

SPRINGING AND DANCING PUPPET.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 773,692, dated November 1, 1904.

Application filed December 3, 1902. Serial No. 133,720. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Robert Uhrig, a subject of the Emperor of Germany, and a resident of Altenessen, Germany, have invented a certain new and useful Springing and Dancing Puppet, of which the following is a specification.

In the drawings, Figures 1 and 2 are longitudinal sections.

The invention relates to a springing and dancing puppet which first stands still and then after a certain time springs high of itself.

The same consists of a box a, which is bored out and provided with a border b. Below, a bottom c with a pin d is arranged. Upon this pin lies a tube e, on which are a rubber ring f and the puppet h and in which the spiral spring g is arranged.

o If the puppet now is pressed, with the tube e, into the box a, the same is first held fast by means of the rubber ring f at the border b until the yet stronger spring g brings gradu-

ally the ring f out of the border b, whereupon the puppet springs high.

In order to make the puppet dance, the tube *e* is put upon a tube *i* and this is rotated.

Having now described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

A springing and dancing puppet consisting in combination of a hollow base, a rod mounted upon and perpendicular of said base, a tube sliding upon said rod, a compression-spring respectively connected to the upper extremity of the rod and the top of the tube, a puppet upon said tube, a protruding rubber ring upon the lower extremity of said tube, and an inwardly-protruding flange upon said base substantially as described.
