

## COFFEE-HOLDER.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WALTER MAECHLER, a citizen of the United States, residing at Chicago, in the county of Cook and State of Illi-; nois, have invented new and useful Improvements in Coffee-Holders, of which the follow-

ing is a specification. This invention is a percolator or bag for holding coffee in a coffee-pot, and has for its object to provide a bag which can be attached to any ordinary sized coffee-pot. The bag hangs on a metal ring which is so constructed that the former can readily be taken off the latter. The ring is also provided with hooks 5 which are removable with the bag and which when in place are used to support the same.

In the accompanying drawings, Figure 1 is a perspective view of the bag removed from the pot. Fig. 2 is a vertical section showing

to the bag in place. Referring specifically to the drawings, the fabric bag is indicated at 6 and the metal ring at 7, which fits in the hem or casing 8 around the top of the bag. The metal ring 25 is split and lapped at the ends, and being made of spring-metal wire can be contracted to fit in pots of various sizes. The free ends of the ring also form means for removing the bag when desired for the purpose of washing 30 or renewing the same, and to this end a hole

9 is made in the hem through which the end of the wire projects, so that the hem can be turned or drawn off the wire to remove the bag. There are also other similar holes 9 in the hem, affording places for hooks 11, which 35 are placed upon the wire so that they project through the holes in position to work from the edge of the pot 12, as shown in Fig. 2. The hooks are loose on the wire, so that they can be slid off with the bag when the latter is removed from the wire.

The manner of use is obvious from the above description and the drawing, and the manner of manufacture obviates the necessity for cutting or ripping the hem every time 45 the bag is removed.

I claim—

A holder for coffee and the like consisting of a bag having a hem at the top and a series of holes around the same, a split ring within 5° the hem, and hooks loose on the ring and extending through the holes in the hem.
