

LADY'S DRESSING-SACK.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Louis Nathan, a citizen of the United States of America, and a resident of Chicago, in the county of Cook 5 and State of Illinois, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Ladies' Dressing-Sacks, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to ladies' garments 10 and more especially to that class of such garments known as dressing sacks, and has for its object to provide a simple and efficient structural arrangement and combination of parts whereby the garment is made 15 to adapt itself to the wants of persons of a

different size in any easy uniform and symmetrical manner, all as will hereinafter more

fully appear.

In the accompanying drawings:-Figure 20 1, is a perspective view of a lady's dressing sack to which the present improvement is applied. Fig. 2, is a horizontal section through the waist portion of the garment showing the same in an extended condition 25 during the process of manufacture. Fig. 3, is a similar view in a finished and normally contracted condition. Fig. 4, is an enlarged detail section of one end of such portion of the garment. Fig. 5, is an enlarged detail 30 vertical section on line x-x Fig. 1.

Referring to the drawings, 1 represents the body portion of a lady's dressing sack of 35 any usual pattern, and which in the present improvement has its waist portion provided with a pocket or casing 2 formed by a strip of fabric 3, secured to the waist of the garment, and preferably to the outside of the 40 same, by two separate rows 4 and 5 of and when released from the taut condition stitches running parallel to each other as above described, the garment will assume shown.

at or near its midlength to the central back portion of the garment by a row 8 of stitches 50 or other equivalent fastening means, while its respective ends extend and are attached to the edges of the front seams of the garment in immediate adjacent relation to the buckle members 9 and 10 by means of which 55 the waist portion of the garment is secured around the waist of the wearer.

The useful features of the present improvement are as follows: First, the elastic band 7 is held from any creeping in the 60 pocket casing 2, and in consequence is always in proper position; second, the stress of the elastic band to hold the garment to the waist of the wearer is uniform all around the wearer's waist, and in consequence a 65 snug fit is attained without any undue strain at any particular spot; third, the shirring or puckering folds in the strip of fabric 3. forming the pocket or casing 2, as well as the adjacent portions of the garment are 70 given a uniform size and appearance due to the even contraction of the two independent portions of the elastic fabric 7, and which independence is attained by the row of stitches 8 heretofore described.

In the present invention the waist portion of the garment as well as the pocket forming strip 3 and wear strip 6, are drawn taut; as illustrated in Fig. 2, while the elastic band 7 is stretched to the required 80 limit to produce the required puckering folds or shirring of the parts when released.

While in the above described condition the operations of effecting the rows 4, 5 and 8 of stitches, as well as the attachment of the 85 ends of the elastic band to the front seams of the garment, are performed, after which a normal condition ready for use.

to said body portion, a wear strip attached to the opposite side of said body portion, a single band of elastic arranged in said pocket and stitched midway its length to the central back portion of the waist and at its ends to the front seams of the garment adjacent to the fastening parts of the same and suitable buckle members for securing

the front of the garment, substantially as set forth.
