[57] **CLAIM**
The ornamental design for a faucet handle or the like, as shown and described.

DESCRIPTION

FIG. 1 is a perspective view taken from the top, front and left side of a faucet handle or the like showing my new design;
FIG. 2 is a left side elevational view thereof, the right side being a mirror image of the left side;
FIG. 3 is a top plan view thereof;
FIG. 4 is a rear elevational view thereof;
FIG. 5 is a front elevational view thereof;
FIG. 6 is a bottom plan view thereof;
FIG. 7 is a left side elevational view of a second embodiment thereof, the right side being a mirror image of the left side;
FIG. 8 is a left side elevational view of a third embodiment thereof, the right side being a mirror image of the left side; and,
FIG. 9 is a left side elevational view of a fourth embodiment thereof, the right side being a mirror image of the left side.

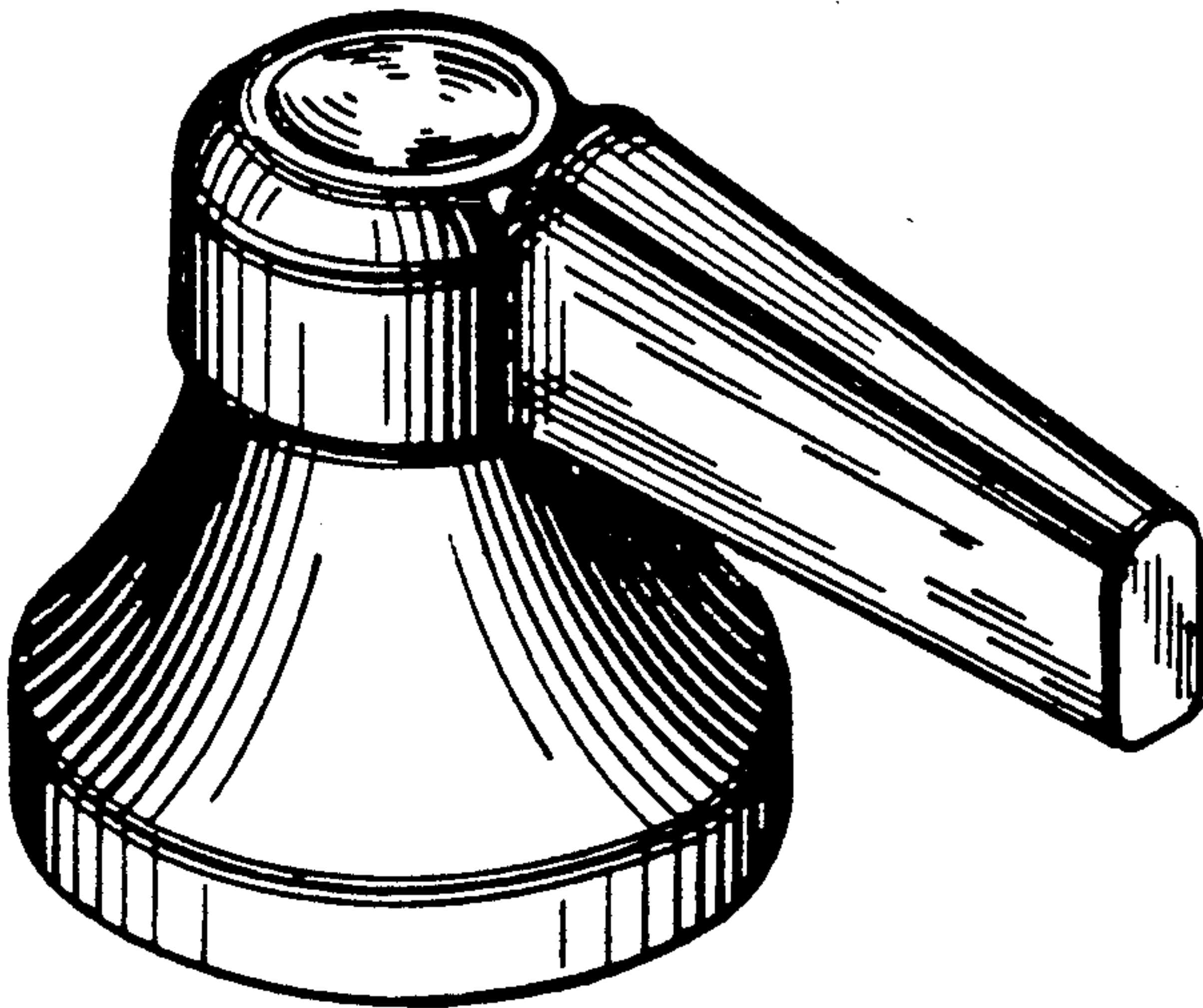

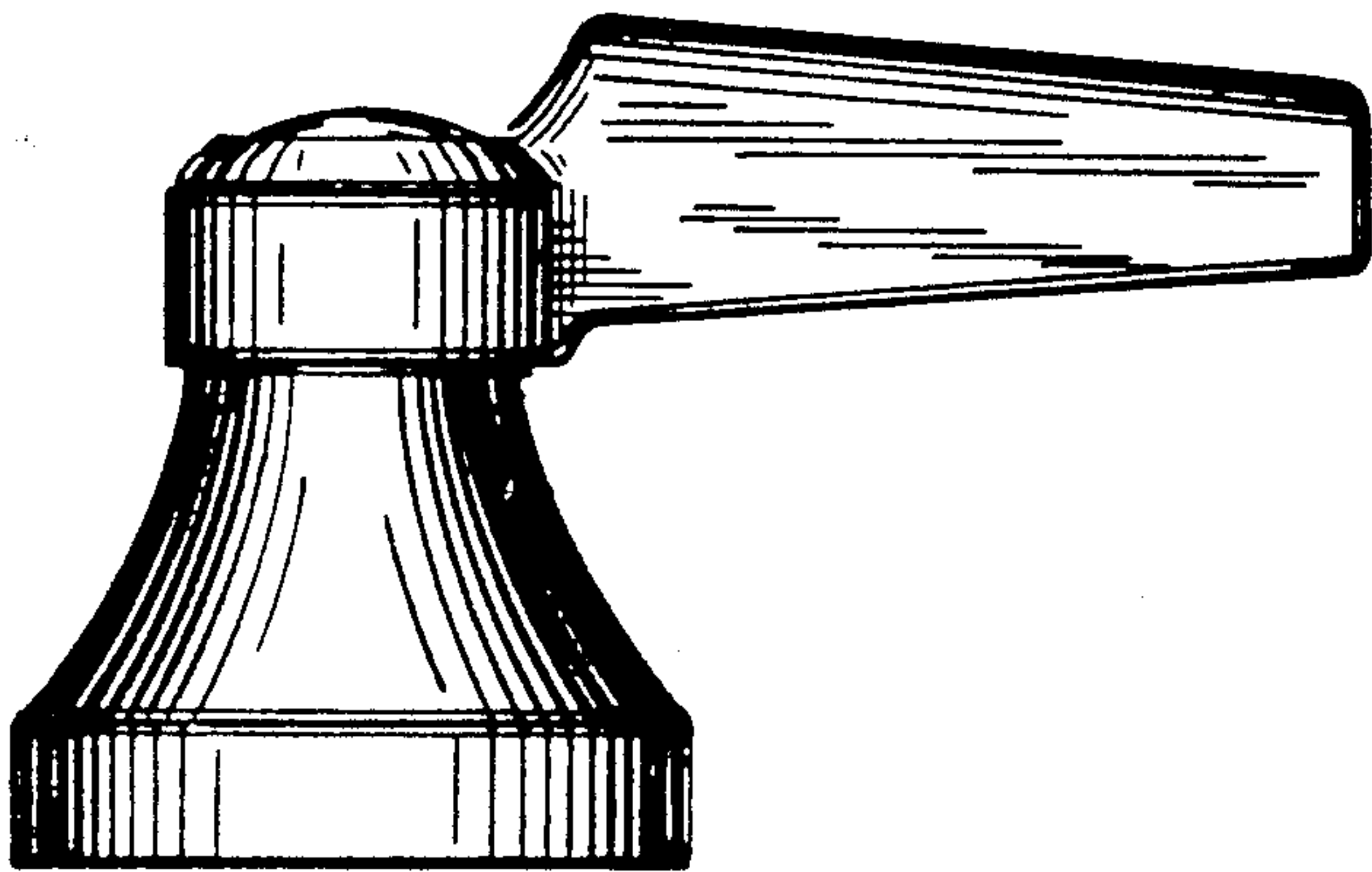
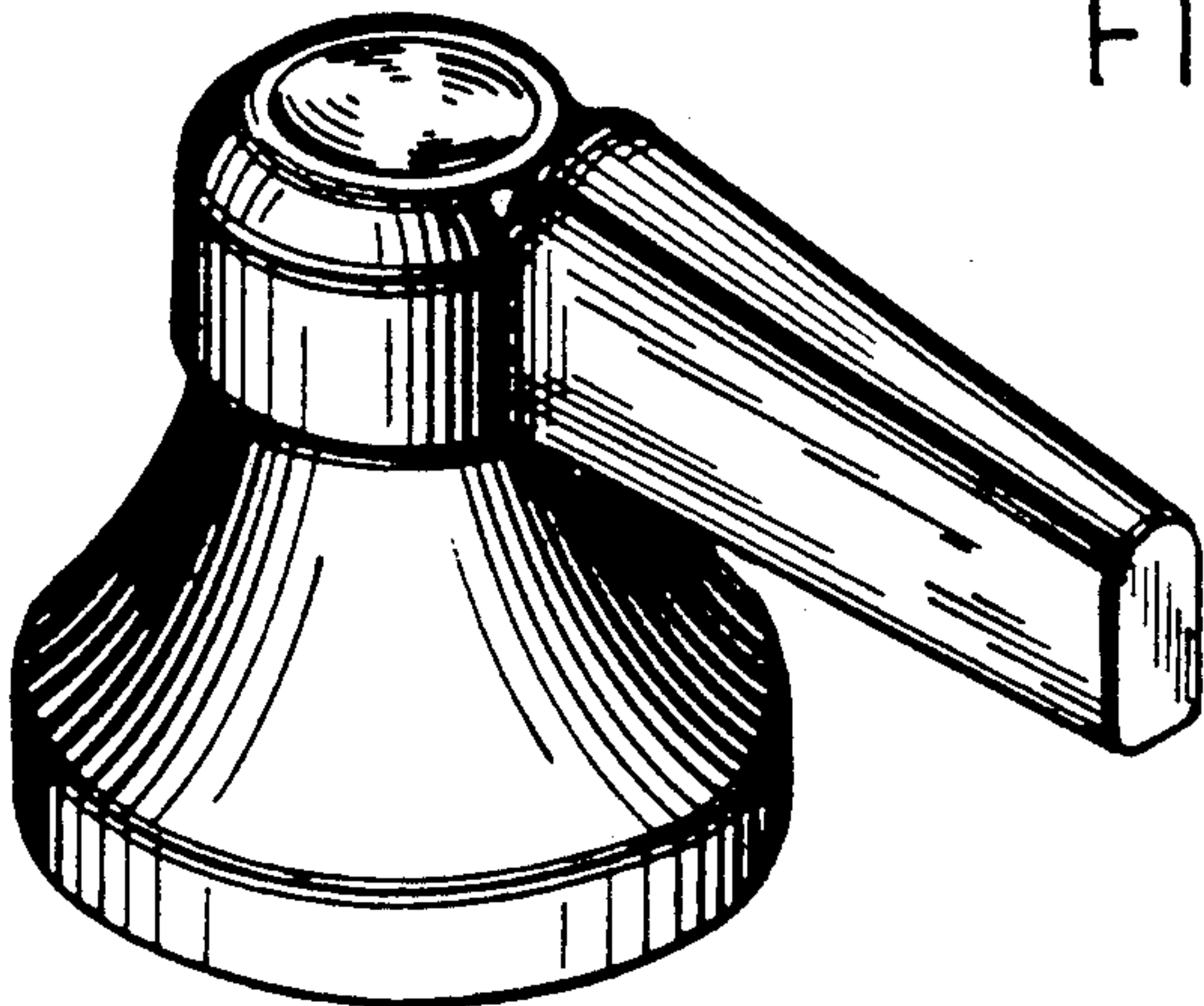

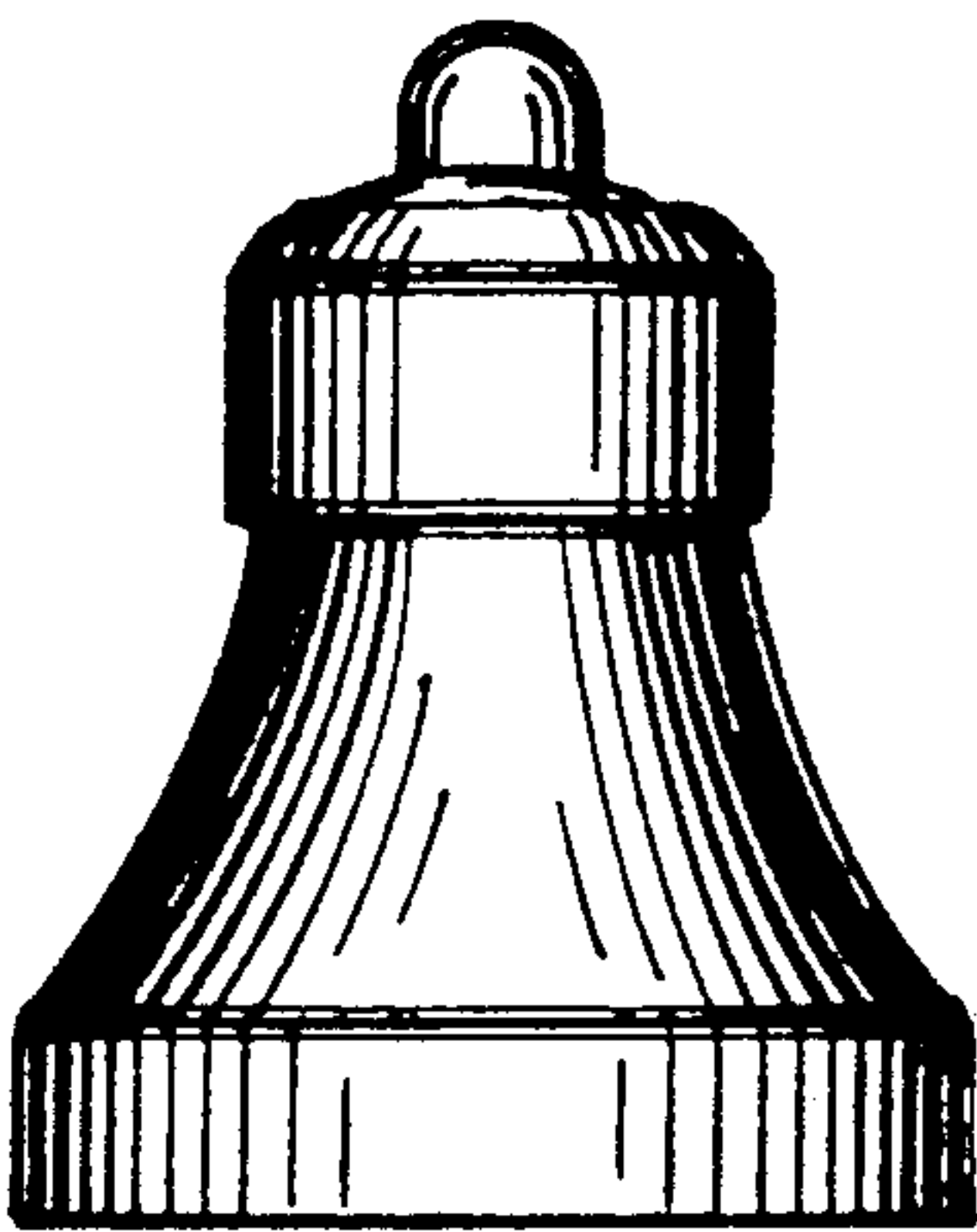

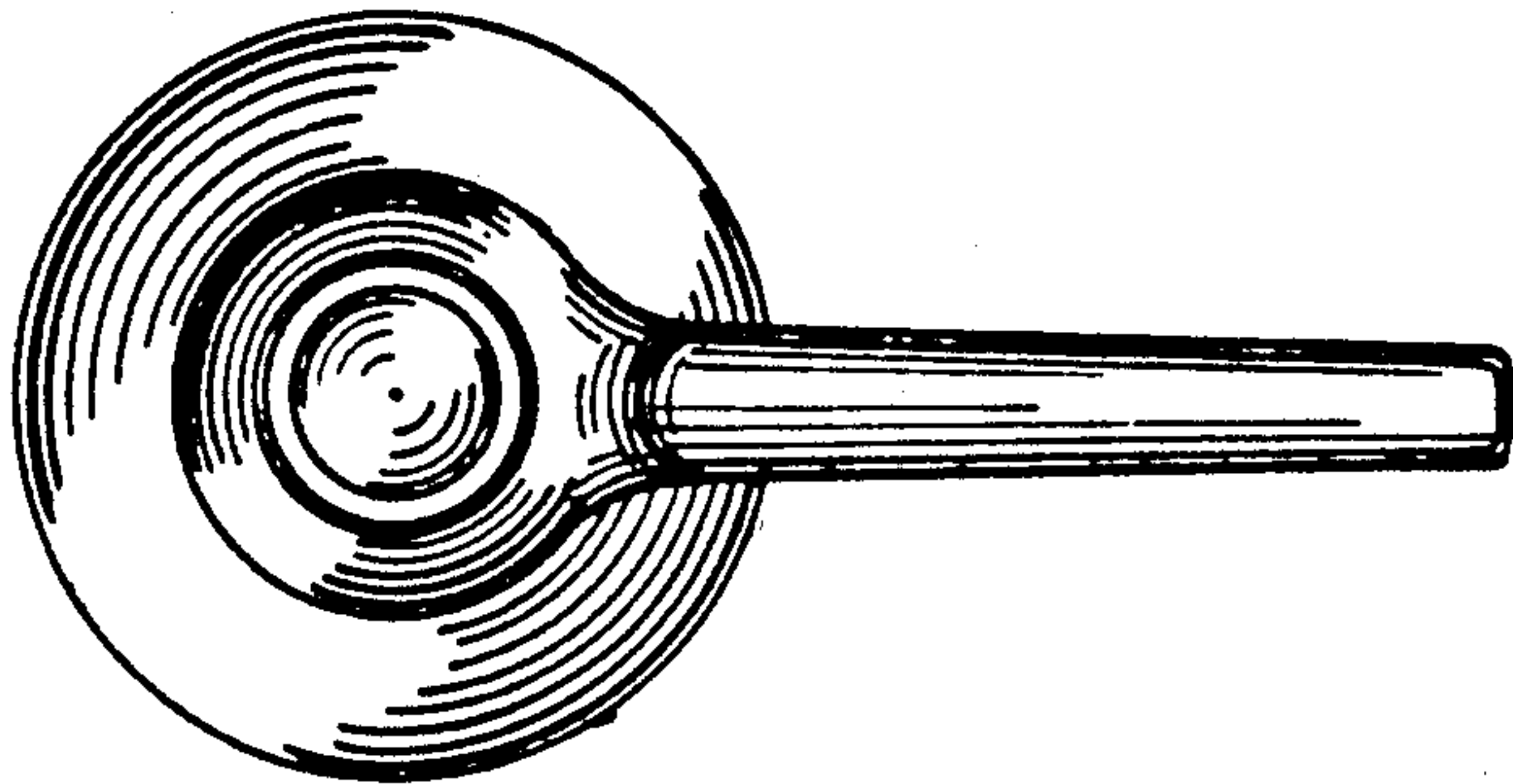

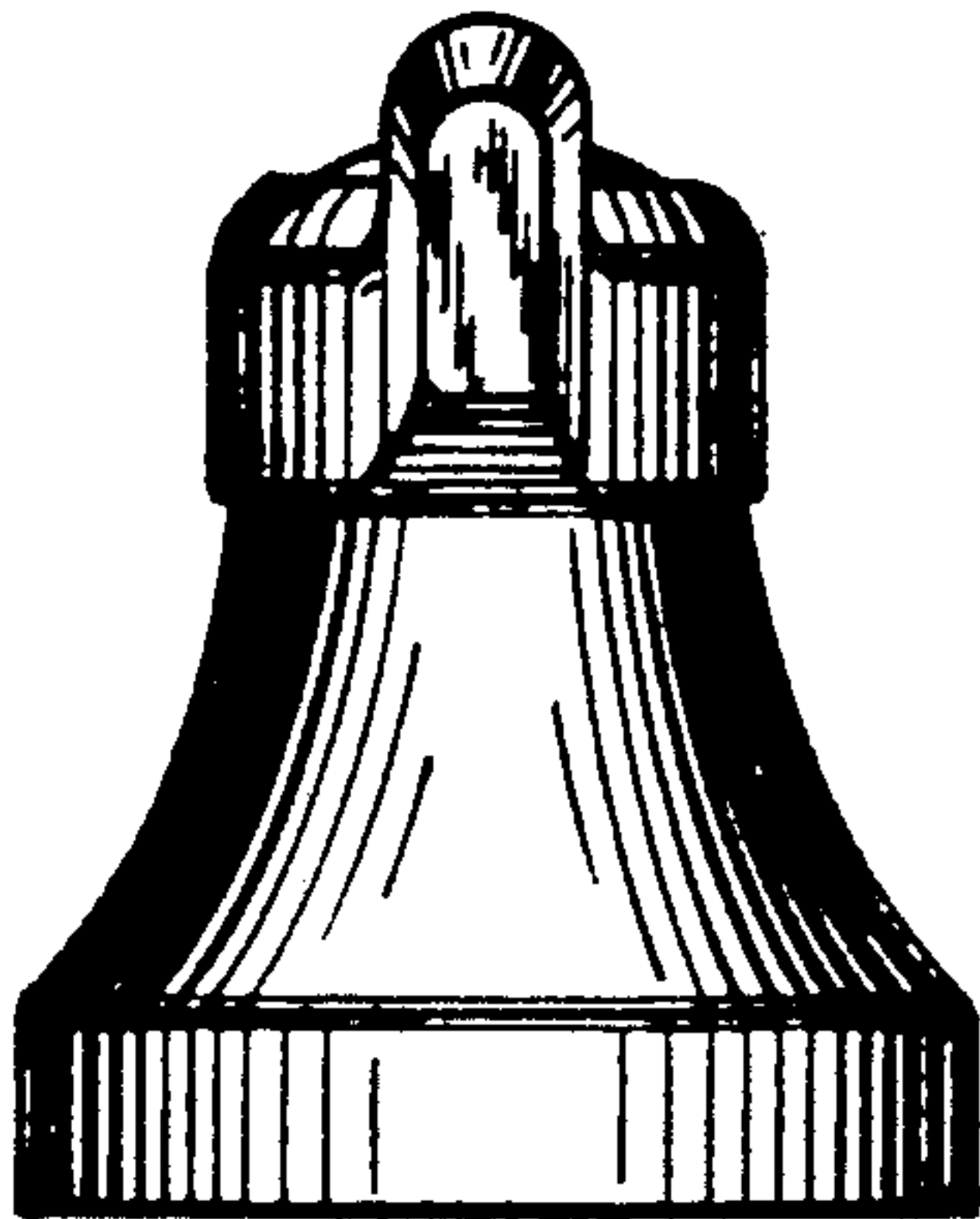

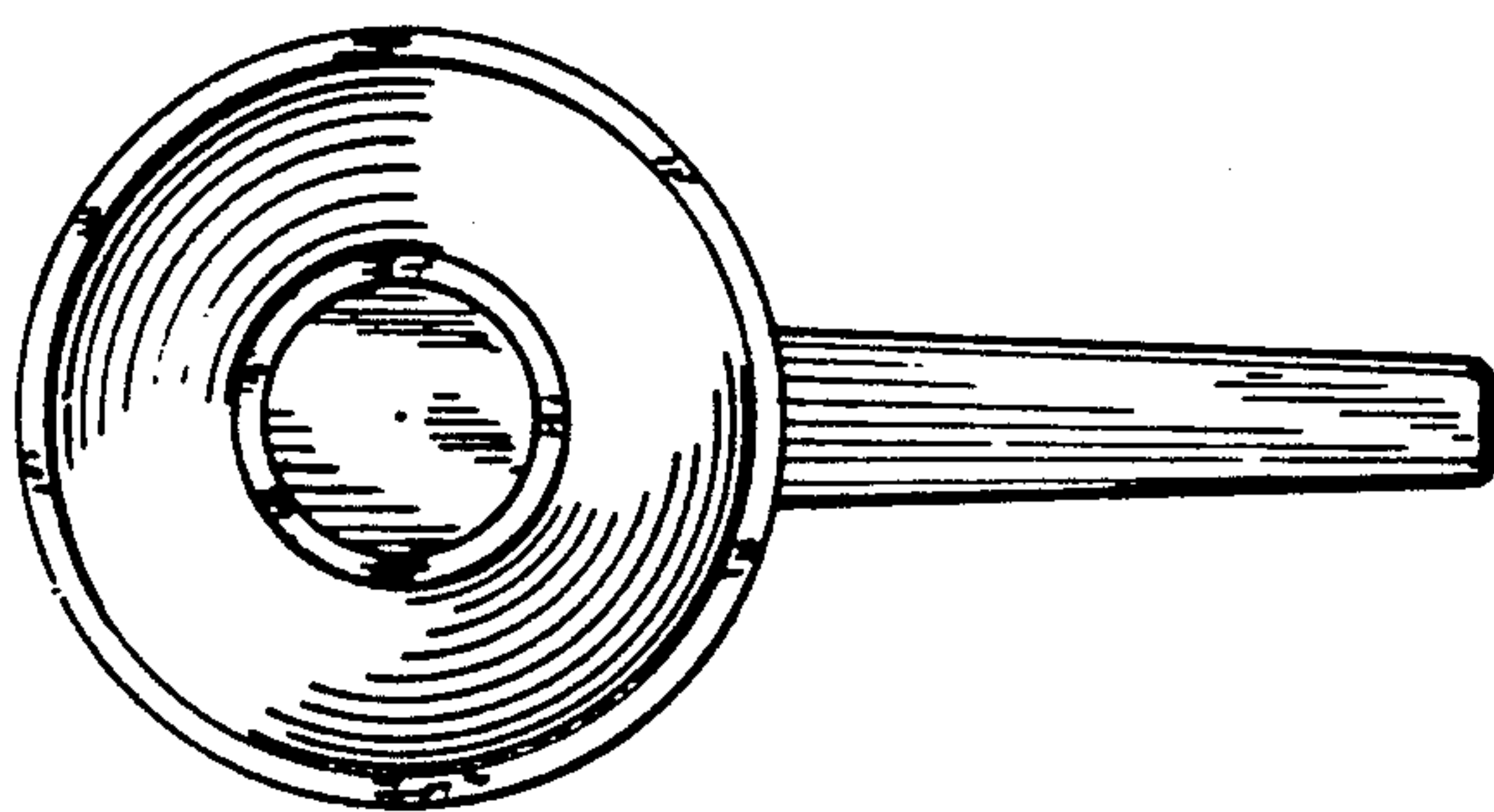

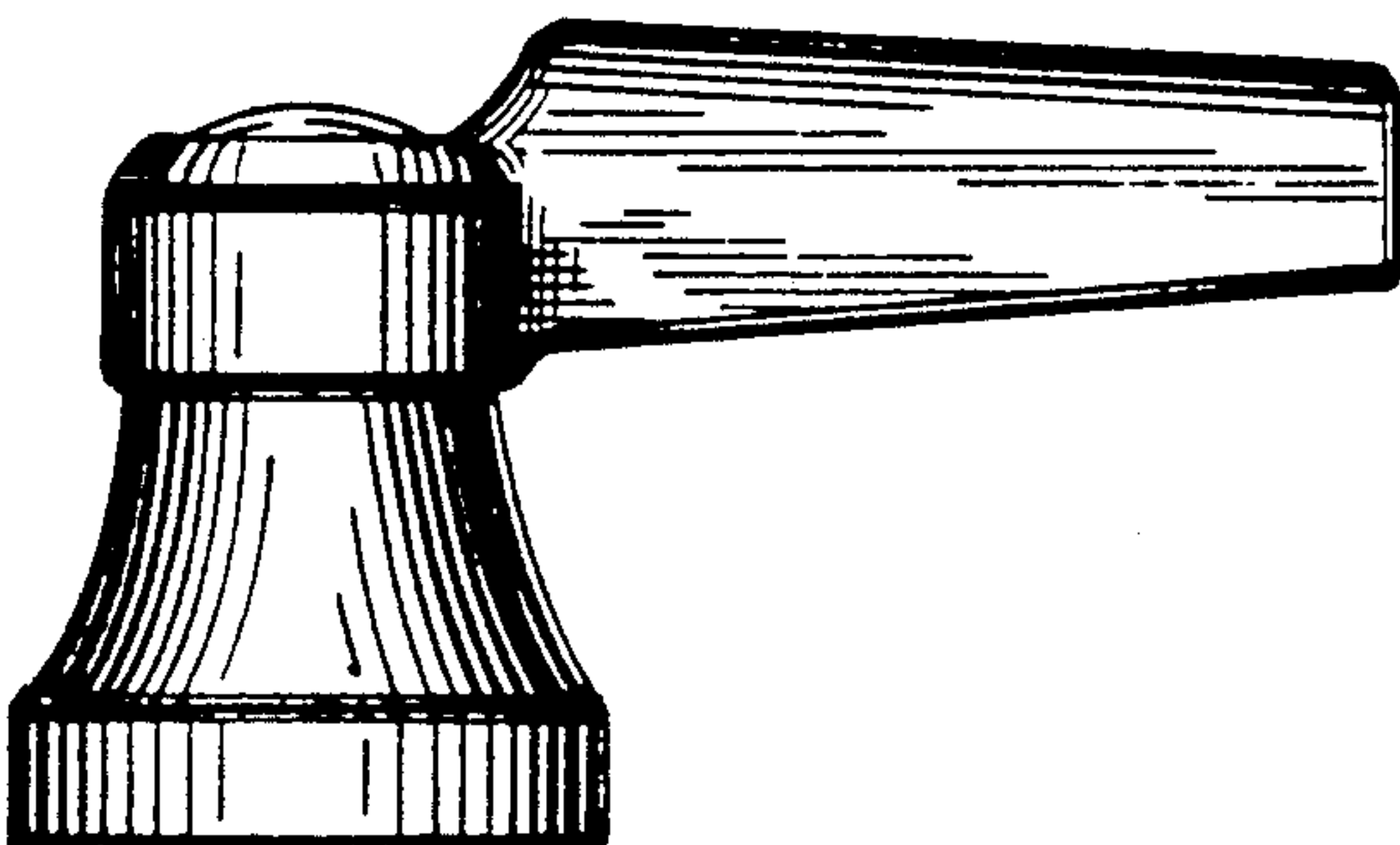

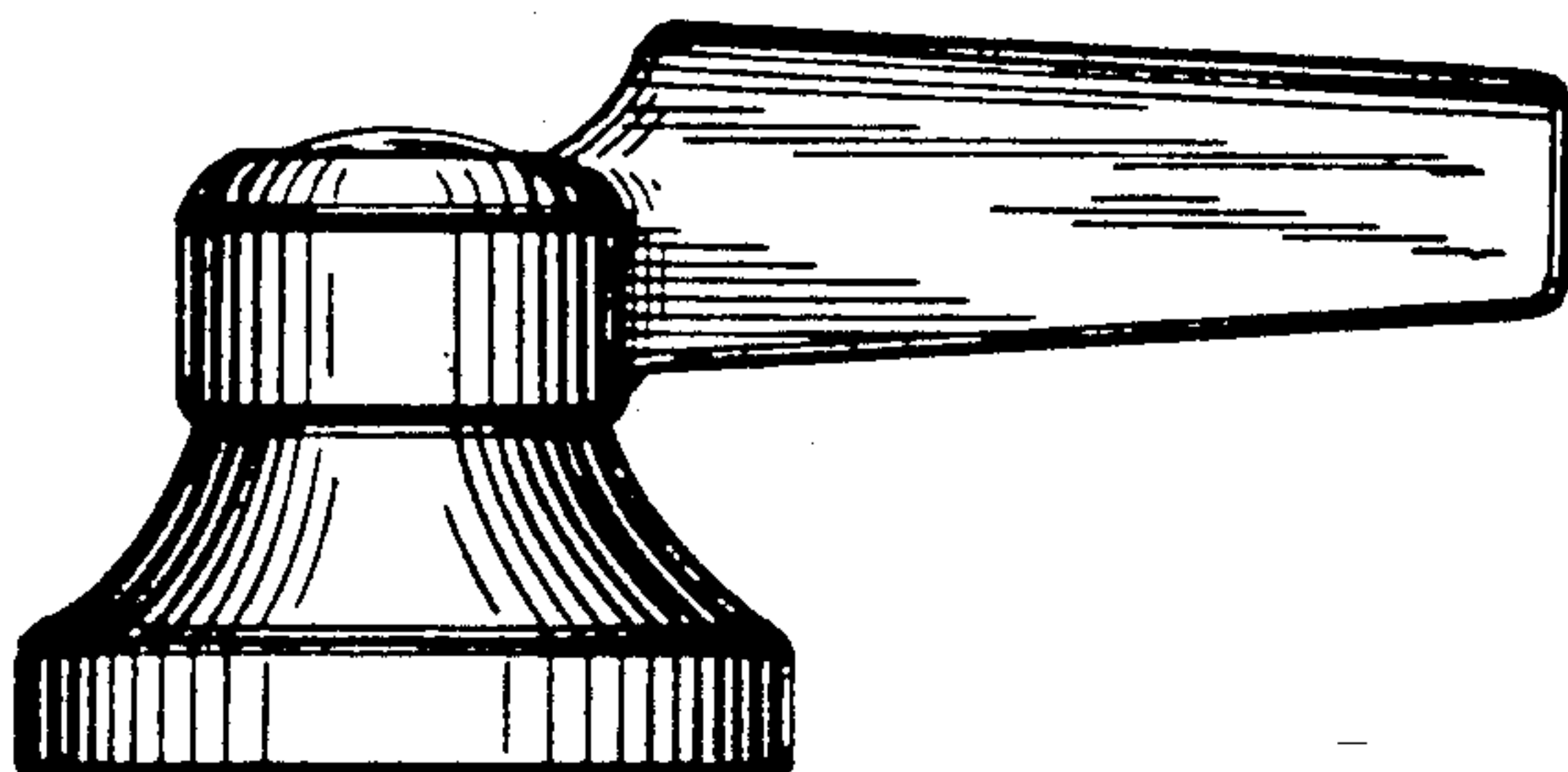

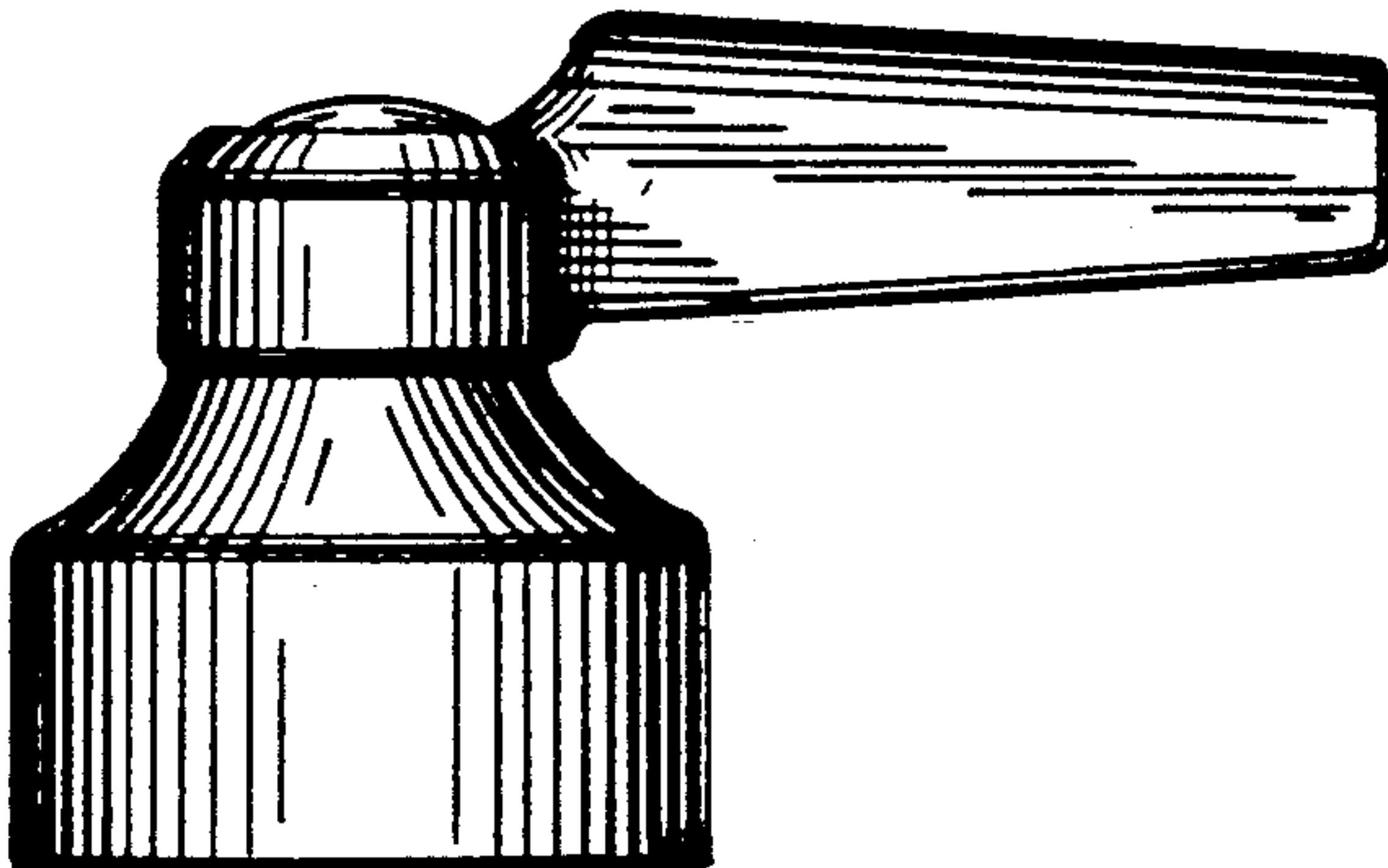
