

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## DOLL.

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To all whom it may concern:

Gibson, a citizen of the United States, re- | formation which forms (see Figs. 4 and 5) 5 and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Dolls, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to that class of toy figures which are formed by sewing together 10 pieces of cloth bearing pictured representations of the component parts of the outer aspect of the head and of the body covering of an animate object, and then stuffing the sacklike formation with some suitable material. 15 In these toy figures the stuffing is necessarily carried to the bottom margin of the cloth formation, and when the lower section of the formation bears a pictured representation of a dress skirt design the skirt designs forms 20 a part of the sack which holds the stuffing.

The object of my invention is to provide a construction by which the skirt design is not included in the sack-like formation but

left to hang loosely from the latter.

The invention consists of certain parts and details and combinations of the same, as will be fully described hereinafter and then pointed out in the claims.

In the drawings, Figure 1 is a front view 30 of the doll. Fig. 2 is a rear view of the same. Fig. 3 is a side view of the same. Fig. 4 is a view of a vertical section of the doll on the line X—X of Fig. 2, but does not show a leg. Fig. 5 is a view of a vertical section of the 35 doll on the line X'—X' of Fig. 2. Fig. 6 is a view of the inner surface of the back-forming piece of cloth. Fig. 7 is a view of the inner surface of the front-forming piece of cloth, and Fig. 8 is a perspective view from

40 the front of a fragment of the doll.

A represents the front-forming piece of cloth, and B the back-forming piece of cloth, which are sewed together along their top and side margins to form a part of the doll. The 45 said piece A bears on its outer surface a pictured representation of a face A' (Fig. 1), torso coverings A<sup>2</sup>, and the front section A<sup>3</sup> of a skirt design; and the said piece B bears on its outer surface a pictured representation 50 of the back covering of a head B', torso coverings B<sup>2</sup>, and the back section B<sup>3</sup> of a skirt design.

C, Fig. 6, and D, Fig. 7, are pieces of cloth which are secured (by stitching or by means 55 of glue) along their upper margins to the inside surfaces of the pieces B and A respec-

tively, to form when sewed together along Be it known that I, Edward Tinkham | their side margins as in Fig. 8 a tubular siding at Brooklyn, in the county of Kings | with the portions of the said front-forming 60 and back-forming pieces which are above the line of attachment of the said pieces C and D to the said pieces A and B a sack-like formation for holding stuffing material E; and the lower end of the said tubular forma- 65 tion is adapted to be closed, by means of stitching, as in Figs. 4, 5, and 1, to retain the stuffing in the sack-like formation.

> By this construction the object of the invention is accomplished and the skirt de- 70 sign hangs loosely from the sack-like forma-

tion.

To the lower end of the closed sack-like formation the doll's legs F and F' are attached.

In this specification I employ the words "front-forming piece of cloth," and "backforming piece of cloth" to designate parts which respectively form the front and back sections of a part of the doll, and while each 80 of these last mentioned sections is preferably formed from a single piece of cloth it must be understood that the front-forming piece of cloth mentioned in this specification and in the claims may be formed by 85 sewing together two or more pieces of cloth, and that the back-forming piece of cloth mentioned in this specification and in the claims may be formed in the same way.

Having thus described my invention what 90 I claim as new, and desire to secure by Let-

ters Patent, is—

1. A doll comprising a front-forming piece of cloth and a back-forming piece of cloth stitched together at their top and side <sup>95</sup> margins, and a tubular formation of cloth attached to the inside surfaces of said frontforming and back-forming pieces; said front-forming piece of cloth bearing pictured representations of torso coverings and 100 the front section of a skirt design, and said back-forming piece of cloth bearing pictured representations of torso coverings and the back section of a skirt design, the said tubular formation being adapted to be closed 105 to prevent the exit downward of stuffing material placed between the said front-forming and back-forming pieces of cloth.

2. In a doll comprising a front-forming piece of cloth having a thoracic or chest por- 110 tion, a waist portion, and a skirt portion, and also comprising a back-forming piece

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of cloth having a thoracic or chest portion, a waist portion, and a skirt portion, the said pieces of cloth being stitched together at their side margins, a cloth device attached to the inner surfaces of said pieces of cloth adjacent to the upper margins of their said skirt portions and adapted to be closed to

prevent the exit downward of stuffing material placed between the said front-forming and back-forming pieces of cloth.
