

Specimen for Burial Cases 1874





DESIGN FOR BURIAL-CASES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **7,233**, dated March 10, 1874; application filed January 17, 1874.
[Term of Patent 3½ years]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, GABRIEL ALBIN and JOSEPH P. ALBIN, of Cincinnati, in the county of Hamilton and in the State of Ohio, have invented a new and original Design for Burial-Cases; and do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawing making a part of this specification.

Our design consists, generally, in the form of the case, which, as shown, is round at its ends, flares outward from its lower side upward, and has a raised or dome-shaped cover, that is slightly higher at its longitudinal center than at its ends. It also has a long panel upon each side of the case, which at each end is separated by a rail from the curved panel of the case end, while upon the raised portion of the lid of said case are formed two panels,

one of which, at the head end of said case, is detachable. From said panels said cover extends downward and outward in a series of curves, which together form a heavy molding, that extends to the projecting edge of the cover.

Having thus fully set forth the nature and merits of our invention, what we claim as new is—

The design for a burial-case, substantially as shown and described.
