FIG. 5 is a left side elevation view;

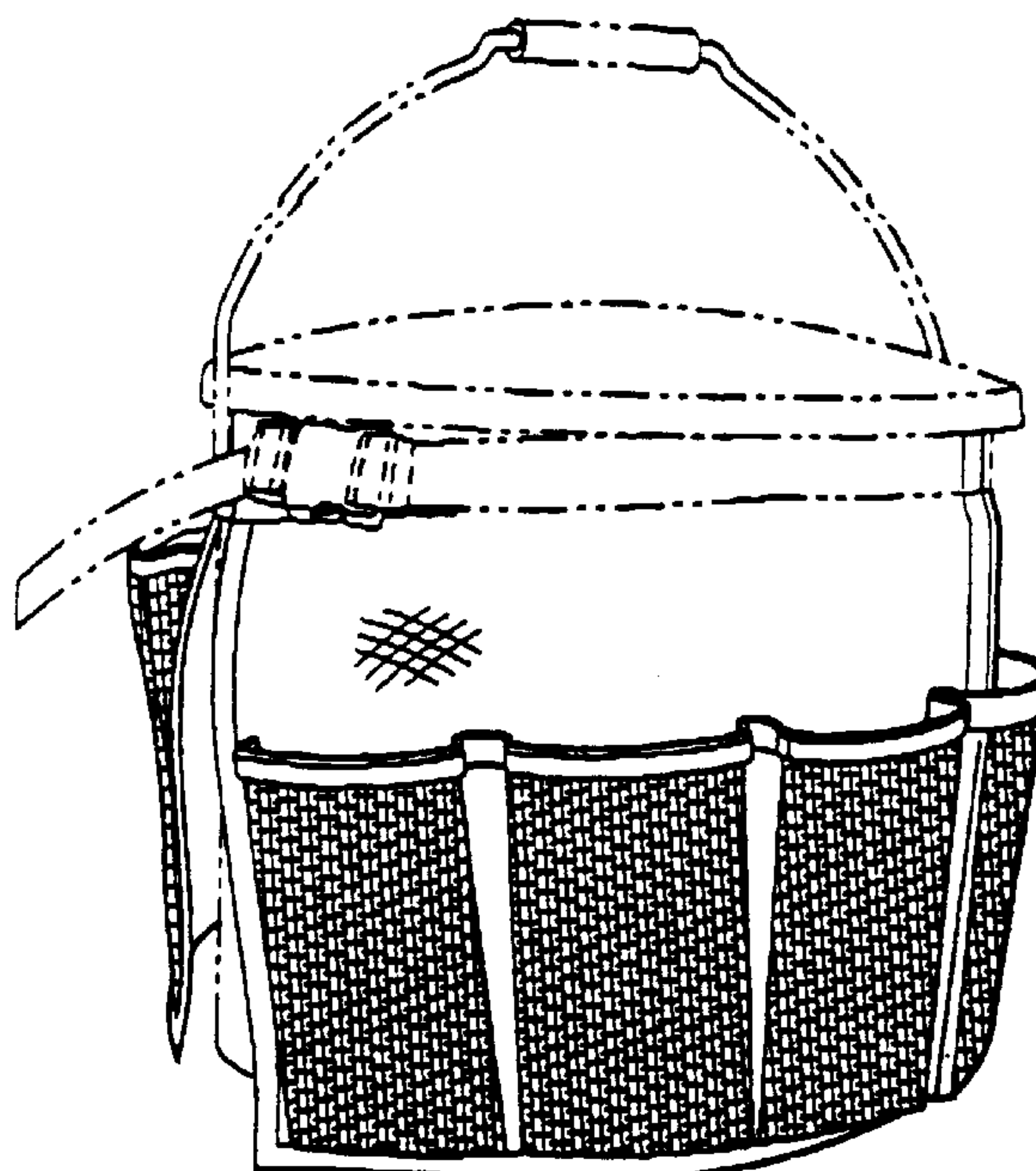
FIG. 6 is a top plan view; and,

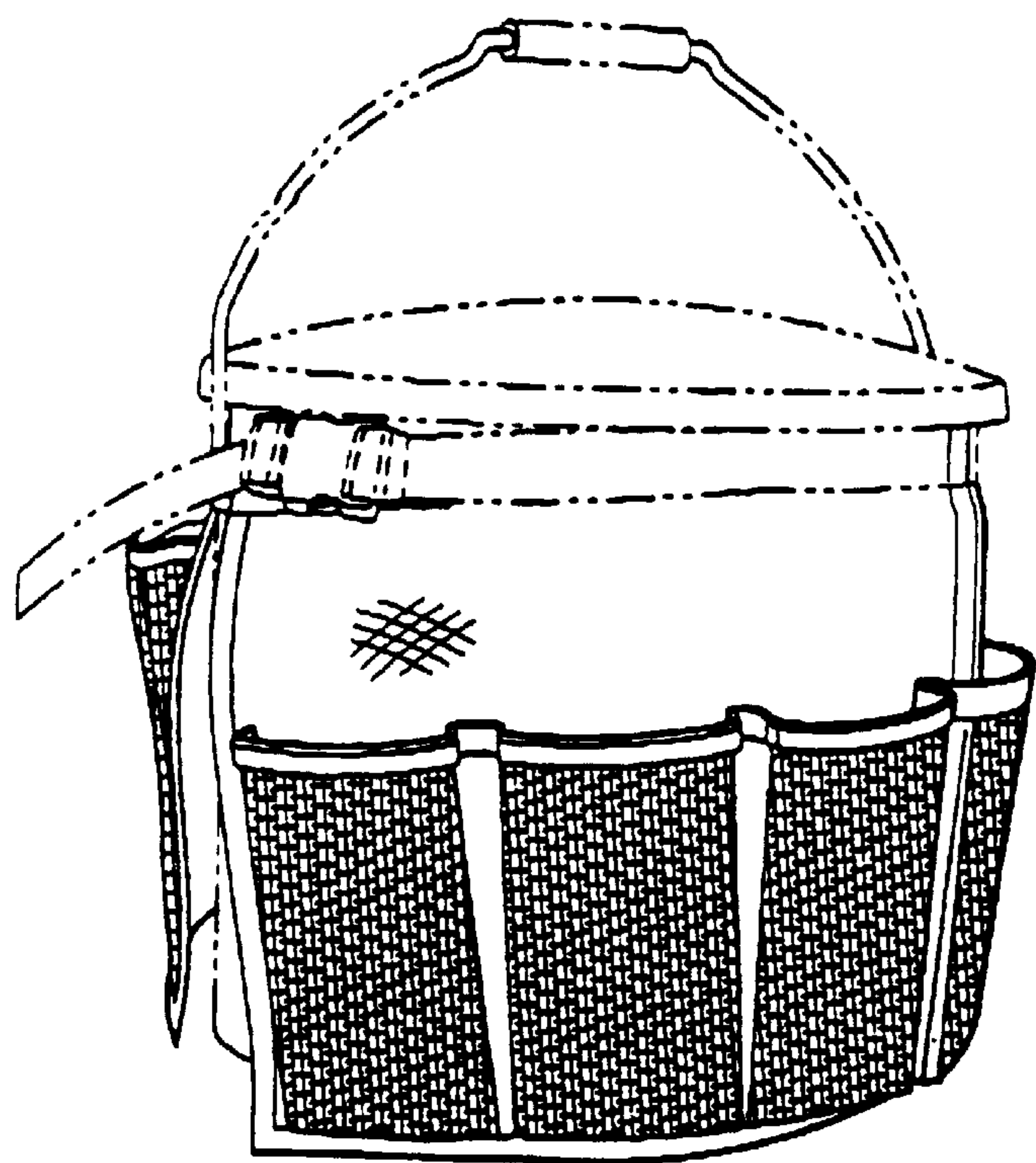

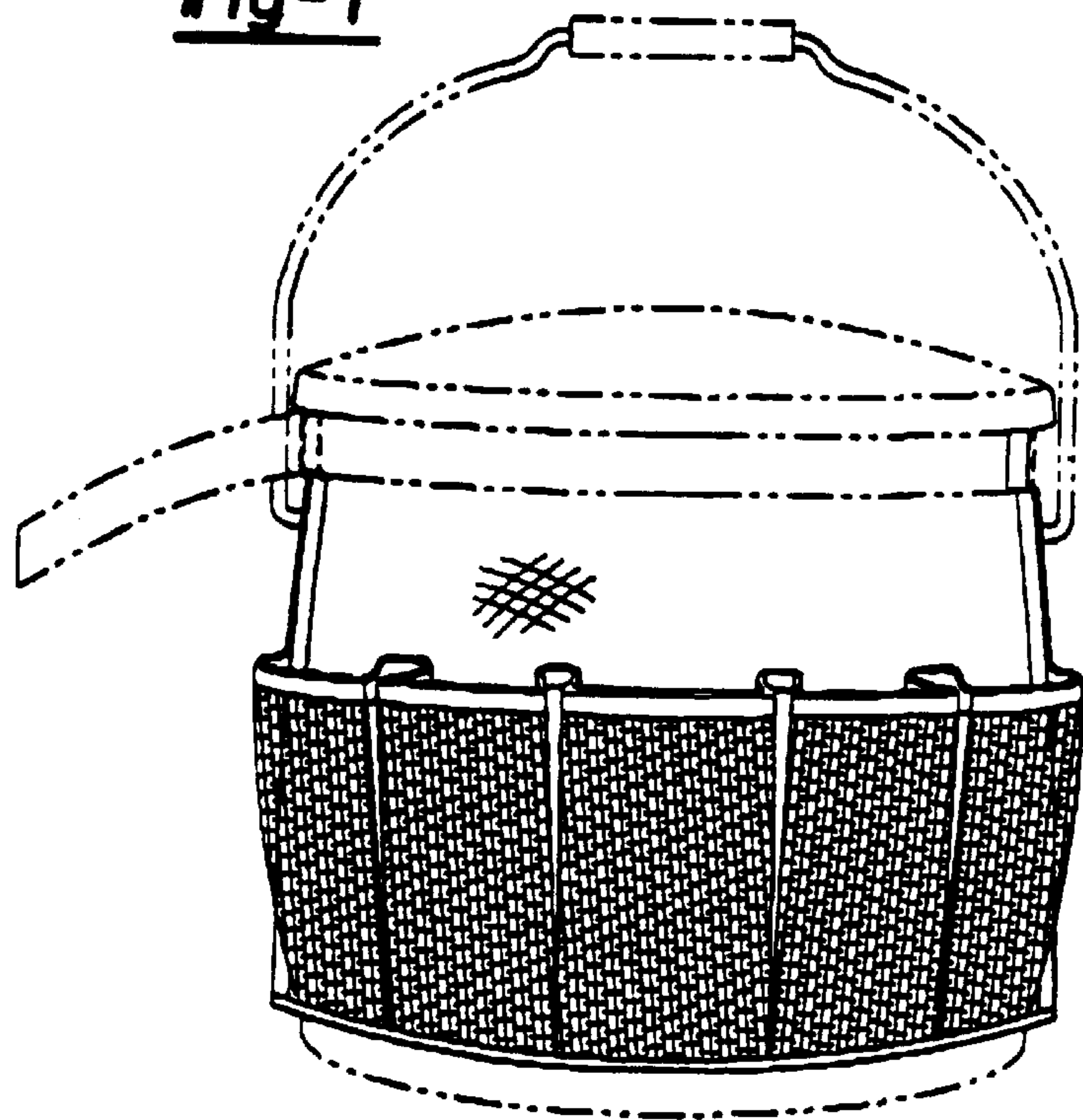

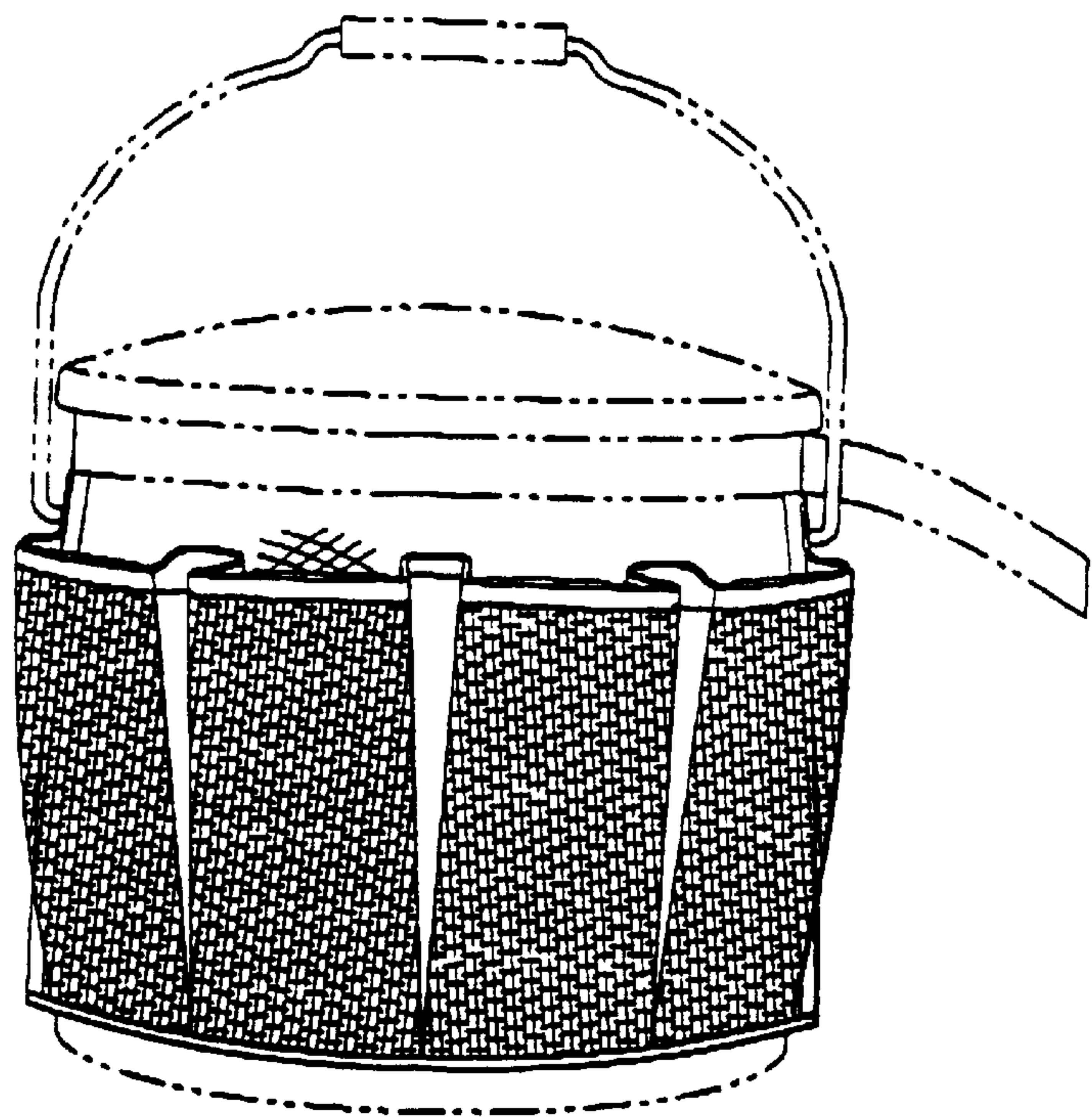

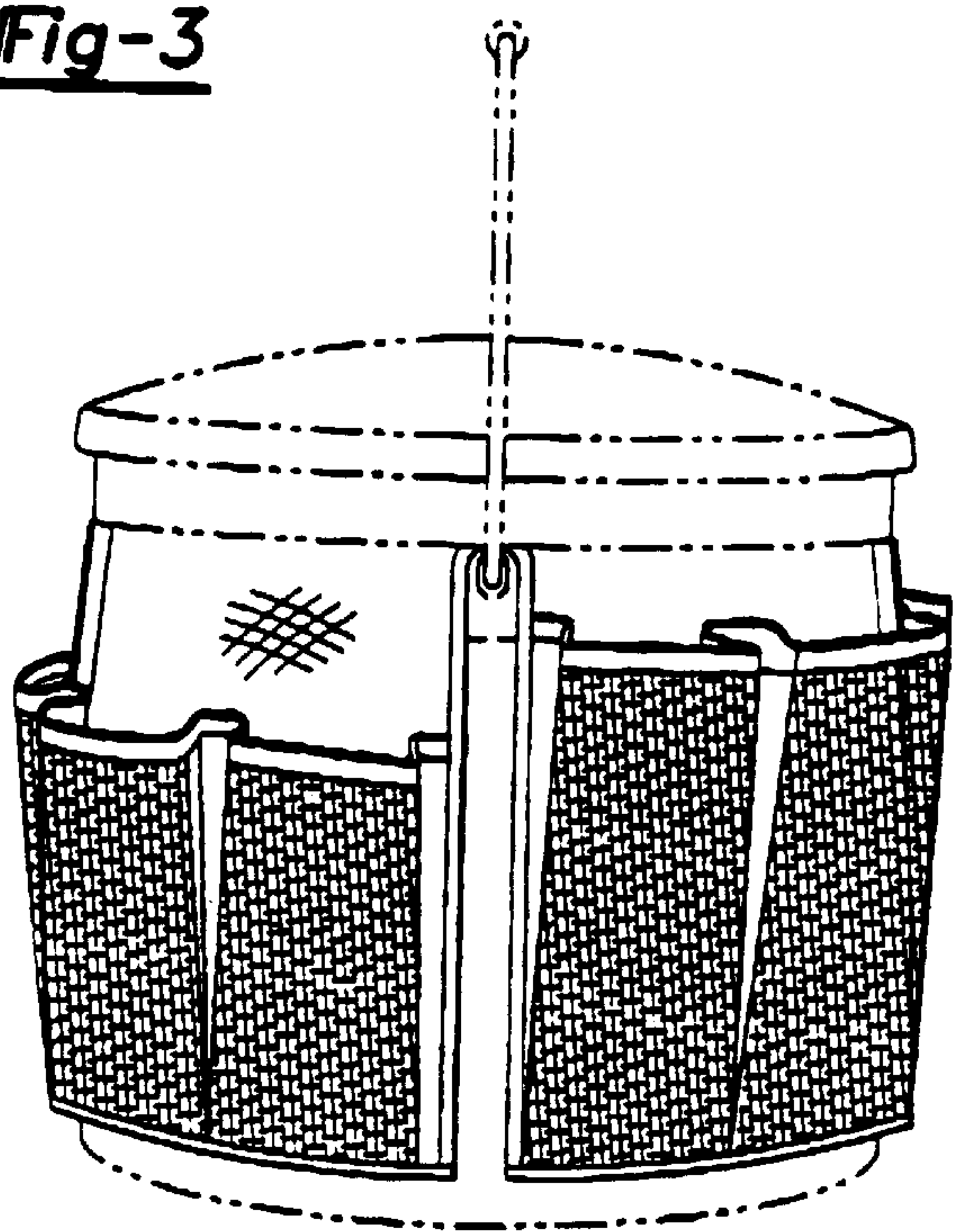

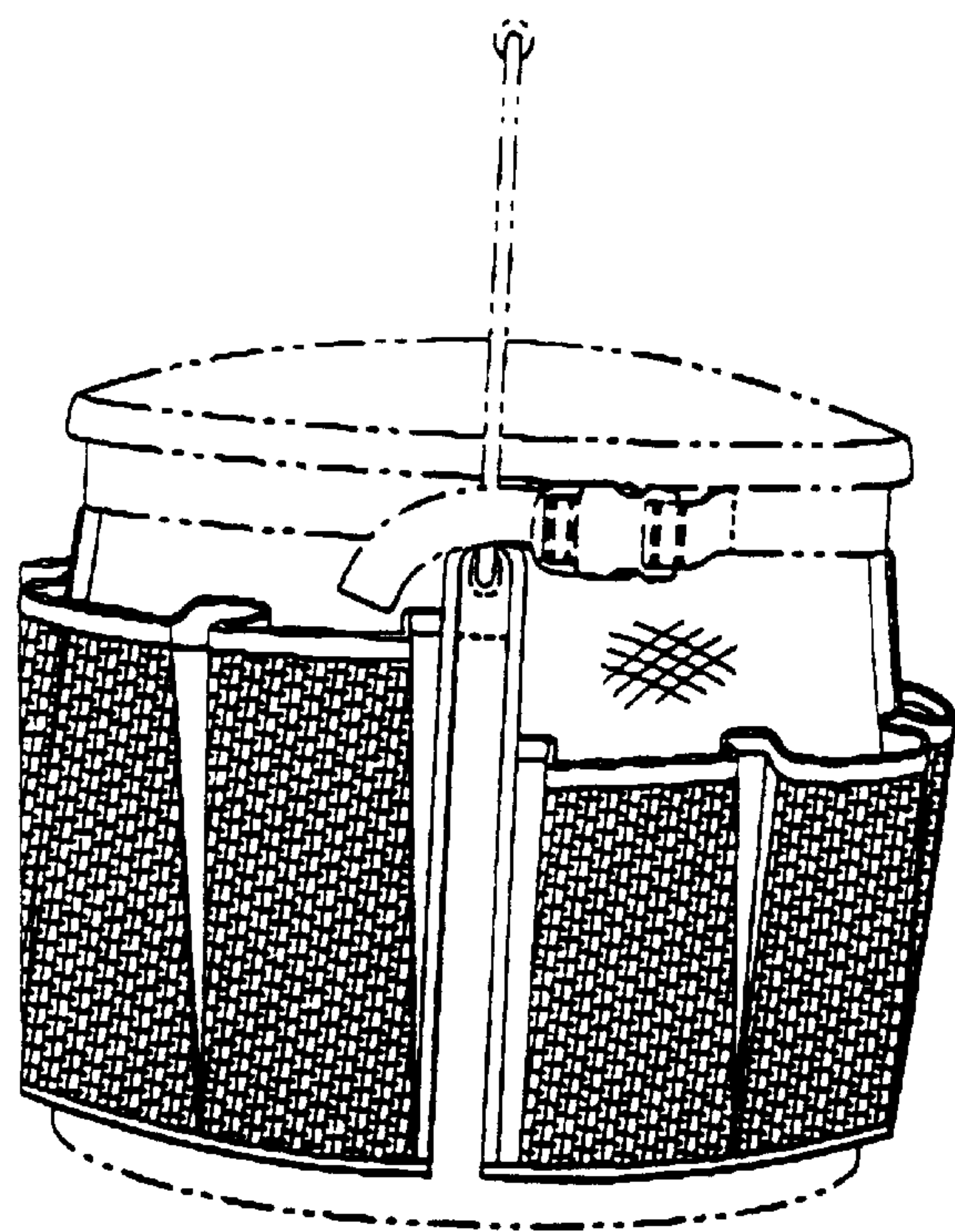

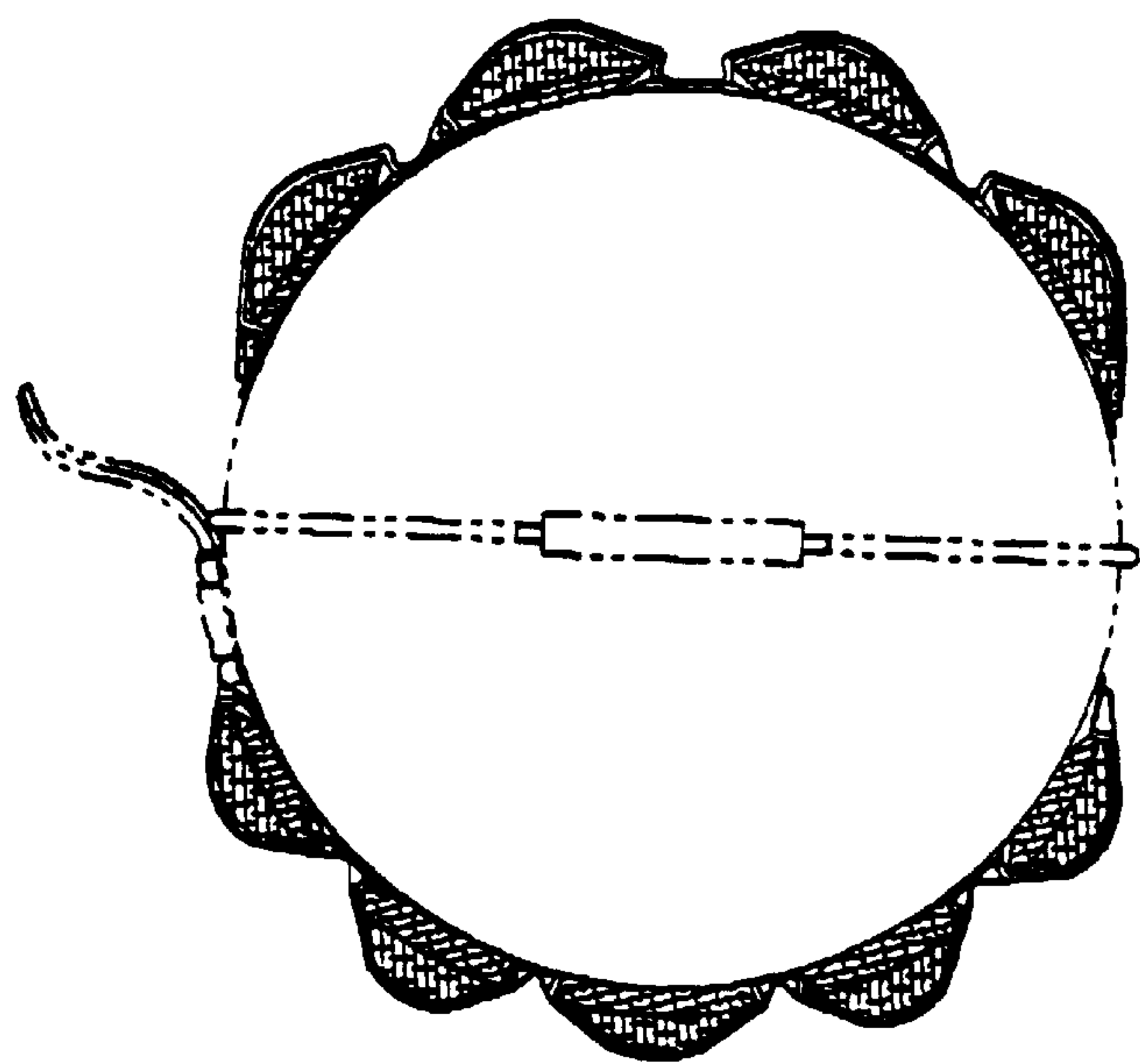

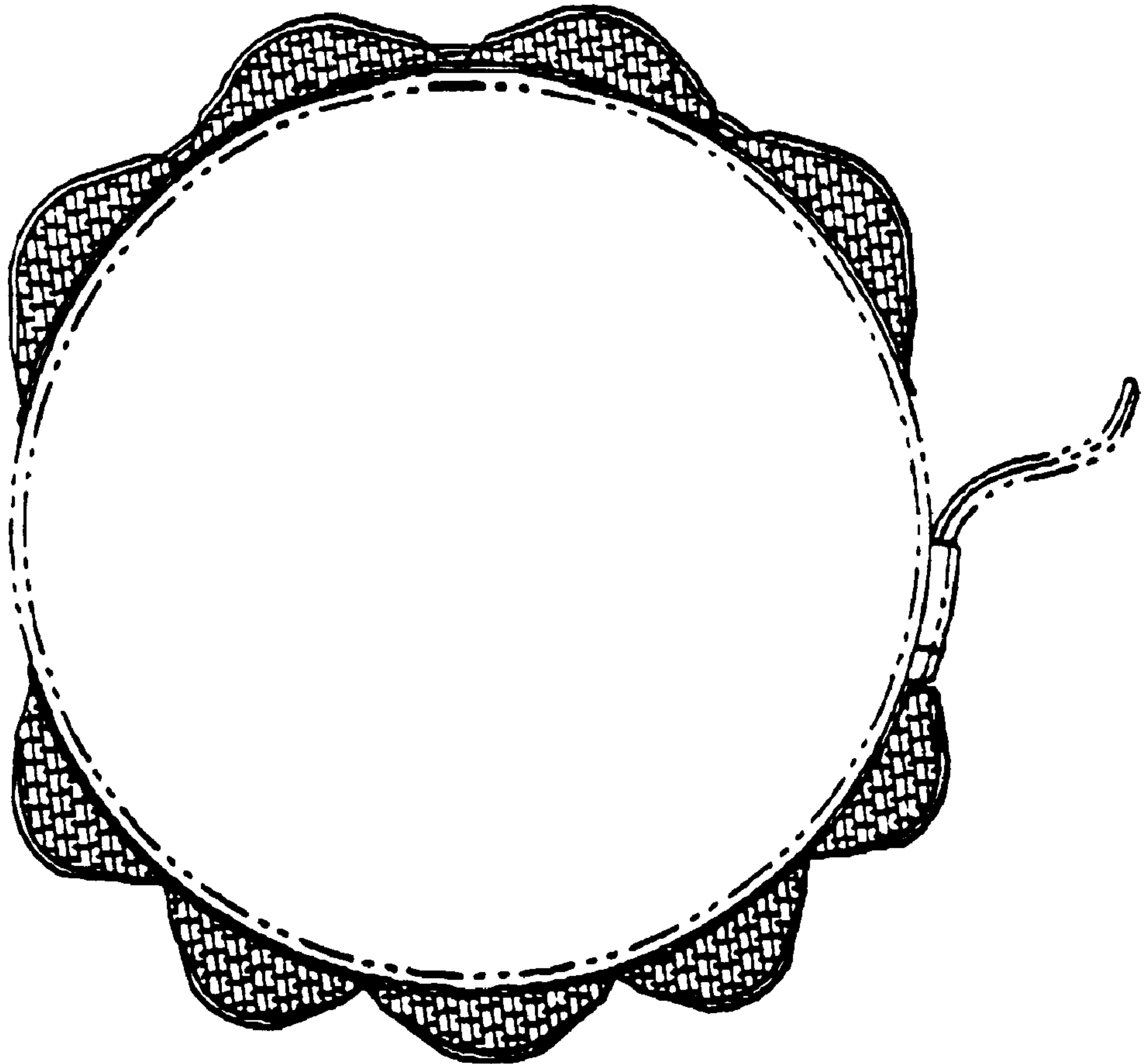
