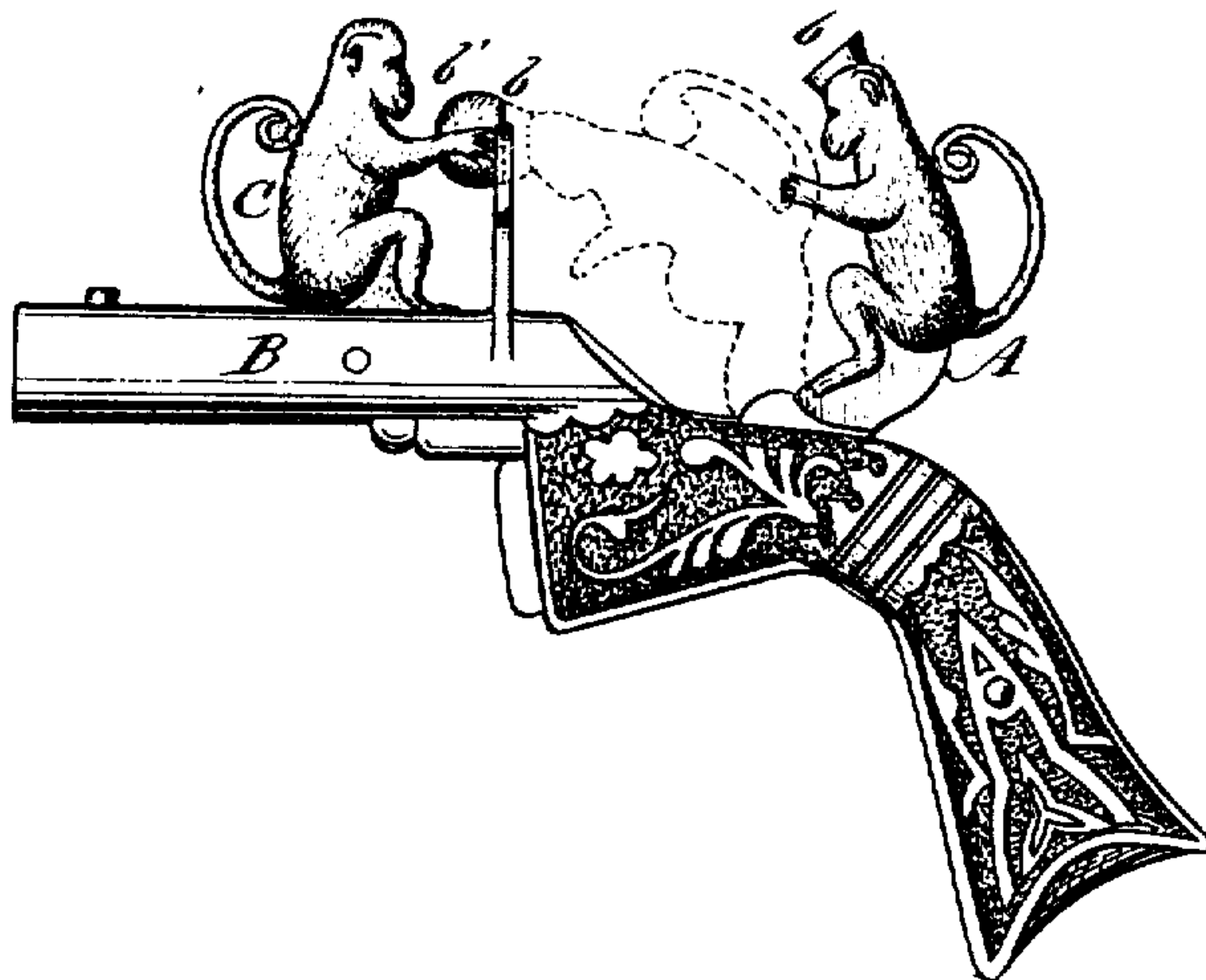

## DESIGN FOR A PAPER-CAP OR TOY PISTOL.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 12,789, dated February 21, 1882.

Application filed January 24, 1882. Term of patent 7 years.

*To all whom it may concern :*

Be it known that I, HENRY S. LOCKWOOD, of South Norwalk, Fairfield county, Connecticut, have invented a new and Improved Design for  
5 Paper-Cap or Toy Pistol, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, forming part of this specification.

A represents the portion which corresponds  
10 with the hammer of the pistol, and B the barrel thereof. The hammerportion A is of ornamental configuration, the same representing the figure of a monkey in a sitting posture with the section *b* of a cocoanut on his head.

15 C is the hammer-block, also of ornamental configuration, and representing the figure of a monkey sitting on the barrel B and holding in his paws the remaining section, *b'*, of the cocoanut. When the hammer is down against the  
20 block the two ornamental figures represent a monkey perched upon the barrel holding a cocoanut in his paws, and as pressing or bearing it against the head of another monkey, represented by dotted lines in the drawing.

Having thus described my invention, I claim 25 as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

1. The ornamental configuration of the hammer of the pistol, the same representing a monkey in a sitting posture with the section of a  
30 cocoanut on his head, substantially as herein shown and described.

2. The ornamental configuration of the hammer-block of the pistol, as herein described, and shown in the drawing, the same representing a monkey in a sitting posture with the  
35 section of a cocoanut in his paws.

3. The combined ornamental configuration of the hammer and hammer-block of the pistol, the same representing a monkey in a sitting posture holding a cocoanut in his paws, and as  
40 pressing or bearing it against the head of another monkey, as herein described and shown by full and dotted lines in the drawing.
