




WEARING-APPAREL, SUCH AS COLLARS AND CUFFS.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Spencer M. Griffithis, a citizen of the United States, residing at Easton, county of Northampton, and State 5 of Pennsylvania, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Wearing-Apparel, such as Collars and Cuffs, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying 10 drawings, which form a part of this specification.

My invention relates to that class of wearing apparel known as collars and cuffs.

With lay down collars there is a tendency 15 of the collar to spread, which spreading at the top edge is especially disadvantageous in that it affects the appearance of the collar and causes discomfort to the wearer.

My invention has for its object to obviate 20 the defect and to produce a collar which will not spread in use.

My invention is also applicable to cuffs | in producing a close fit and preventing | what I claim and desire to protect by Letspreading. In fact, my invention is to pre-25 vent movement of the collar or cuff and in use maintain its position fixed. When used with a cuff, it has also the advantage of facilitating the fastening of the cuff in position. I accomplish this result by forming 30 in one end of the collar or cuff a projecting tongue and in the other end a slot. Preferably the tongue should be in the upper portion of the collar and the slot be inclined. Also the groove should be provided with an 35 inclined extension, preferably of the same

I will now describe the embodiment of my invention illustrated in the accompanying drawing, and then point out the inven-40 tion in the claims.

In the drawings: Figure 1 is a view of inside of collar on flat embodying my invention. -Fig. 2 is a front view of collar partially broken away in position of use. Fig. 45 3 is a perspective view of cuff embodying

my invention.

incline as the slot.

Speaking first of Figs. 1 and 2. α is a lay down collar having the ends b and c. In the end b is the regular button hole d. On the upper portion of b is a hook shaped tongue formed by a groove f and a tongue proper g. The edges of the hooked shaped tongue are stillhed. In the end c is formed the inclined slot h clined correspondingly

to the inclined portion i of the groove f. 55 After buttoning the collar upon the button, as in the ordinary manner, by turning the collar to allow the hook shaped tongue to be inserted in the slot h, and after passing therethrough again turning the collar to its 60 proper position, the hook shaped tongue will form a tight interlock with the upper end of slot h (see Fig. 2), thus preventing any movement apart of the ends of the collar.

When I use my improvement with cuffs, 65. as shown in Fig. 3, I preferably provide a button hole o in one end. of the cuff. On the other end, I provide a hook shaped tongue formed by a groove j. corresponding to the groove f of the collar, and a tongue proper k 70 corresponding to the tongue proper g of the collar. The other end of the cuff is provided with a slot *l* corresponding to the slot *h* of the collar. The interlocking is similar to that of the collar.

Having now fully described my invention,

ters Patent is:

1. An article of wearing apparel of the character described, provided with a button 80 hole for securing the article to a garment. and having, on one end, a hooked shaped tongue and in the other end a slot independent of the button hole, said hook shaped tongue being adapted to pass through said 85 slot and interlock therewith.

2. An article of wearing apparel of the character described, provided with a button hole for securing the article to a garment, and having on one end, a hook shaped tongue, 90 and in the other end an inclined slot independent of the button hole, said hook shaped tongue being adapted to pass through

said slot and interlock therewith.

3. An article of wearing apparel of the 95 character described, provided with a button hole for securing the article to a garment. and having, on one end, a hook shaped tongue having an inclined portion, and in the other end an inclined slot independent of the but- 100 ton hole, said hook shaped tongue being adapted to pass through said slot and interlock therewith.

4. An article of wearing apparel of the character described, provided with button 105 holes for securing the article to a garment in each end, a hook shaped tongue on one end, and a slot independent of the button holes

in the other end, said hook shaped tongue being adapted to pass through said slot and interlock therewith.

5. An article of wearing apparel of the character described, provided with button holes for securing the article to a garment in each end, a hook shaped tongue on the upper portion of one end, and a slot independent of the button holes in the other end, said hook shaped tongue being adapted to pass through said slot and interlock therewith.

6. An article of wearing apparel of the character described, provided with button holes for securing the article to a garment in each end, a hook shaped tongue on one end, and an inclined slot independent of the button holes in the other end, said hook shaped tongue being adapted to pass through said slot and interlock therewith.

7. An article of wearing apparel of the character described, provided with button holes for securing the article to a garment in each end, a hook shaped tongue on the upper portion of one end, and an inclined slot independent of the button holes in the other end, said hook shaped tongue being

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adapted to pass through said slot and interlock therewith.

8. An article of wearing apparel of the 30 character described, provided with button holes for securing the article to a garment in each end, a hook shaped tongue having an inclined portion on one end, and an inclined slot independent of the button holes in the 35 other end, said hook shaped tongue being adapted to pass through said slot and interlock therewith.

9. An article of wearing apparel of the character described, provided with button 40 holes for securing the article to a garment in each end, a hook shaped tongue, having an inclined portion on the upper portion of one end, and an inclined slot independent of the button holes in the other end, said hook 45 shaped tongue being adapted to pass through said slot and interlock therewith.
