

COMBINED CIGAR-STAND, CIGAR-CUTTER, MATCH-BOX, AND LIGHTER.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John B. Zorn, a citizen of the United States, residing at Wisdom, in the county of Beaverhead and State of Mon-5 tana, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in a Combined Cigar-Stand, Cigar-Cutter, Match-Box, and Lighter; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, 10 such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters and figures of reference marked thereon, which form a part of 15 this specification.

This invention relates to new and useful improvements in a combined cigar stand, cutter, match-box, lighter, and ash-pan, and comprises a simple and efficient device of this 20 nature so arranged that it may be detachably held upon the edge of a table, shelf, or other object, and comprises, essentially, a framework of wire having a portion thereof bent so as to form a clamping member adapted to en-25 gage the edge of a shelf or table while a portion of the wire forms a support for an ashpan, with a part of the frame bent to form loops in which a cigar may be supported.

My invention comprises other details of 30 construction and arrangements of parts, which will be hereinafter fully described and then specifically defined in the appended claim.

I illustrate my invention in the accom-35 panying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my inven-

tion, and Fig. 2 is a side elevation.

Reference now being had to the details of the drawings by letter, A designates a wire, 40 which is bent to form two coils B, the central portion of the wire forming a clamping member D. The wire is bent to form the loops E, adapted to receive the edge of a table or shelf, and is bent upon itself at points F, and 45 the horizontally-disposed portions G are bent

upwardly at G', forming means to support a match-box K, having a vertical spring-actuated cutting-blade N, mounted in suitable guideways in said box and adapted to shear adjacent to the edge of an aperture T, formed 50 in the edge of the box. Said upright portions of the frame to which the match-box is fastened are forwardly bent, forming the loops Q, in which a cigar may rest, and thence the ends of the wire are curved downward 55 and rearward toward the box, forming a support for an ash-tray J, positioned immediately below the loops which support the cigar.

From the foregoing it will be noted that by 60 the provision of the device shown and described a simple and efficient apparatus is afforded which may be detachably connected to a table, shelf, or other object and affording means for supporting a cigar with an ash- 65 tray and also a match-box and cutter, all

convenient for ready use.

What I claim is— A combined cigar-stand, match-holder and tray-supporting device made of a single piece 70 of wire which is bent upon itself horizontally, forming a shelf-engaging portion, thence the strands of the wire turned into coils and the middle portion of the wire bent to form a resilient jaw extending between the strands of 75 the portion which is adapted to engage the shelf, fastening means for engaging upright portions of the wire, portions of the wire above said fastening means being bent to form loops Q, a tray resting upon the curved 80 ends of the wire, and straps secured to said tray and through which the ends of the wire pass, as set forth.
