

NECKTIE-CASE.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Ferdinand G. Haas, a citizen of the United States, residing at Springfield, in the county of Greene and State of Missouri, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Necktie-Cases, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to improvements in hanging necktie cases the object of which is to provide a suitable support for the ties and on which the ties can easily be hung and then swung back in position for keeping them in shape and at the same time one from 15 which the ties can be quickly and easily taken. Said case also is provided with suitable space for collar, cuff and other buttons and a cushion for scarf and other pins. The case is provided with eyelets for hanging 20 the same on the wall and it can be neatly decorated as desired. These objects I attain by means of the device illustrated in the accompanying drawings forming a part of this specification in which.

Figure 1, is a view in elevation of the entire device open ready to receive the neckties. Fig. 2, is a similar view of the device closed. Fig. 3, is a longitudinal vertical section of the case on the line X X of Fig. 1.

30 Fig. 4, is a detail showing one of the eyelets

for hanging up the case.

Similar letters indicate corresponding

parts in the several figures.

A, is a box made any desired size and shape preferably made of two parts with suitable hinges B, and provided with any suitable catch D, for securely fastening the parts together. Each of the parts is provided with one or more hinged rods F, provided with eyelets E forming hinges for the rod and an extension F³ forming a handle for turning or swinging the rods out and in

the case as indicated by the dotted line F⁴ for placing the ties or removing them from the rod as desired. The rod is placed near 45 enough the upper side of the case so when the ties are placed upon it they will remain in position and cannot easily come off or work off of themselves by handling the box. Said box is also provided with eyelets C at 50 the upper back side of the box for supporting the same on nails or other suitable supports in the wall for hanging the same on the wall.

The front of the case M, may be suitably 55 decorated, engraved or otherwise ornamented as desired. In the lower part of the case may be made a pocket by means of a support H for holding collar, cuff and other buttons or small objects. In the center on one part 60 of the case may be placed a suitable cushion I for pins etc. For bowties a rod G may be placed near the lower part of the case for holding them in position. For this purpose one or more of these rods may be used.

Having thus described my invention what I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent of the United States is:

A necktie case comprising two box-like sections hinged vertically to each other to 70 permit one section to swing in a horizontal plane upon the other section, and tie receiving members each comprising a vertical arm and two horizontal arms, said vertical arm being hinged to one of the box sections, one 75 of the horizontal arms serving to receive ties and the other horizontal arm serving as a handle.
