

which, in other words, are those upon which knitting operations upon one and the same next proceeds upon the remaining portion

of the needles which are arranged in two groups, substantially comprising the same number of needles, but separated by a gap produced by the withdrawn needles herein-5 before referred to.

To better understand the arrangement of the needles at this point, let it be assumed that there are three hundred needles in the entire machine, one hundred of which rep-10 resent the instep needles and comprise the group 13 (see Fig. 3), which at this point in the operation are withdrawn from action retaining their loops, another hundred of said needles represent the needles upon 15 which the fabric constituting the toe pocket is to be formed and these needles are separated into two groups 14 and 15, of say fifty needles each, by a third group 16 of one hundred needles, which latter group was 20 withdrawn at the start of the knitting operations.

Reciprocating knitting now continues upon the groups 14 and 15 to effect the usual narrowing and widening operations neces-25 sary to produce the toe pocket 3, which narrowing and widening operations include the gradual withdrawal of needles from opposite ends of the series, until the required number have been withdrawn, and subseso quently restoring said needles in a reverse order to unite the courses previously formed be the narrowing operation. Owing to the separation of the toe pocket needles into two groups by the needles 16, said toe pocket 35 will be formed in two sections separated by a gap corresponding to the withdrawn group of needles 16, said gap being spanned by floating yarns 18.

Following the knitting of the last widening course of said toe pocket, the needles of the group 13 are restored to action and circular knitting proceeds upon all the necdies except those of the group 16, thus forming the fabric of the foot 2 between the toe and heel pockets 3 and 4 respectively. Upon completion, the last circular course of the foot prior to the first narrowing course of said beel pocket, the instep needles 13 are 50 their loops, and reciprocating knitting is effected upon the groups 14 and 15 to produce and heel pocket 4, the needles of said groups being first gradually reduced in numher during said knitting and subsequently 55 increased in reverse order to form the narrowing and widening courses, each including a floating yarn 19, which spans the gap produced by the withdrawal of the needles 16.

The instep needles 13 are again restored 60 to action and circular knitting follows for a certain number of courses to produce the ankle portion 5 of the stocking, the courses of loops composing said ankle portion being less than a complete circle and having oppo-65 site ends thereof connected by floating yarns

20, which span the gap produced by reason of the inaction of the needles 16.

The gap spanned by the floating yarns 12, 18, 19, 20, and likewise those intervening between the yarns 18 and 19, extends along 70 the center of the bottom of the foot and up the center of the back of said ankle.

Following the completion of the ankle portion 5 of said stocking, the fashioned calf 6 is next knitted, and preferably upon 76 gradually increasing series of needles,-that is to say, the needles of the group 16 during the formation of said fashioned calf, are gradually restored to action at opposite ends of the interrupted circular series of needles 80 including the groups 13, 14 and 15, said needles 16 being operated automatically and at the desired intervals to effect the desired angle of increase for said fashioned calf, opposite sides of said calf being preferably 85 symmetrically shaped during said knitting operations, which operations continue until all the needles of the group 16 have been restored.

As a result of the gradual restoration of 90 said needles 16, the floating varns 21, spanning the gap at the back of said calf, will gradually decrease in length as they approach the upper end of said calf until they finally merge in the tubular leg portion 7, 55 which is knitted herein subsequently to the knitting of the calf 6, said tubular leg having no seam or gap formed therein, it being knitted upon a full or complete circle of needles including the groups 13, 14, 15 100 and 16:

Following the completion of said tubular leg 7, the stocking may be removed from the machine or knitting may continue upon the machine to repeat the above-described op- 106 erations and thereby knit a second or a series of similar blanks.

To complete the stocking from the blank hereinbefore described, the floating yarns spanning the gap along the center of the 110 foot and up the center of the back are severed and corresponding edges of the various sections are then stitched together to form a again withdrawn from action retaining seam 9 extending from the tip 10 of the toe or from the seam 8 along the center of the 115 toe pocket, center of the foot and heel pocket, up the center at the back of the ankle 5 and the center of the calf 6 to the top of said calf or, if desired, said seaming operations may be continued to the top of the stocking 120 and thereby effect the formation of a mock seam as shown at 22. Furthermore, the protective courses 12 are raveled back and the first course of the heel pocket is stitched to the first course of the instep portion of the 126 stocking to form the seam 8 across the top of the toe.
