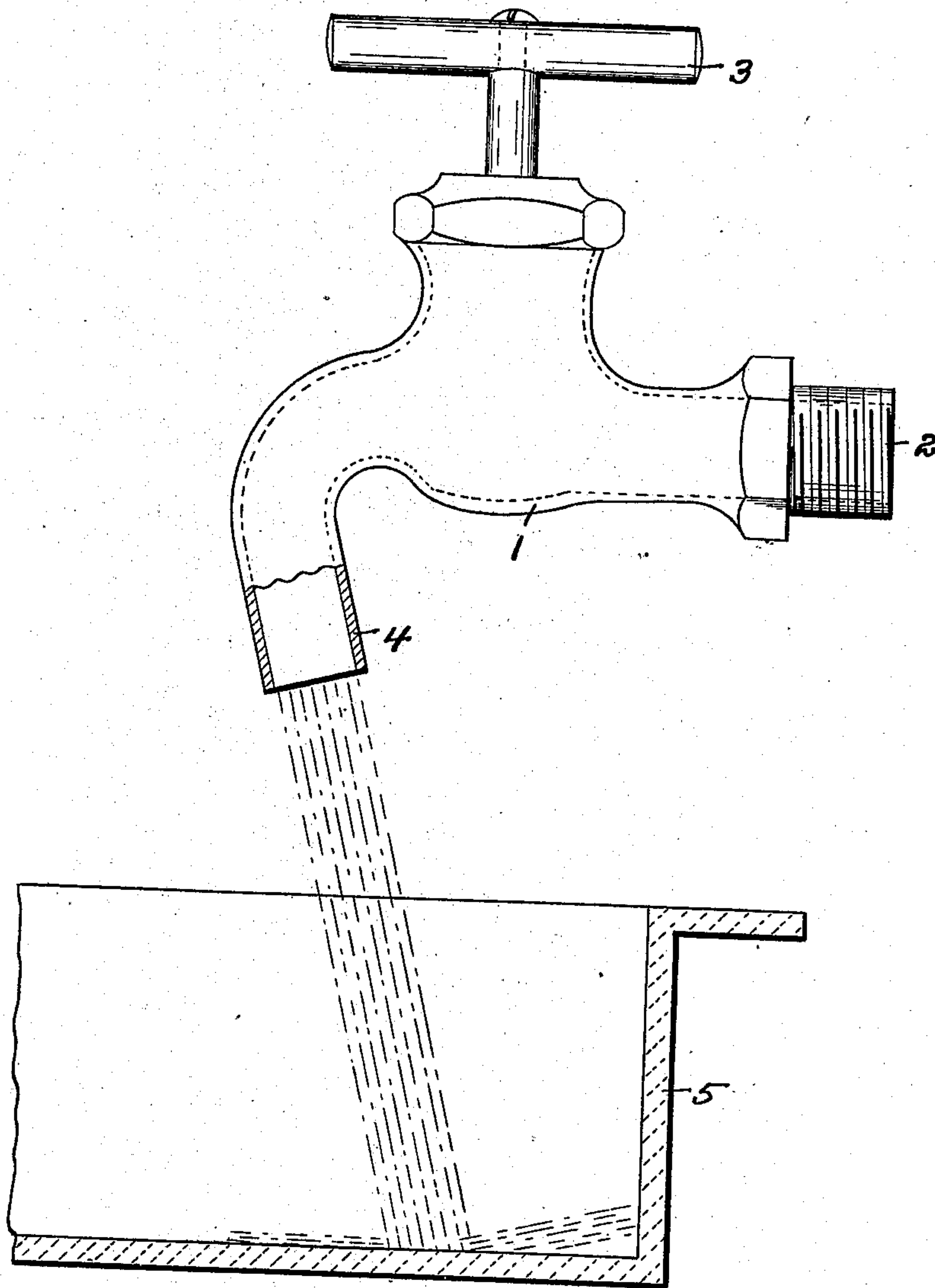

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, LOUIS S. DE FOREST, a citizen of the United States, residing at New Haven, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Faucets, of which the following is a specification, reference being had therein to the accompanying drawing.

My invention relates to new and useful improvements in faucets, and has for its object, among other things, to construct a faucet that will discharge in a plane inclined rearwardly, and to these, and other ends, my invention consists in the faucet having the details of construction hereinafter described and more particularly pointed out in the claims.

In the drawing I have illustrated a faucet of the ordinary type, in which the numeral 1 designates the body thereof, 2 the threaded rear end, 3 the handle, and 4 the discharge end, which is inclined rearwardly in respect to the vertical, and toward the end of the faucet 2, the object thereof being to discharge the liquid in a plane toward the rear of the faucet.

In operation my improved faucet is mounted so that the liquid strikes the bottom of the sink at an angle that deflects the liquid onto

the back thereof. Under the old type of faucet, where the liquid is delivered onto the bottom of the sink at a right angle thereto, the stream is diverted in all directions by its contact therewith and spatters the liquid over the walls and flooring adjacent thereto, and any person who happens to be in the vicinity, but in my improved faucet the stream of liquid contacts at such an angle that it is deflected onto the back and bottom of the sink where it remains instead of being ejected therefrom, and thereby obviates the objections to spattering above referred to.

What I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is:—

The combination with a sink; of a faucet having a port therethrough, the inlet end of said port being substantially parallel with the bottom of said sink, and the discharge end at an angle thereto other than a right angle, whereby the liquid from said faucet contacts with said sink so as to be deflected onto the back and bottom thereof.
