


A brush comprising a substantially cylin-5 drical handle flared outwards near its lower end and provided with a frusto-conical chamber in said lower end, and a body portion composed of a number of wisps of

gripped near their upper ends in a paper 10 band, said band and enclosed wisps forming a tapered head for said brush adapted to fit snugly and removably in said frusto-conical chamber in the handle.
