


DOLL'S HEAD.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Herman Schwickart, a citizen of the United States, residing in Brooklyn, county of Kings, State of New York, have invented a new and useful Doll's Head, of which the following is a specification.

The object of this invention is to make a doll head that will not break, that is capable of fine finish and one that has the mechanism for moving the eyes separable from the head.

Heretofore dolls' heads having rolling eyes have had the eyes fixed to supports on the inside of the head. In this invention the eyes and their supporting mechanism are separable from the head, making it easy to make repairs as the whole can be taken out as a unit.

In the accompanying drawing forming part of this specification; Figure 1 is a sectional elevation, side view. Fig. 2 is a front view.

Like figures refer to like parts.

1 is the head made of plastic material molded hollow or of metal cast hollow and

having an opening in the crown, the opening having a ledge 4 around it, against which the solid crown piece 2 fits and rests, being held by any suitable means. Fixed to the crown 30 at 9 is frame 8 having two branches with pivots 12 at ends entering into centers in cylinder 10, the cylinder having attached to it a rod with weight 5, 6 is the position of the pupil of the eye attached to the cylinder, 7 is 35 the eye lid, 11 is the eye lash. The weight moves the cylinder so that the eyes are open when the doll is upright and the eyes closed when it is in a reclining position.

Having described my invention what I 40 claim and desire to secure by Letters Patent is:

A hollow doll's head having an opening above and back of the eyes, having a ledge inside of the opening, and a crown piece 45 adapted to close the opening and rest on the ledge, and eyes supported by the crown piece and removable from the head.
