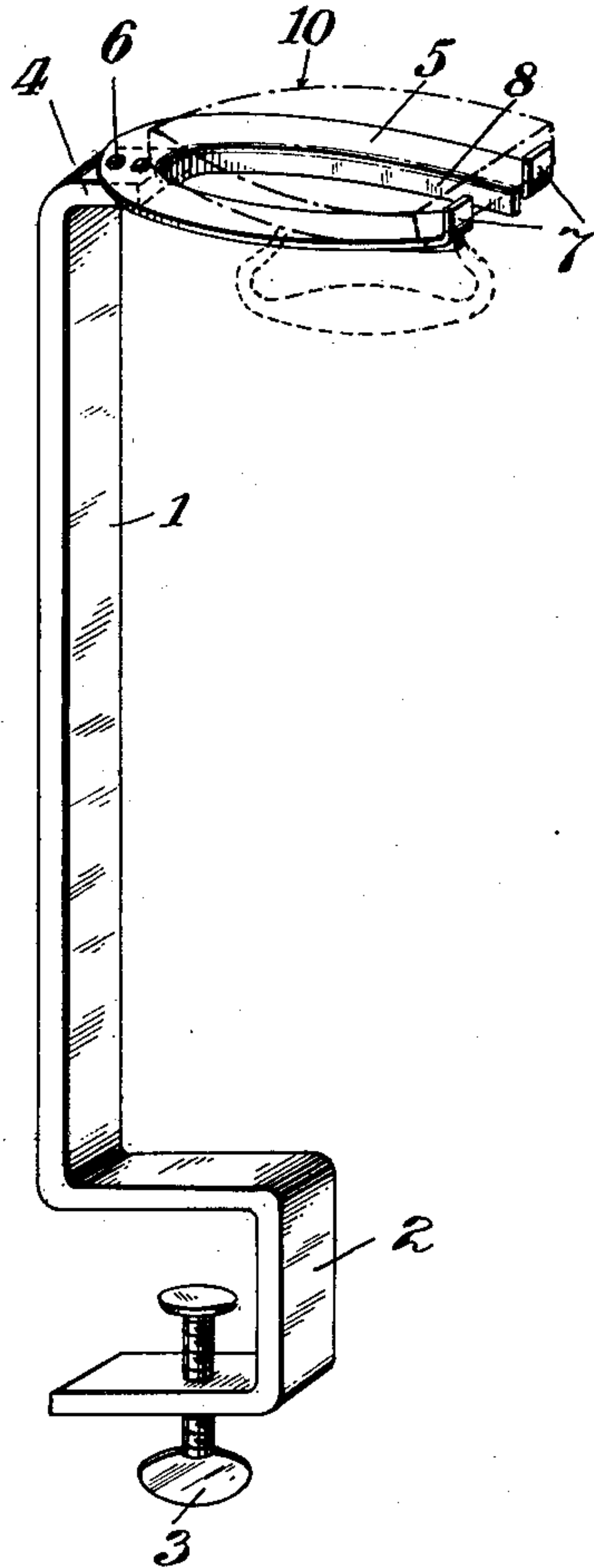

HOLDER FOR INVERTED SAD-IRONS.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOSEPHINE SHELTON, a citizen of the United States, residing in the borough of Manhattan, city, county, and State of New York, United States of America, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Holders for Inverted Sad-Irons.

The principal object of my invention is to provide a firm support to hold any ordinary flat-iron in a reversed position.

My invention is intended to furnish a device whereby any ordinary flat-iron, may be used in a reversed position, and from which it may be instantly removed and used in the ordinary position in ironing. It also acts as a stand or rest for the flat-iron, when used in the ordinary method of ironing. The construction of my device is shown in the accompanying drawing.

The numeral 1 designates an upright standard which can be attached to the edge of a table and securely clamped thereto by the screw 3.

5 is a slotted plate or support for the flat-iron, preferably in the form of a horseshoe, with the outer ends 7, turned up, in order to prevent the flat-iron from slipping out from the slot, this slotted plate, 5, may be cast in one piece with the standard 1, or may be made separately and attached to the standard by screws or rivets.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent is:

In a support for a flat-iron, the combination of an upright standard, a clamping device at the lower end of the standard, and a forked plate at the upper end of said standard for holding a flat-iron in a reversed position, said plate having the ends thereof turned upwardly.
