



ATTACHMENT FOR BARBERS' CHAIRS.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM C. MUELLER, a citizen of the United States, residing at Chicago, in the county of Cook and State of 5 Illinois, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Attachments for Barbers' Chairs; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable 10 others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same.

My invention relates to a novel construction in an attachment for the head-rests of barbers' chairs, the object being to provide a 15 device for securing a large number of sheets of antiseptic paper to said head-rest, which rest upon the latter, and the upper sheet of which is removed after each occupant leaves the chair to provide a fresh clean rest for the 20 next occupant; and it consists in the features of construction and combinations of parts hereinafter fully described and claimed.

In the accompanying drawings, illustrating my invention, Figure 1 is a vertical sec-25 tion of the head-rest of a barbers' chair provided with an attachment constructed in accordance with my invention. Fig. 2 is a rear elevation of same. Fig. 3 is a horizontal

section on the line 3 3 of Fig. 1.

In making an attachment to barbers' chairs it is essential that all sharp corners or projections which might catch the clothing of the barber or any person passing the chair should be avoided, as besides being annoying 35 such corners or projections are apt to cause injury to the occupant of the chair. It is also necessary that the attachment be simple, neat in appearance, and capable of being rapidly attached and removed. To these and 40 other ends my device consists of a shallow Ushaped member A, the free ends of which are adapted to bear upon the rear face of the base B of the head-rest of the barber's chair, said member being preferably made of mod-45 erately stiff and heavy sheet metal and having its free end portions curved on a sufficiently large radius to prevent the formation of a corner sufficiently sharp to catch the clothing of the barber. At its middle portion 50 on its lower edge said member A is provided with a flat tongue or flange C, which projects underneath the base B of the head-rest and

enters the recess D of a clamp member E, secured to said base B, and which carries a setscrew F, which is adapted to bear upon said 55 tongue or flange C and clamp same against said base B. Between its middle portion and its end portions said member A is provided with two inwardly-projecting threaded shanks G, over which a perforated block H, 60 of paper, and a follower-plate J are adapted to be inserted and clamped by thumb-nuts K against said member A, said block H, plate J, and thumb-nuts K being contained in the space between the member A and the rear 65 edge of the base B of the head-rest, where they are entirely out of the way. The sheets contained in the block H are perforated in a line parallel with and adjacent the upper edge of said member A. The portion of the 70 block H which is clamped between the member A and the follower-plate J is necessarily of less width than the head-rest, the sheets being of sufficient width to cover said headrest and being cut away, as at L, adjacent 75 the clamping devices.

The paper used in connection with my device is specially prepared to render it antiseptic, and as each occupant leaves the chair the uppermost sheet is turned back and sev- 80 ered from the block, so that a fresh clean surface is always presented to each new occu-

pant.

My device is neat, simple, and efficient and is the means of saving the barber considerable 85 expense otherwise incurred for the purchase and laundering of towels used for the same purpose.

I claim as my invention—

1. A device of the kind specified, compris- 90 ing in combination, a U-shaped member removably secured to the head-rest and bearing at its ends upon the rear face thereof, and clamping means interposed within said Ushaped member for removably securing a 95 block of paper or the like thereto.

2. A device of the kind specified, comprising in combination, a U-shaped member curved at its free end portions and bearing at its ends against the rear edge of the head-rest, 100 a tongue carried thereby, clamping means mounted on said head-rest and adapted to receive and engage said tongue, threaded shanks on the inner face of said U-shaped

member over which a block of paper or the like is adapted to be inserted, a follower-plate having perforations adapted to receive said shanks, and thumb-nuts adapted to bear on said follower-plate to clamp said block between the latter and the inner face of said U-shaped member.
