

What I claim is:

1. A shirt, comprising a skirt having a plurality of vertically alined button-holes therein whereby the shirt may be attached and adjusted to a nether garment as set forth.

2. A shirt comprising a bosom, and a skirt having a reinforced portion, said re-

inforced portion having vertically alined button-holes therein whereby the shirt may be attached and adjusted to a nether garment as set forth.
