

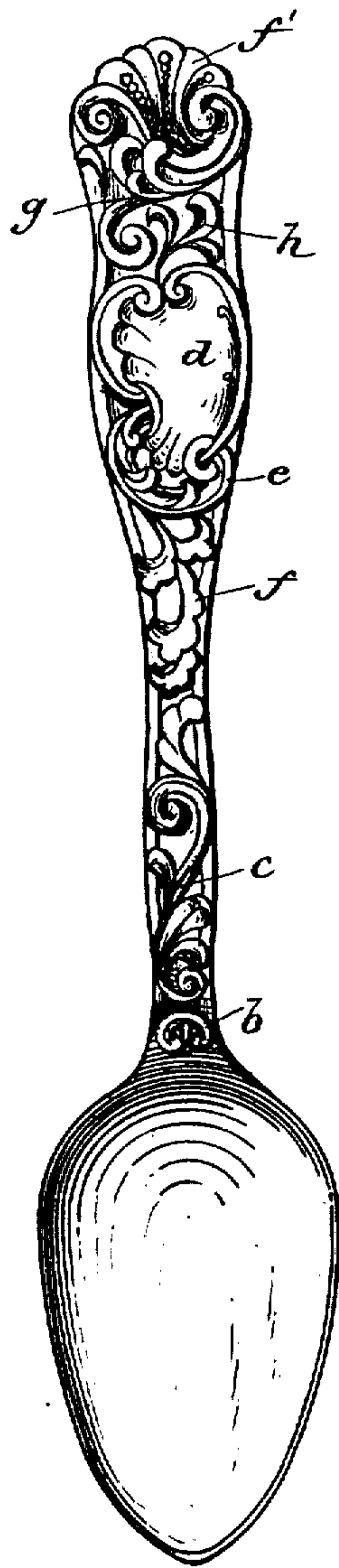

## DESIGN FOR A SPOON, &c.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 19,184, dated June 25, 1889.

Application filed May 27, 1889. Serial No. 312,302. Term of patent 7 years.

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, GEORGE P. TILTON, a citizen of the United States, residing at Newburyport, in the county of Essex and State of Massachusetts, have invented and produced  
5 a new and original Design for Spoons, Forks, and other Articles of Flat Ware, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, which forms part of this specification, and which represents my new design  
10 as applied to a spoon.

The feature of my design consists in the ornamentation of the face or front portion of  
15 the handle of the spoon, fork, or other article of flat ware, the same, as shown in the accompanying drawing, comprising the representation in relief of a scroll-like figure *b* at the lower portion of the handle, and a combined  
20 scroll and leaf like figure *c*, an irregularly-shaped panel *d* on the upper portion of the handle, having a scroll-like border with or

around which a scroll-like figure *e* appears to entwine, and from which appears as pendent  
25 a leaf-like figure *f*. Upon the upper end of the face of the handle appears in relief a cornucopia-like figure *f'*, with a scroll-like figure *g* below it, appearing to approach the panel-like figure *d*, and the design being completed by the addition of a leaf-like figure *h*  
30 between the panel or panel-like figure *d* and the scroll-like figure *g*, as shown.

I claim—

The within-described design for spoons and other articles of flat ware, consisting of a series of figures in relief upon the handle of the  
35 article, representing scrolls, combined scrolls and leaves, an irregular-shaped panel, and a cornucopia, as illustrated in the accompanying drawing.
