

MAGAZINE FOR HOLDING TOILET-PAPER.

To all whom it may concern

Be it known that I, LINNAEUS T. ELLIS, a citizen of the United States, residing at La Park, in the county of Los Angeles and State 5 of California, have invented new and useful Improvements in Magazines for Holding Toilet-Paper, of which the following is a specification.

My invention has relation to means whereto by large quantities of this paper may be placed in a convenient receptacle and be at all times in readiness for use; and the object thereof is to provide simple and reliable means for holding this paper and preventing the useless waste thereof. I accomplish these objects by means of the device described herein and shown in the accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my toilet-20 paper magazine partly filled with toilet-paper. Fig. 2 is a central vertical section showing the manner in which the magazine is secured to the wall. Fig. 3 is a perspective view of a follower adapted for placement on 25 the loose toilet-paper in the magazine.

In the drawings, A represents the maga-

zine-casing, and B the top thereof.

C represents the follower, adapted for placement upon the toilet-paper D, the mag-30 azine being in place and held to the wall by the screw E and being full of toilet-paper, as shown in Figs. 1 and 2. The forefinger is passed through the vertical longitudinal aperture A' into the magazine and also into the 35 aperture C' in the follower and placed on the first layer of toilet-paper, which is then drawn from under the follower C through the vertical opening A'. This will not disturb the

other layers of paper beneath the first one when it is drawn out for use. The follower 40 C is of sufficient weight to keep the different layers of paper in proper order while the top layer is being withdrawn. By this arrangement the useless waste of toilet-paper is always avoided and a quantity thereof will 45 always be on hand.

The magazine can be easily refilled when empty and can conveniently be made of a sufficient length to chamber the necessary quantity to last an indefinite period. The 50 magazine should incline downwardly from the back to the front, as shown in the drawings, that the different layers of paper may be easily drawn therefrom.

Having described my invention, what I 55

claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters

Patent, is—

1. A magazine for holding toilet-paper comprising a rectangular case provided with a vertical longitudinal opening in the face 60 thereof; a follower adapted to chamber therein and having in the front part thereof a recess for the passage of the finger.

2. The herein-described toilet-paper magazine comprising a rectangular casing A hav- 65 ing a lid B thereon; a vertical slit A' in the face thereof in combination with the follower C having a recess C' in the front part thereof.
