

The upper tray is provided with a bottom 68, a rear wall 70, a side wall 72, and an opposite side wall consisting of the two offset portions 74 and 76 adapted to lie directly above the partitions 42 and 44, 20 respectively, of the lower tray. The upper tray is also provided with a front wall 78 which is extended downwardly as best shown in Fig. 6 so that its lower end is flush with the bottom of the case. This wall member, 25 therefore, constitutes the front of the case, and when the upper tray is pulled partway out, it constitutes a foot member for supporting the front end of this tray. The upper end of the wall 78 is cut away on its 30 front edge as indicated at 79 to receive the flange 36 previously referred to as depending from the cover and which holds the upper tray in the box when the cover is in its closed position. The upper tray is pro-35 vided with partitions 80, 82, 84, and 86 which divide it into compartments 88, 90, 92, 94 and 96. The compartment 88 is adapted to receive jars of nail polish, rouge, and the like. The compartment 90 is adapt-40 ed to receive a manicure outfit. The compartments 92 and 94 are adapted to receive tubes of tooth paste and cold cream, and the compartment 96 is adapted to receive hairpins, small scissors, and other small 45 toilet articles. In order to guide the upper tray in its sliding movement, a post 98 is shown secured to the partitions 48, and 44 at their intersection, and extending slightly above the lower tray. As shown in the 50 drawings, the top, bottom and rear of the sides 14 and 16 are provided with outstanding flanges and the ends of the wall member 78 are also provided with similar flanges whereby the sides 14 and 16 are 55 given a paneled appearance.

The operation and advantages of my invention will be apparent from the foregoing description. Upon removing the cover the various articles in the upper tray are at once 60 available for use as are also the brush and comb carried in the lower tray. Upon pulling the upper tray forwardly, the remainder of the articles in the lower tray are rendered readily accessible. It is not necessary to 65 entirely remove the upper tray but its rear

When 80 the device is to be carried or stored, the upper tray is slid into place and upon replacing the cover the latter is held in place by the spring-pressed pin 32 while the flange 36 on the cover holds the slidable tray in place. 85 The walls of the box portion may be made of any suitable material and the trays with their partitions are made of light material such as enameled wood or aluminum.

I claim: 1. A toilet case comprising a box, a sliding cover for said box having tongues adapted to slide in grooves extending along the upper sides of said box, and a mirror secured on the inner side of said cover, the 95 sides of said box having upwardly extending grooves adapted to receive said tongues for holding said cover with its mirror positioned for use.

2. A toilet case comprising a box, a sta- 100 tionary tray provided with compartments in the bottom of said box, and a slidable tray provided with compartments and adapted to slide over said stationary tray, said slidable tray being narrower than 105 said stationary tray whereby some of the compartments of the latter extend up for the full height of the case.

3. A toilet case comprising a box, a stationary tray having compartments in the 110 bottom of said box, two of said compartments being shaped to receive a comb and a brush, and a slidable tray provided with compartments and adapted to slide over said stationary tray, said slidable tray being 115 shaped in such manner as to leave said brush and comb compartments uncovered.

4. A toilet case comprising a box, a stationary tray provided with compartments in the bottom of said box, a slidable tray 120 provided with compartments and adapted to slide over said stationary tray and a front wall member for said slidable tray which constitutes the front member of the box and which serves to support the front 125 end of said slidable tray when the latter is partly withdrawn.

5. A toilet case comprising a box, a cover for said box, means for holding said cover in closed position, a stationary tray provided 130
