DESCRIPTION

FIG. 1 is a perspective view of an element of a shoe upper showing my new design;

FIG. 2 is a side view of the element of a shoe upper shown in FIG. 1;

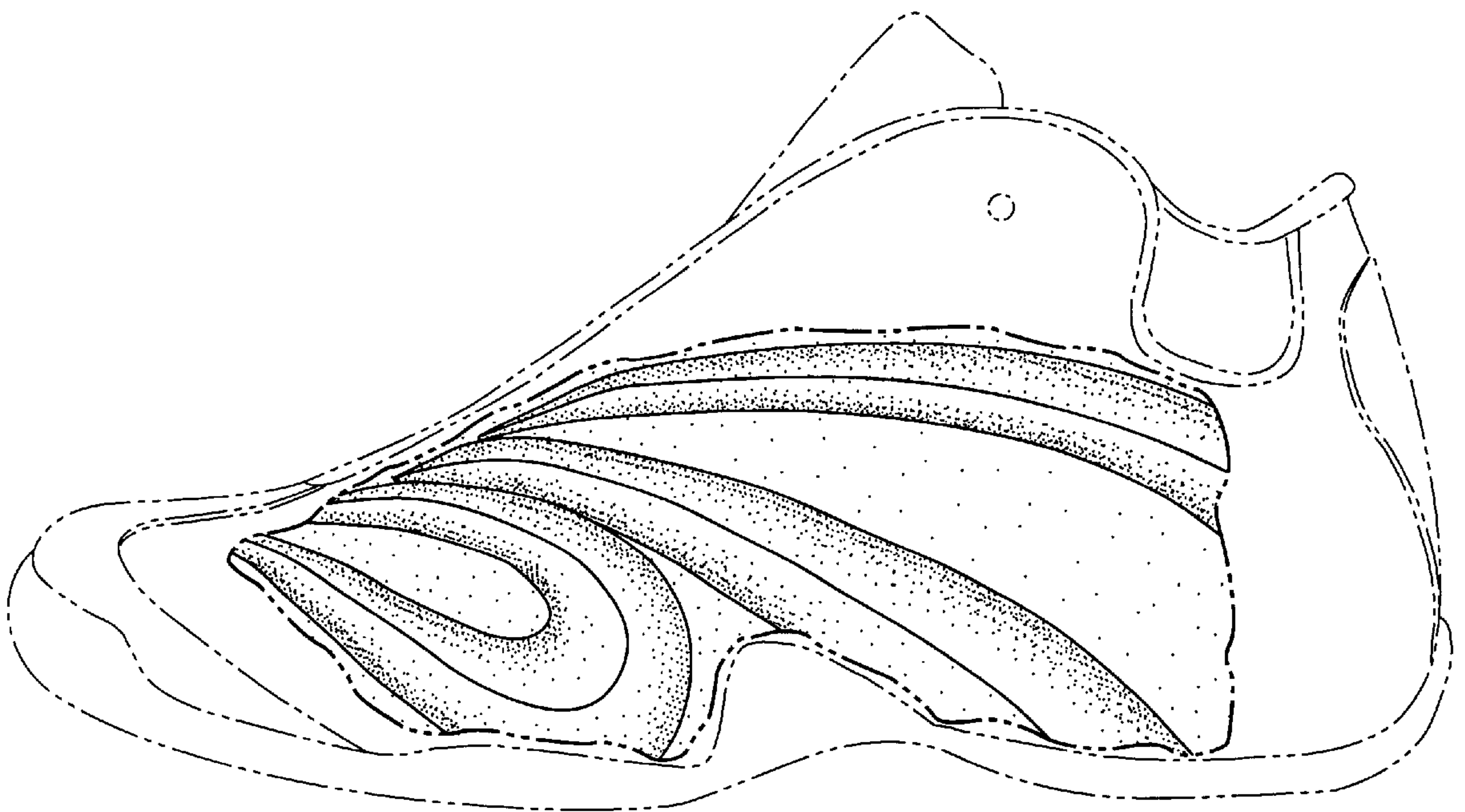
FIG. 3 is a front view of the element of a shoe upper shown in FIG. 1;

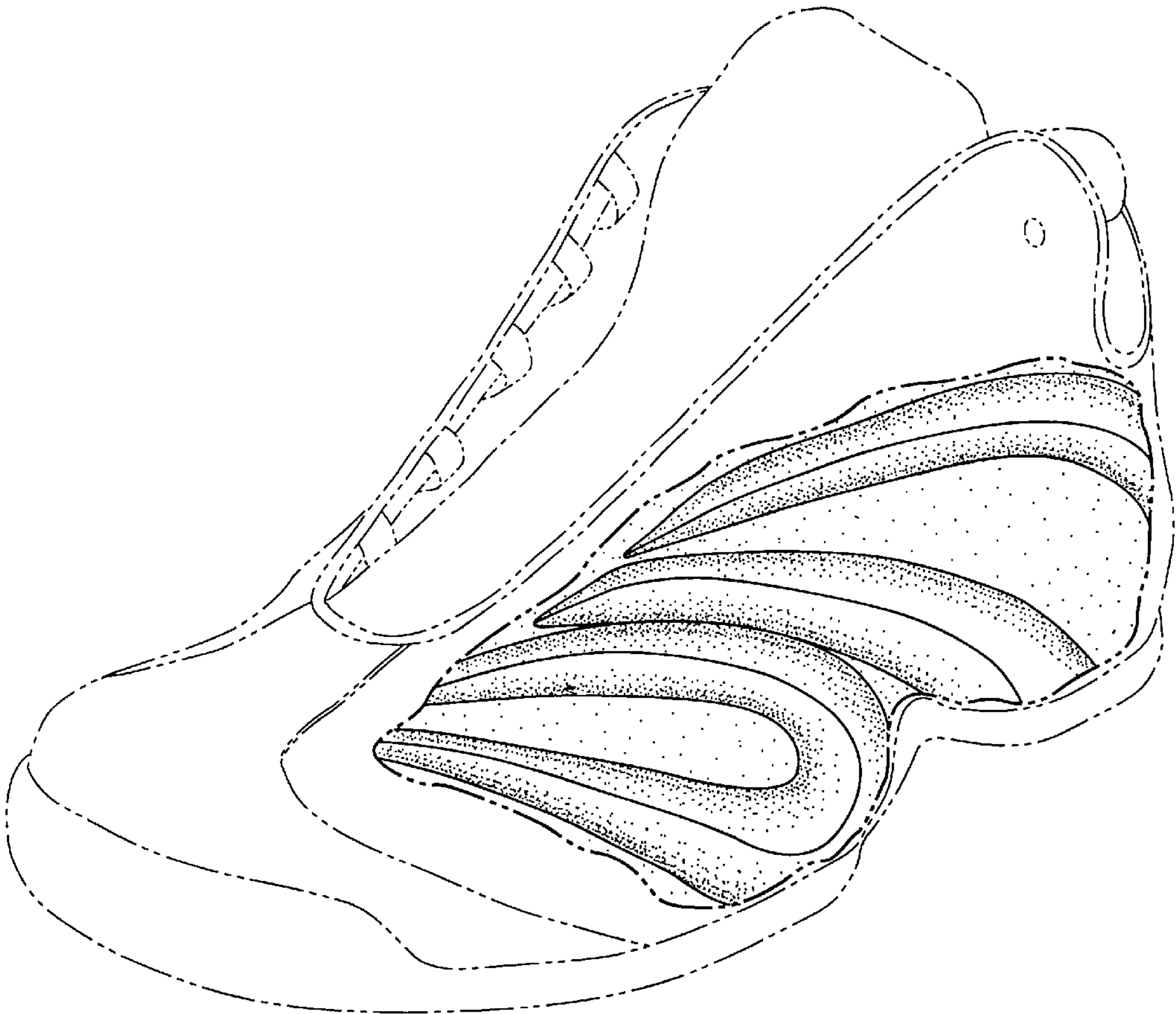

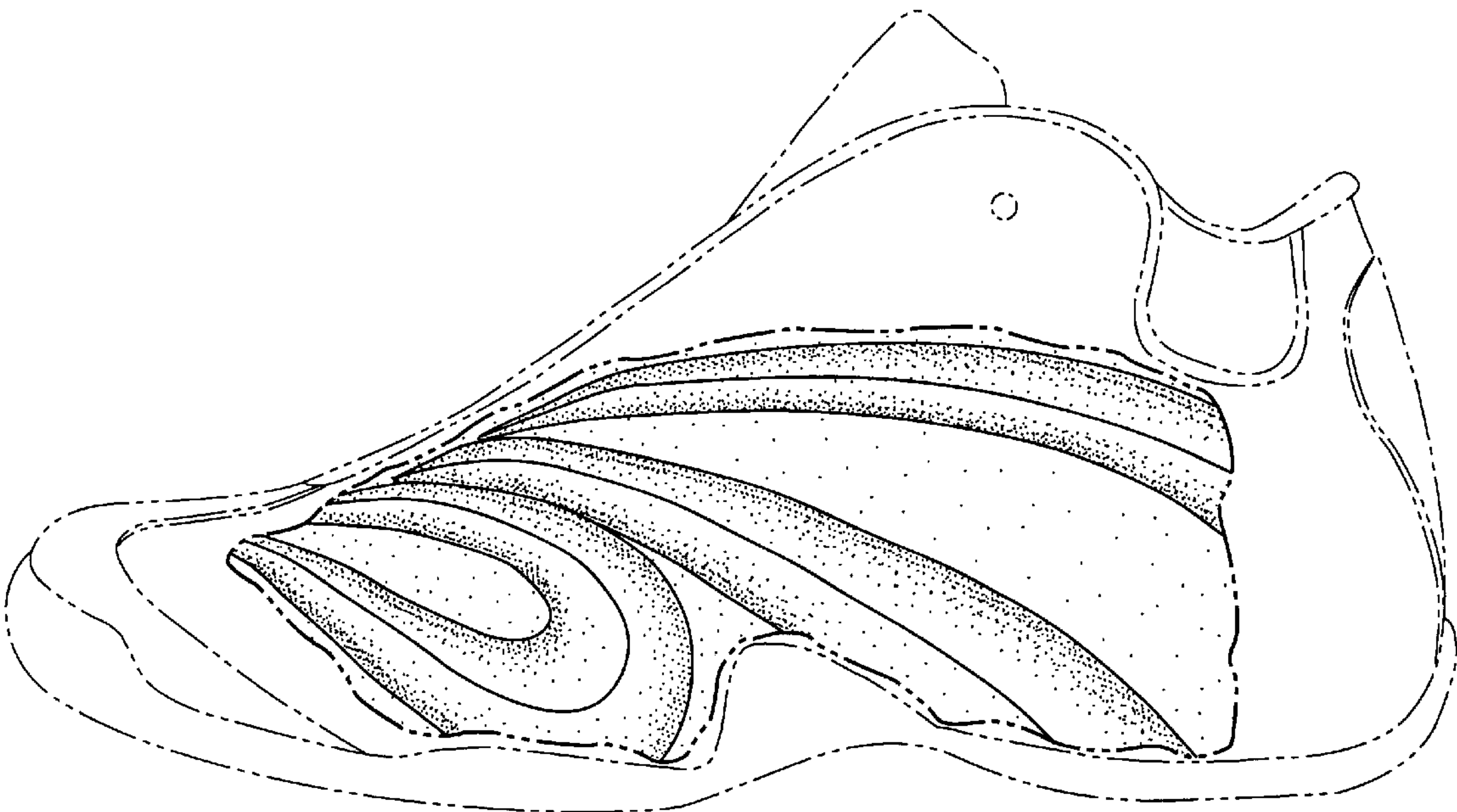

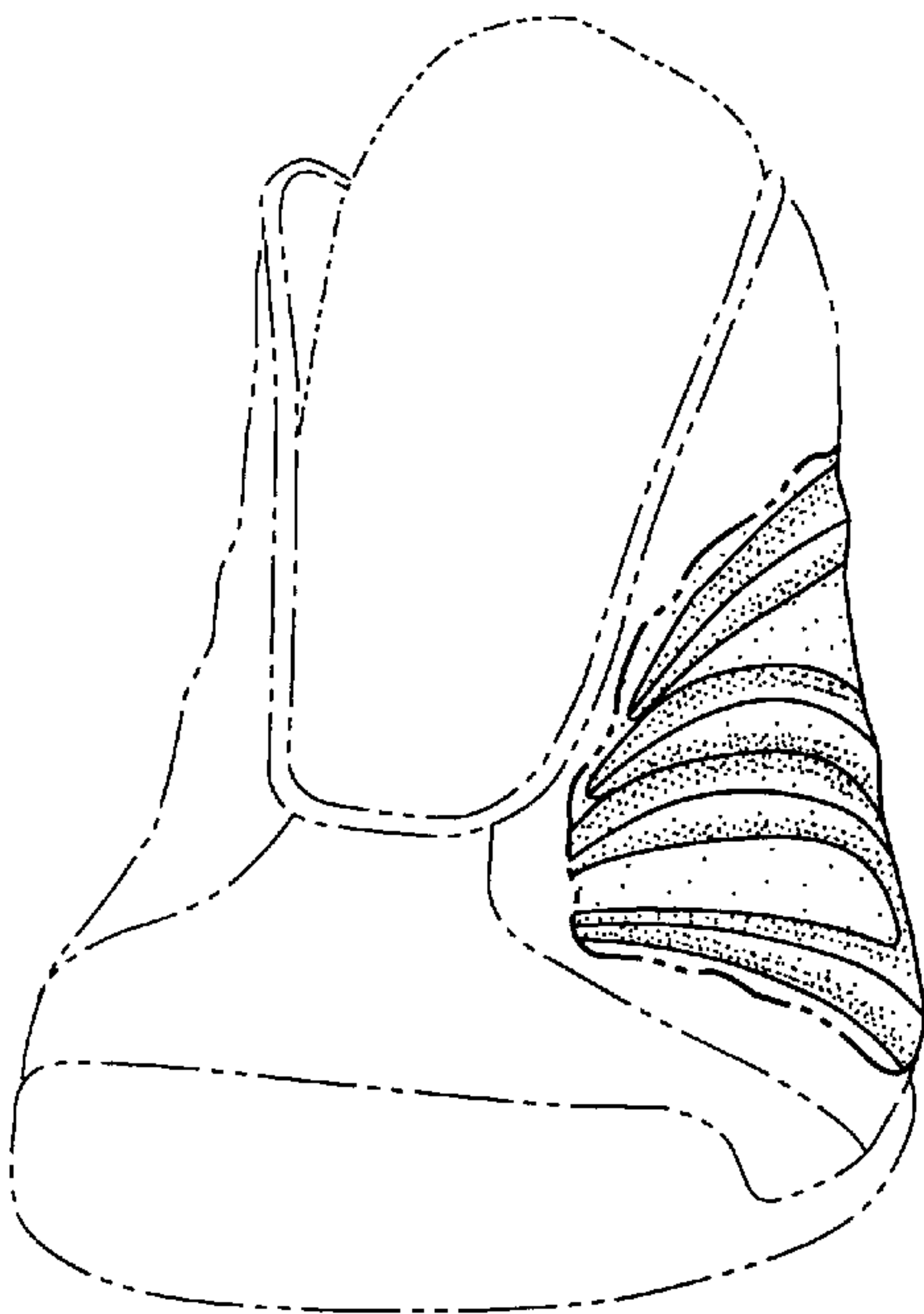

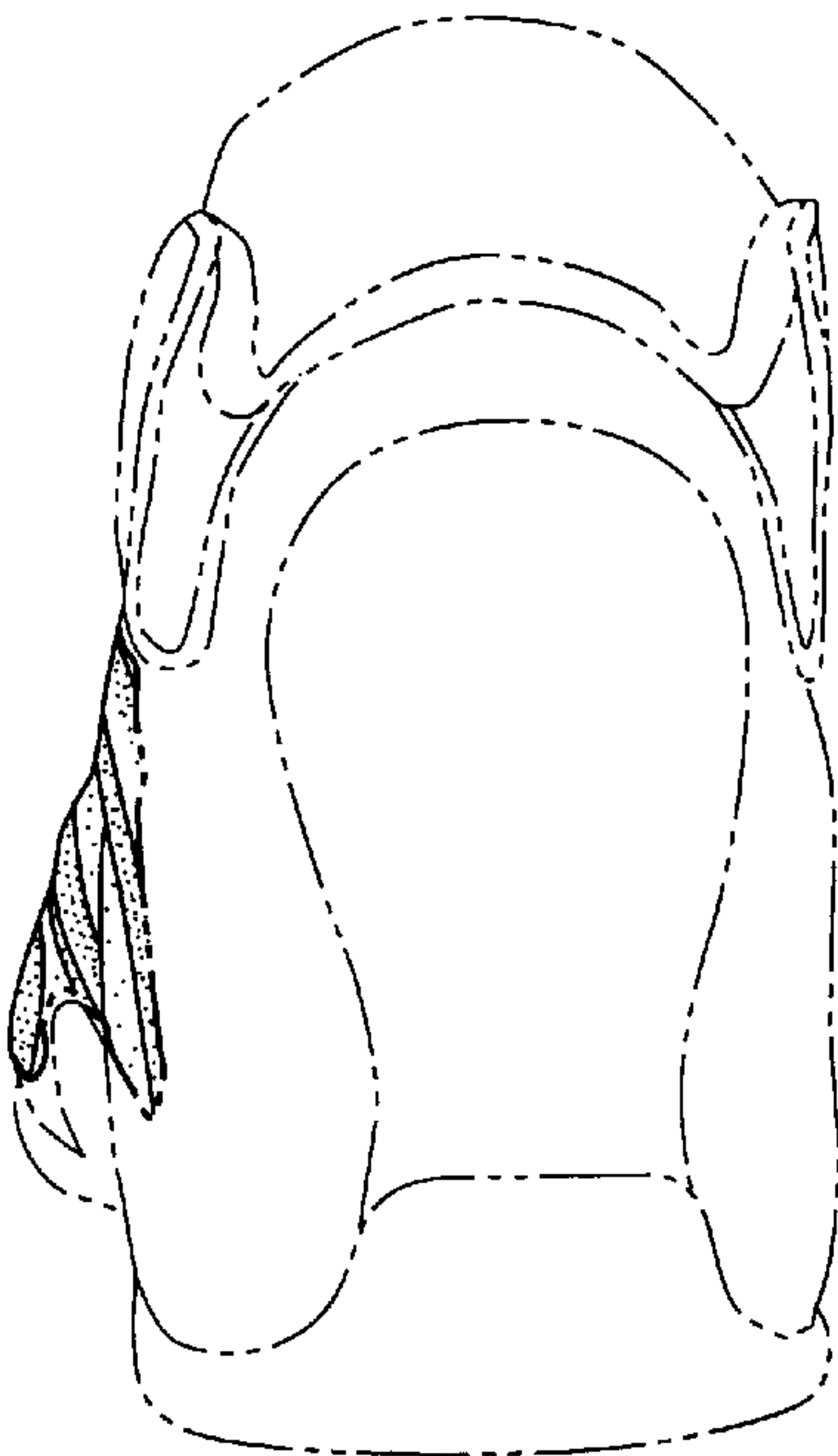

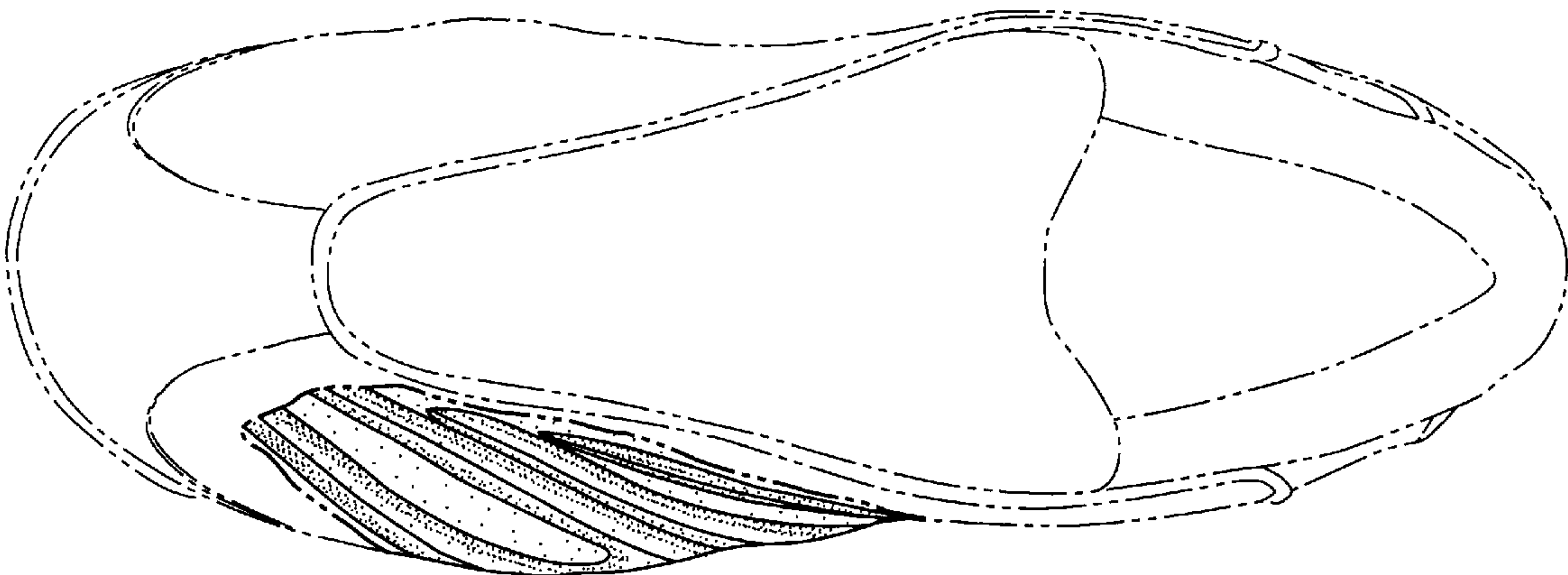
