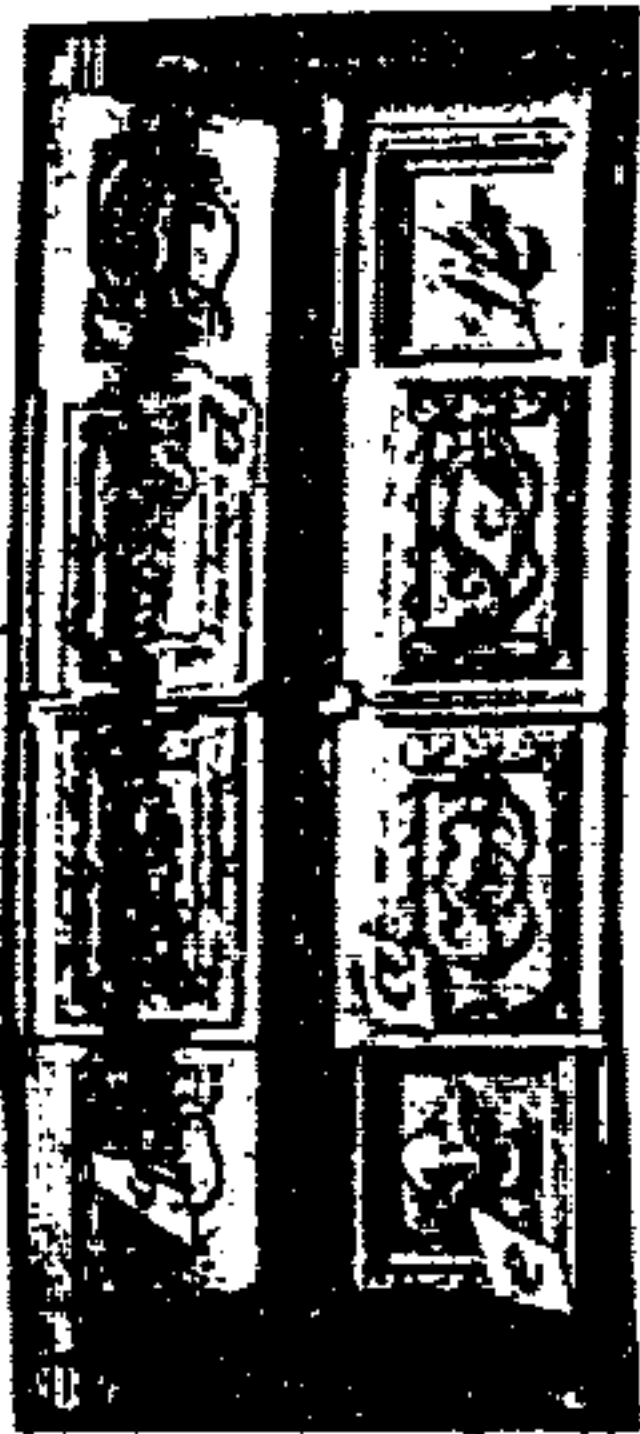

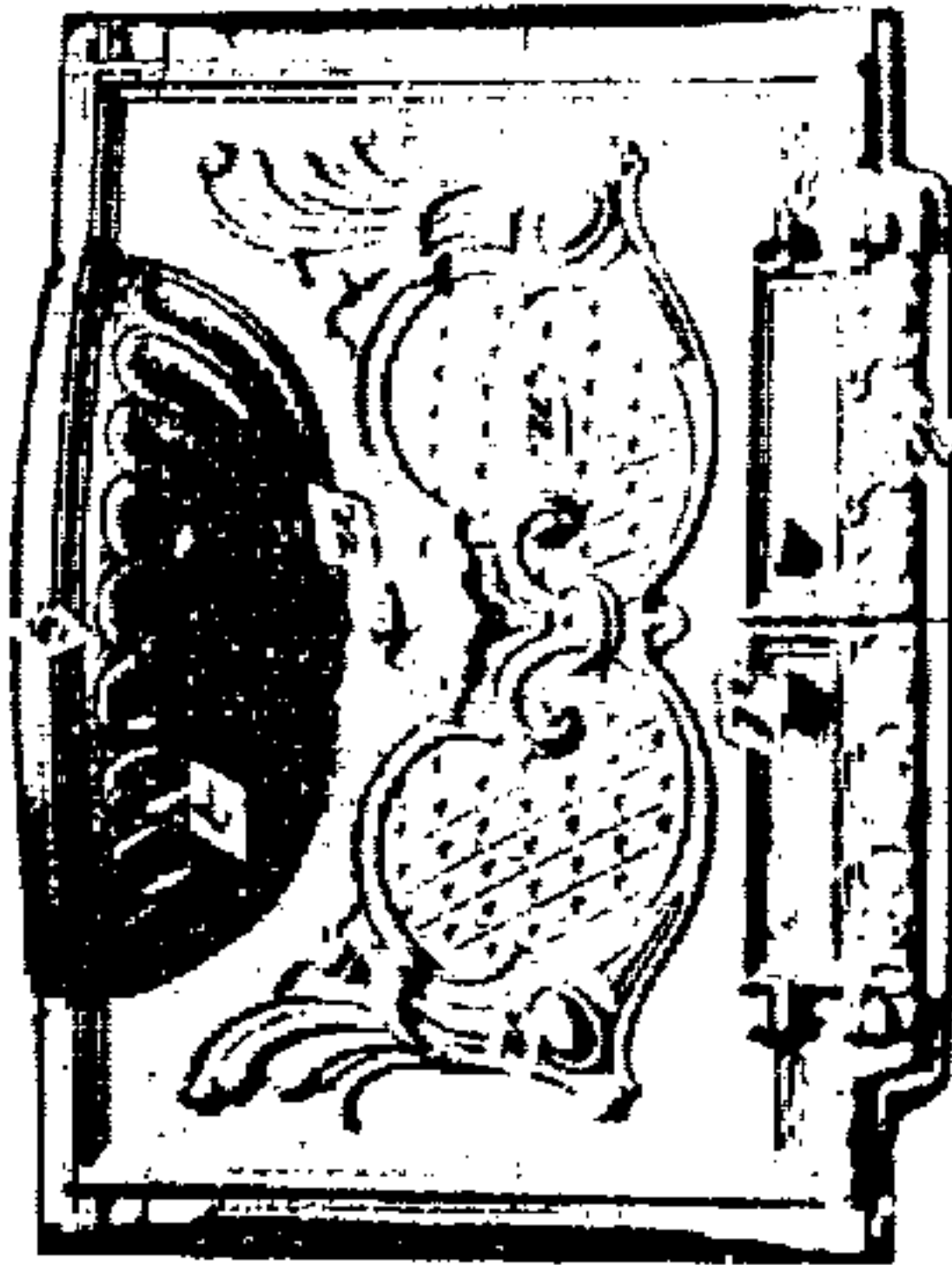
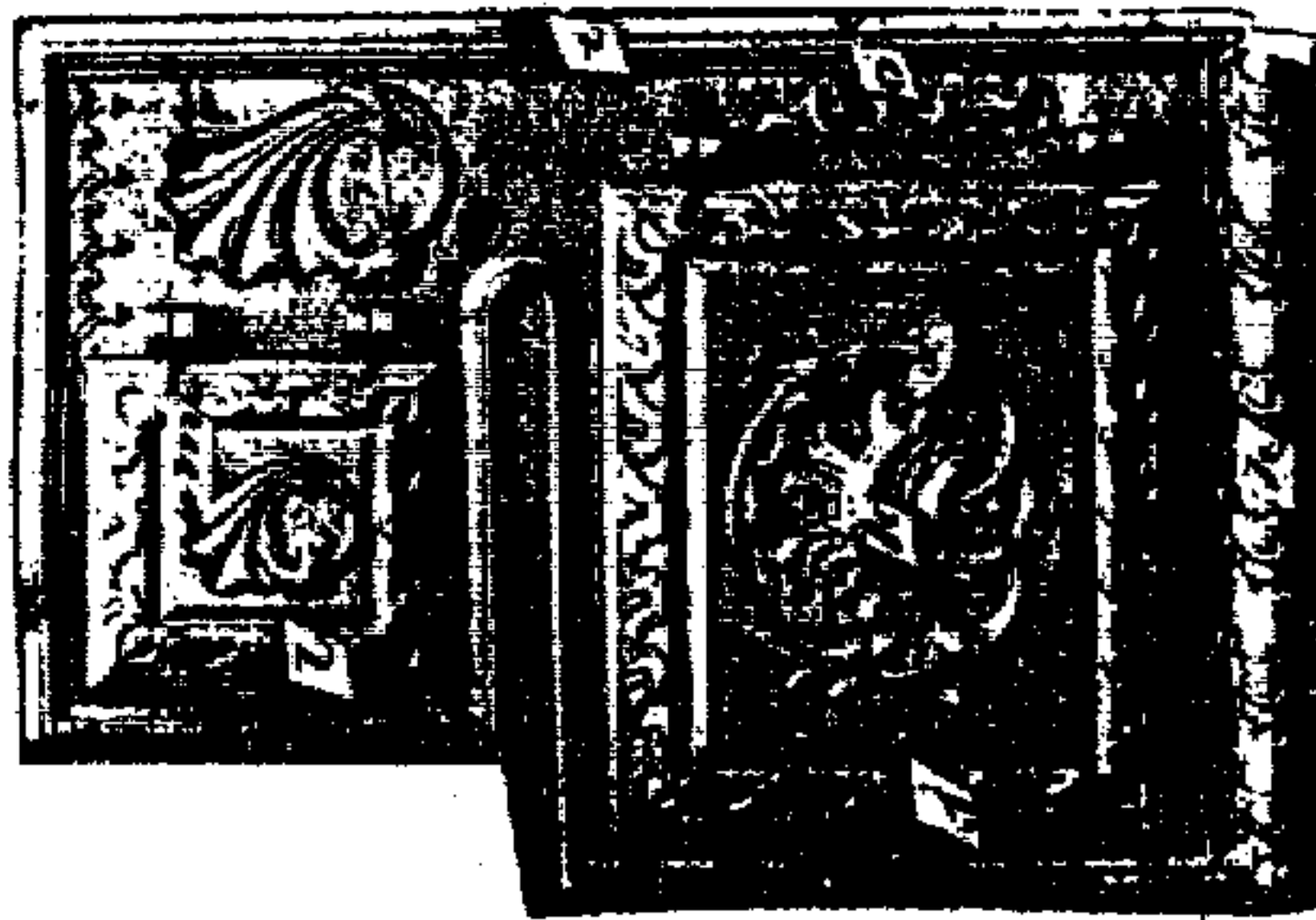
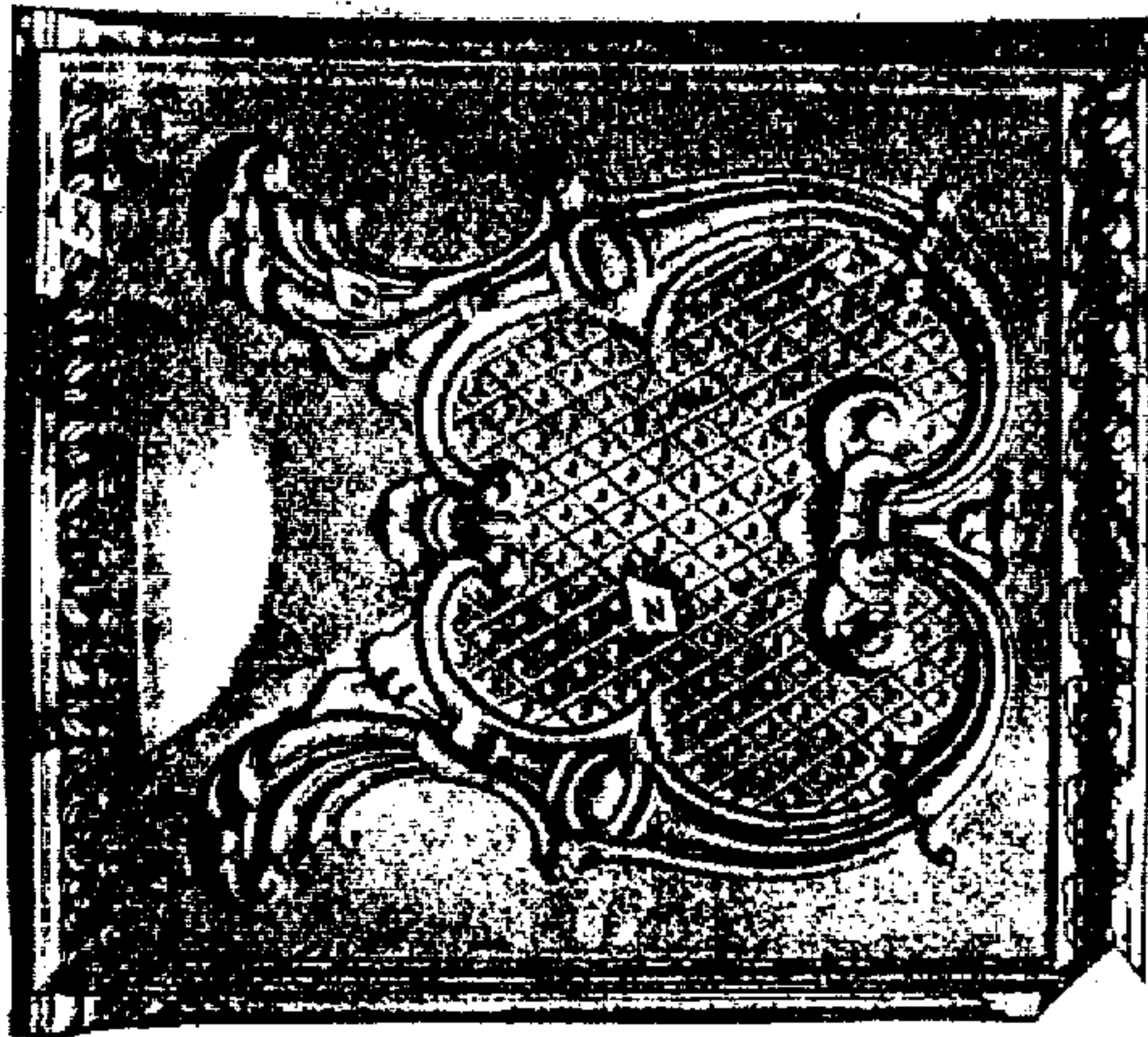

Letters Patent No. 1566, dated April, 15, 1862.

The schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Walter W. Stanard, of the City
of Buffalo, County of Erie, and State of New York, assignor to Sherman

S. Jewell and Francis W. Root, firm of Jewell & Root, of the same place, have invented or produced a certain new and original ornamental design for Cooking Stoves, which I denominate "Peerless", and I do hereby declare that the following is a full and clear description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying photographic plates and the letters of reference marked thereon, in which

Fig. 1, represents the upper front plate with doors,

Fig. 2, the side plate with doors,

Fig. 3, the lower front plate with doors, and

Fig. 4, the back plate.

The upper front plate Fig. 1, is furnished with two sets of sliding doors. The lower doors are rectangular in form, and are paneled by carved mouldings a. The panels are filled in with carved or embossed scrolls c.

The upper doors are also rectangular in form, but have a curved or "ogee" surface, and are also paneled by a carved or embossed border d, the panels containing the name "Peerless" in embossed letters one half on each door as represented.

e, are panels formed in the jambs at the sides of the lower doors, with embossed ornaments f, in their centre.

g, are sunken scrolls in the jambs at the sides of the upper doors.

The side plate Fig. 2, has an ogee moulding at the bottom with embossed carvings h, and plain mouldings i, at the sides and top and between the doors as represented.

The oven door is surrounded by a carved and plain moulding j, and its panel has a highly ornamented embossed scroll carving k, as represented. The upper or fire door l, is surrounded by a similar carved and plain moulding to the oven door, and its panel has also an embossed ornament m. A similar embossed ornament n, is placed on the plate adjacent to the door and a carved ornament o, back of the oven door. The opposite side plate is the same in all respects.

The lower front, Fig. 3, has two small doors p, at

its bottom, with plain panels and a wide carved "ogee" moulding *y*, similar to that at the bottom of the side plate Fig. 2.

x, are plain bead mouldings at the sides and top.
z, is a partially spherical projection with flutings *t*, radiating from the central ornament *u*;

v, are embossed scroll carvings disposed as represented in the plate and enclosing a surface of diamond shaped reticulations and dots *w*.

The back plate, Fig. 4, has a wide ogee moulding at its bottom similar to that at the bottom of the lower front, and side plates, with plain mouldings at its side and top. At the top is also a moulding *x*, with points and drops as represented, *y*, represents embossed carvings and scrolls disposed symmetrically as represented and enclosing a surface of diamond shaped reticulations and dots *z*, similar to those of Fig. 3. The details of the configuration of the various ornaments described and their exact disposition is fully shown in the plates.

I claim the combination and arrangement of the ornamental devices for the decoration of the plates of a cooking stove herein described and represented in each of the accompanying photographic plates, Figs. 1, 2, 3 & 4.
