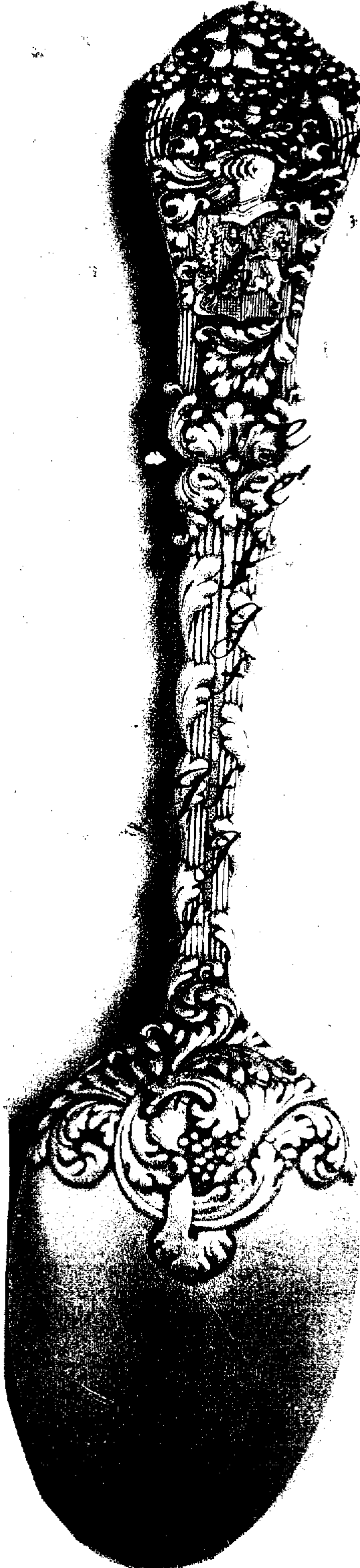

DESIGN FOR A SPOON.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 15,675, dated December 30, 1884.

Application filed October 14, 1884. Term of patent 14 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES T. GROSJEAN, a citizen of the United States, residing in the city, county, and State of New York, have
5 invented and produced a new and original Design for Spoons or other Articles of Table-Service, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, forming part thereof.

10 The features of novelty of this design of spoon-handle consist, first, in a paddle-shaped handle, as shown and described, containing in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll; second, in a pad-
15 dle-shaped handle, as shown and described, containing in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, and a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls; third, in a paddle-shaped
20 handle, as shown and described, containing in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, with a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls, and a vase filled with flowers placed
25 beneath the basket; fourth, in a paddle-shaped handle, as shown and described, containing in the head thereof a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, with a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls, a vase
30 filled with flowers placed beneath the basket, and double leaves at the top of the shank; fifth, in a paddle-shaped handle, as shown and described, containing in the head thereof a threaded molding on each side, terminating
35 in a scroll, with a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls, a vase filled with flowers placed beneath the basket, double leaves at the top of the shank, and the shank containing threaded moldings, having leaves
40 folding over it alternately on either side; sixth, in a paddle-shaped handle, as shown and described, having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls and inclosing a coat of arms; seventh,
45 in a paddle-shaped handle, as shown and described, having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls inclosing a coat of arms, with leaves at the commencement of the shank; eighth,

in a paddle-shaped handle, as shown and de- 50
scribed, having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls inclosing a coat of arms, with leaves at the commencement of the shank, and a shank containing threaded moldings having leaves 55
folding over it alternately on either side; ninth, in a paddle-shaped handle, as shown and described, having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls inclosing a coat of arms with double 60
leaves at the commencement of the shank, a shank containing threaded moldings, having leaves folding over it alternately on either side, and floriated ornaments forming the letters C V on the portion of the spoon or fork 65
handle below the shank. The general form is of a paddle-shaped handle broken by a double leaf between the head and the shank. On the front surface there is a threaded molding extending up on either side to the head, and 70
ending in a scroll. Between these scrolls on the head is a basket filled with fruit and flowers. On the panel between these threaded moldings, and beneath the basket filled with fruit and flowers, is a vase filled with flowers, 75
all these features being in relief. From the lower half-leaf at the commencement of the shank there extends along each side of the shank a threaded molding to point where the shank widens into the bowl of the spoon. This 80
molding is inclosed with the leaf folding over it alternately on either side. All these features are also in relief. The back of the spoon corresponds with the front, except that there is no basket on the face, the panel between 85
the threaded moldings being filled with a family coat of arms or crest; and the shank extends to the rounded part of the bowl of the spoon, with floriated ornaments in monogram style of the family initials "C V." 90

In the drawings, Figure 1 is a view of the front surface of a spoon-handle and its bowl on which is placed my design. Fig. 2 is a view of the reverse surface or back thereof.

a a are threaded moldings on the head. *bb* 95
are scrolls in which said moldings terminate.
c represents a basket, placed between the scrolls, filled with fruit and flowers.

d represents a vase filled with flowers placed on the panel between the said threaded moldings beneath the basket.

e e' are double leaves placed between the head and shank of the spoon.

f f, &c., are threaded moldings running down the sides of the shank.

g g, &c., are leaves folding over such threaded moldings alternately on each side.

h is a coat of arms placed on the panel between the threaded moldings on the rear surface of the handle, instead of a basket and vase filled with flowers.

i are floriated ornaments on the rounded part of the spoon.

I claim—

1. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and containing in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, as shown and described.

2. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and containing in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, and a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls, as shown and described.

3. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and containing in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, with a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls, and a vase filled with flowers placed beneath the basket, as shown and described.

4. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and containing in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, with a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls, a vase filled with flowers placed beneath the basket, and double leaves at the top of the shank, as shown and described.

5. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and con-

taining in the head thereof, on each side, a threaded molding terminating in a scroll, with a basket filled with fruit and flowers placed between the scrolls, a vase filled with flowers placed beneath the basket, double leaves at the top of the shank, and the shank containing threaded moldings having leaves folding over it alternately on either side, as shown and described.

6. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls inclosing a coat of arms, as shown and described.

7. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls inclosing a coat of arms, with double leaves at the commencement of the shank, as shown and described.

8. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls inclosing a coat of arms, with double leaves at the commencement of the shank, and a shank containing threaded moldings having leaves folding over it alternately on either side, as shown and described.

9. In a design for a spoon, the handle consisting of a paddle shape, as shown, and having on the reverse side of the head of said handle threaded moldings terminating in scrolls inclosing a coat of arms, with double leaves at the commencement of the shank, a shank containing threaded moldings having leaves folding over it alternately on either side, and floriated ornaments resembling the letters C V, as shown and described.
