



CIGARETTE-HOLDER.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Edward T. Crane, a citizen of the United States, residing at Philadelphia, county of Philadelphia and State of Pennsylvania, have invented a certain new and useful Improvement in Cigarette-Holders, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to a new article of manufacture consisting of a cigarette holder, and has for its object to provide a cheap and effective holder of this description upon which the brand or trade-mark of the maker may be displayed and at the same time 15 serves as a means for supporting the cigarette while being smoked, thus avoiding the discoloration of the fingers of the smoker and permitting the cigarette to be entirely consumed without inconvenience.

With these ends in view, this invention consists in the details of construction and combination of elements hereinafter set forth and then specifically designated by the claims.

In order that those skilled in the art to which this invention appertains may understand how to make and use the same, I will describe its construction in detail, referring by letter to the accompanying drawing forming a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 represents a cigarette with my improved holder attached thereto. Fig. 2, a similar view showing the holder bent outward into operative position. Fig. 3, a similar view showing my improved holder applied to a cigarette having a cork or other mouth piece. Fig. 4, a detail view of a slightly modified form of my improvement in which the mouth piece and holder are 40 formed of a single piece of material.

In carrying out my invention as embodied in Figs. 1 and 2 I cut from paper or other material of sufficient stiffness a small strip A having a notch B formed therein, and this strip is pasted or otherwise attached to the cigarette from the notch to the end of the cigarette, the unpasted end lying free against the cigarette so as not to in any way interfere with the packing of the cigarettes in boxes.

50 When the cigarette is to be smoked the free portion of the strip is bent at right angles to

the pasted portion, as clearly indicated in

Fig. 2 and will thus provide a holder which

may be grasped by the smoker so as to avoid the nicotin fumes from coming in contact with 55 the fingers and permitting the cigarette to be consumed down to the holder, thus leaving only that portion of the cigarette which is held in the mouth of the smoker. The notch B serves to facilitate the bending of the free 60 portion of the strip at the desired angle and this angle may be determined by the perforated or indented line b.

In Fig. 3 I have shown my improvement as applied to a cigarette having a cork or 65 other mouth piece C, the strip passing under the mouth piece thus holding it in place.

In Fig. 4 I have shown a form of my holder in which the mouth piece D is formed with the strip A so that when the mouth piece is 70 secured around the end of the cigarette the supporting strip will lie free lengthwise of the cigarette and may be bent outward when desired for use. Of course the strip A might project from the mouth piece D or any point 75 desired, but I have found that economy of material is effected by making the mouth piece and strip in the form shown in Fig. 4 since but little or no stock is wasted in cutting such a form from material.

Of course I do not wish to be limited to any particular form of holder, as the gist of my invention rests in the broad idea of a supporting holder in combination with a cigarette.

Having thus fully described my invention, what I claim as new and useful, is—

In combination with a cigarette, a strip of paper, adapted to encircle the end of the cigarette to be applied to the mouth of the 90 smoker, having formed therewith at its right extremity, when gummed in position at the end of the cigarette, a strip of reduced width and extending at right angles to the first strip, and adapted to serve the purpose of a holder 95 for the cigarette, when the first or main strip is gummed about the cigarette at the extremity thereof.
