DESIGN FOR A RUG.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 16,155, dated July 7, 1885.

Application filed May 25, 1885. Term of patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ADOLPH PETZOLD, a citizen of the United States, residing at Philadelphia, in the county of Philadelphia and State of Pennsylvania, have invented and produced a new and original Design for a Rug; and I do hereby declare that the photographic print accompanying this specification conveys to any one skilled in the art a clear understanding of the same, and is sufficient to enable such persons to use my invention.

The leading features of my design consist in a triple-panel center. The middle panel, A, is in form of an oval, which is represented to show groups of foliated ornamentation surrounded by an ornamental border, B. The end panels are formed at each end of the oval by an ornamental scroll of peculiar design, as

figure at the end of the oval. At each side of the oval is shown, and partially shown at the ends, an ornamental border, C. The whole is surrounded by a narrow border, D, as shown in the photographic print accompanying this specification.

The photographic print illustrates and represents one half of the design or rug. The other half described, but not shown, is exactly like it.

What I claim as my invention is —

The design for a rug, consisting of a triple panel center, the center panel in form of an oval, the end panels in form of a scroll, and ornamental borders, as shown and described.
