cuff adapted to receive an attaching means for confining the cuff to a coatsleeve, frock, or other garment, so that the 15 descent of the cuff over the hand will be prevented.

The invention further aims to provide a new and novel form of cuff which shall be strong, durable, efficient in its use, and comparatively

20 inexpensive to manufacture.

With the foregoing and other objects in view the invention consists of the novel combination and arrangement of parts hereinafter more specifically described, illustrated in 25 the accompanying drawings, and particularly pointed out in the claims hereunto appended.

In describing the invention in detail reference is had to the accompanying drawings, forming a part of this specification, wherein 30 like reference characters denote corresponding parts throughout both views and in which—

Figure 1 is a face view of a reversible cuff in accordance with my invention. Fig. 2 is a 35 face view of a non-reversible cuff in accordance

with my invention.

The reversible cuff 2, as shown in Fig. 1, is provided with a pair of openings; (indicated by the reference characters 45.) These openings 40 are preferably oval-shaped in contour; but any other shape may be employed, and they are arranged approximately centrally of the cuff in vertical alinement with each other and extending in a longitudinal manner or in the 45 direction of the length of the cuff. The cuff 2 is also provided with the buttonholes 67, and at one end thereof a fastening-flap 6' is arranged approximately centrally of said end. The function of the longitudinally-extending |

openings 4 5 is to permit of a holder being con- 50 nected to the cuff, so the latter can be attached to a coat-sleeve. One form of holder is shown in application Serial No. 178,252, filed October 23, 1903, of which this application is a division.

In Fig. 2 of the drawings a non-reversible cuff embodying the improvement is set forth, and said non-reversible cuff is indicated by the reference character 9 and is provided with a pair of openings, (indicated by the reference 60 characters 1011.) These openings are preferably oval-shaped in contour; but any other shape may be employed, and they are arranged approximately centrally of the cuff in vertical alinement with each other and extending in a 65 longitudinal manner or in the direction of the length of the cuff. The function of the openings 10 11 is the same as that of the openings 4 5, hereinbefore referred to. The cuff 9 is also provided with buttonholes 12 at each 7° corner and the fastening-flaps 13 at the opposite corners.

From the foregoing description, taken in connection with the accompanying drawings, it is evident that a new and novel form of cuff adapt- 75 ed to receive an attaching means by which the cuff can be confined to a coat-sleeve, frock, or other garment, so that the descent of the cuff over the hand will be prevented, is set forth, and that the cuff will always project from the coat-80 sleeve in the manner originally set, no matter to what position the coat-sleeve may be moved, and that when a reversible cuff is used the same can be readily reversed when one end is soiled, and that when the coat is on the person the 85 cuff may be drawn up along with the coatsleeve when washing the hands to prevent the soiling of the cuff, and it will furthermore be evident that changes, variations, and modifications can be resorted to without departing 9° from the spirit of the invention or sacrificing any of its advantages; and I therefore do not wish to restrict myself to the details of construction hereinbefore described and as pointed out in the accompanying drawings, but re- 95 serve the right to make such changes, variations, and modifications as come properly within the scope of the protection prayed.

Having thus fully described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by

Letters Patent, is—

1. As a new article of manufacture, a cuff 5 provided with a pair of openings in vertical alinement and arranged approximately centrally thereof, said openings permitting of the passage of an attaching means for securing the cuff to a coat-sleeve.

2. As a new article of manufacture, a reversible cuff provided with a pair of openings in vertical alinement and arranged approximately centrally thereof, said openings extending in the direction of the length of the 15 cuff, said openings permitting of the passage of an attaching means for securing the cuff to a coat-sleeve.

3. As a new article of manufacture, a cuff provided with a pair of oval-shaped openings

in vertical alinement and arranged approxi- 20 mately centrally thereof, said openings permitting of the passage of an attaching means for securing the cuff to a coat-sleeve.

4. As a new article of manufacture, a reversible cuff provided with a pair of oval-shaped 25 openings in vertical alinement and arranged approximately centrally thereof, said openings extending in the direction of the length of the cuff, said openings permitting of the passage of an attaching means for securing 30 the cuff to a coat-sleeve.
