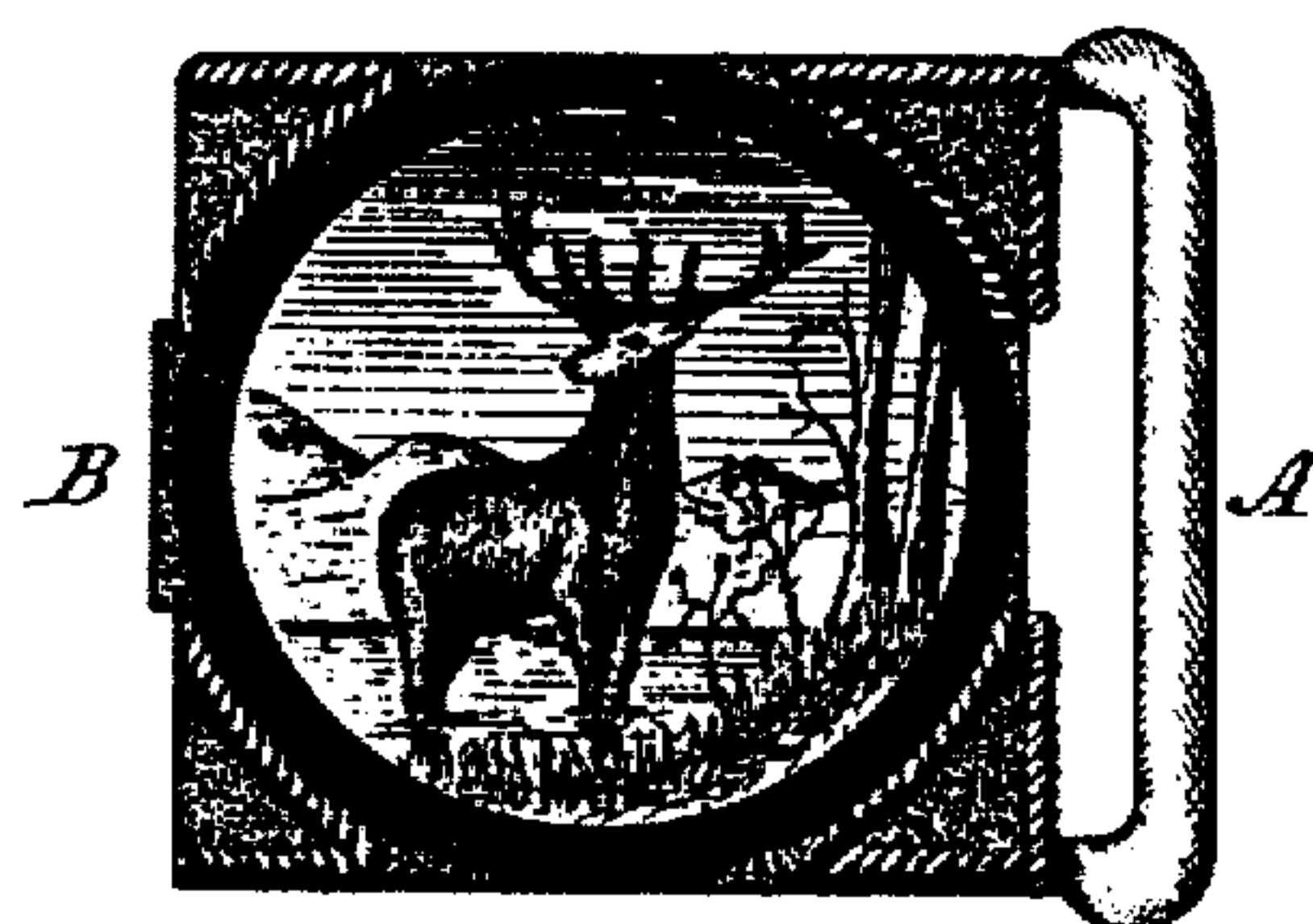

DESIGN FOR BELT-BUCKLE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **6,873**, dated September 2, 1873; application filed June 4, 1873.
[Term of Patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN E. SMITH, of Waterbury, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Design for Belt-Buckle; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawing and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawing constitutes part of this specification, and represents a front view.

This invention relates to a design for belt hook or buckle; and it consists in the ornamentation of the plate, as shown in the accompanying illustration, and as hereinafter described.

The plate proper is, preferably, square, with a loop, A, at one side, and hook B at the other. Upon this plate a circular band is formed, and within this stands the figure of a deer, with hills in the distance, all substantially as shown in the accompanying illustration.

I claim as my invention—

The design for buckle-plate, as herein described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
