

## DETACHABLE POCKET FOR GARMENTS. .

To all whom it may concern:

citizen of the United States, residing at Baltimore city, State of Maryland, have invent-5 ed certain new and useful Improvements in Detachable Pockets for Garments, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to an improvement in "detachable pockets for garments" and more 10 particularly to reinforced pockets, where the reinforcement is made necessary by the frequent use of the pockets, that the durability

of the garment may be prolonged.

The device is particularly adapted for use 15 in such garments as are worn by street railway conductors and others of similar occupation, where the constant use of the pockets occasioned by carrying coin therein, soon reduces the pocket to a condition of useless-20 ness and disfiguration of the garment to such an extent that it is no longer available or desirable for use. That such results may be obviated and to a great extent reduced, I have provided a reinforced detachable pocket 25 which may be secured within the ordinary pocket of a garment, and when not in use may be detached, thus leaving the garment free from the unsightly permanent reinforcements as are commonly used to protect the 30 pocket and prolong the life of the garment.

The device is cheap in manufacture, can be sold for a reasonable price and is effective for

the purpose of which it is intended.

With the foregoing objects in view, my in-35 vention consists in certain novel features of construction and combination of parts, which will be hereinafter described and pointed out in the claims.

In the accompanying drawings, Figure 1, is 40 a perspective view with part broken away to better show the invention; Fig. 2 is a transverse section through the fastening elements. and Fig. 3 is a perspective view of the frame removed.

A, represents the body portion of the pocket, made of any suitable material but

preferably of canvas.

B, is a reinforced top extended portion of the pocket, said reinforcements usually con-50 sisting of a covering made of leather or some other similar material; C, is the flap of the pocket which is also similarly reinforced or covered as is the top extension B just described; D, is a metal frame preferably made 55 of spring wire, upon which the top extended | and a frame to which said extension and flap 110

portion B and the flap C, are secured; said Be it known that I, Jesse W. Hayes, a frame extends horizontally, as at 1, along within the upper margin of portion B, downward, as at 8, 8, within the side margins thereof, is then bent upward at 9, 9 to enter 60 the side margins of flap C, again bends downward at 10, 10 to conform to the fold of the flap, and finally extends horizontally, as at 11, within the lower margin of the flap; the portions 9, 9 of the frame are bent to present 65 the forward-projecting loops 2, which cooperate with the portions 10 of the frame, as at 3, to clamp the material of the pocket proper of the garment; 4 is a flat spring metal strip extending across and within the top edge of 70 the flap C, for the purpose of stiffening the flap and causing it to have a tendency to keep the pocket closed.

> 5 are snap fastening buttons such as are ordinarily used on gloves and act as an addi- 75 tional means for securing the pocket within

the pocket proper of the garment.

In Fig. 2, 6 represents the cloth part of a garment with the male part of the button 5 secured therein, while the female part of the 80 button 5 is secured to the inner top side of the extension B, of the false pocket, by a similar means the flap C, is secured to the lower edge 7 of the pocket proper of a garment, the button 5 being secured in the flap 85 C and the cloth 7 in the manner just described, this method of securing the false pocket within the pocket proper of the garment is, however, auxiliary to the method previously described, viz: the loop exten- 90 sion 2, engaging the cloth between the said extension and the frame 1, and is not essential to the effectiveness of the device, but is shown as a modification.

Slight changes might be resorted to in the 95 form and arrangement of the several parts described without departing from the spirit and scope of my invention, and hence I do not desire to limit myself to the exact construction as herein set forth.

Having described my invention, what I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters

Patent, is:

1. In a pocket of the character described, a pocket body, a reinforced extension pro- 105 jecting upward above the rear side thereof, a reinforced flap extended upward and then bent downward at the front side of the body, thus comprising a rear and a front flap-part,

are secured, said frame comprising a portion extending around the top and side margins of the extension, side members continuous with and projecting upward from the lower ends of said portion along the side margins of the rear flap-part, and a portion extending around the bottom and side margins of the front flap-part with its upper ends continuous with the upper ends of said side members, said side members being bent to present forward-projecting loops for clamping the garment against the front part of the flap.

2. A detachable pocket of the character described, comprising a frame, a body part, a reinforced extension secured on the upper side of the frame, a reinforced flap similarly secured on the said frame on the opposite side thereof and slightly below the upper edge of the said extension, a flat metal strip secured within the upper edge of the flap, and means provided by the frame for securing the said pocket within the permanent pocket of a garment, substantially as described.

A detachable pocket of the character described, comprising a frame, a body part, a flap secured on the front side of the frame, a flat metal strip secured within the upper edge of the said flap, a reinforced extension secured on the opposite side of the said frame and extended above and below the upper edge of the said flap, a loop extension provided on the said frame and located opposite that part of the frame secured within the end of the said flap for the purpose of securing the said pocket within the permanent pocket of a garment, substantially as described.

A detachable pocket of the character described, comprising a body part provided 40 with a reinforced extension on the inner top side, a reinforced flap provided on the outer top side thereof, a frame upon which the said body part and flap are secured, a flat metal strip secured to the said frame ex- 45 tending across the width of the said pocket parallel with the same, the said metal strip being housed within the upper edge of the said flap, loop extensions formed on the said frame located opposite the frame parts, ex- 50 tending through the end portions of the said flaps for the purpose of securing the said pocket within the permanent pocket of a garment, substantially as described.

5. A detachable pocket of the character described, comprising a frame, a body part provided with a reinforced top extension secured on the said frame, a reinforced flap similarly secured on the said frame on the side opposite that on which the said reinforced extension is secured, a flat metal strip secured within the upper edge of the flap parallel with the frame part secured within the lower edge thereof, means provided on the said flap and extension for securing each 65 respectively to a garment, and means provided on the frame for securing the body part within the permanent pocket of a garment, substantially as described.
