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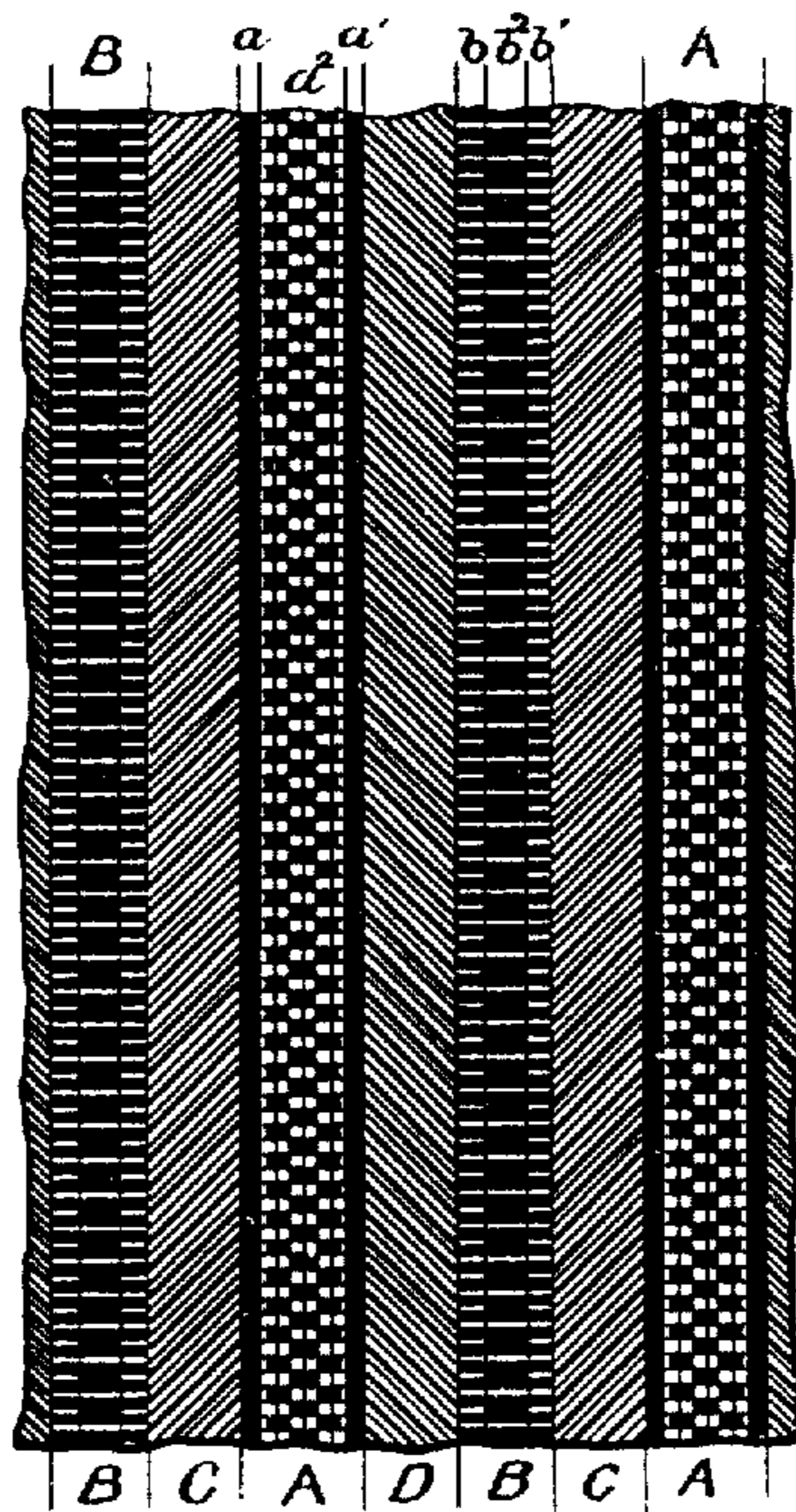

ROBERT SCOTT AND AARON JEWELL, OF LAWRENCE, MASSACHUSETTS.

## DESIGN FOR FANCY WORSTED OR WOOLEN FABRICS.

Specification forming part of Design No. **9,654**, dated November 21, 1876; application filed November 9, 1876.  
[Term of Patent 7 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that we, ROBERT SCOTT and AARON JEWELL, both of Lawrence, in the county of Essex and State of Massachusetts, have invented a new Design for Fancy Worsted or Woolen Fabrics; and we do hereby declare that the following specification, taken in connection with the drawing making a part of the same, is a full, clear, and exact description.

The effect of our novel design will be apparent from an inspection of the accompanying drawing, to which reference is made, said effect being produced by the combination of peculiarly-woven longitudinal stripes, as hereinafter described.

The stripe A is composed of three members, the outer members,  $a a^1$ , being narrow corded lines, and the inner member,  $a^2$ , being made up of three longitudinal lines of short narrow cross-bars, the bars in either line being separated from each other by narrow spaces of plain weaving, and the bars of one line are arranged opposite the spaces of the

adjacent line. The stripe B is also composed of three members, the outer members,  $b b^1$ , being a succession of narrow cross-bars, and the inner member,  $b^2$ , a succession of heavy cross-bars. These stripes A and B are in alternation, as shown, with diagonally-shaded stripes C D, the direction of the shade-lines of C being at right angles to those of D.

The fabric may be woven in any preferred variety or combinations of colors for giving effect to the design above described, the characteristic feature of which is a stripe, A, composed of cross-bars and corded lines in alternation, with a barred stripe, B, and diagonally-shaded stripes C and D, as shown.

What we claim is—

The design for fancy worsted or woolen fabrics, substantially as herein described, and represented in the drawing.
