FIG. 3 is a front elevation view thereof;

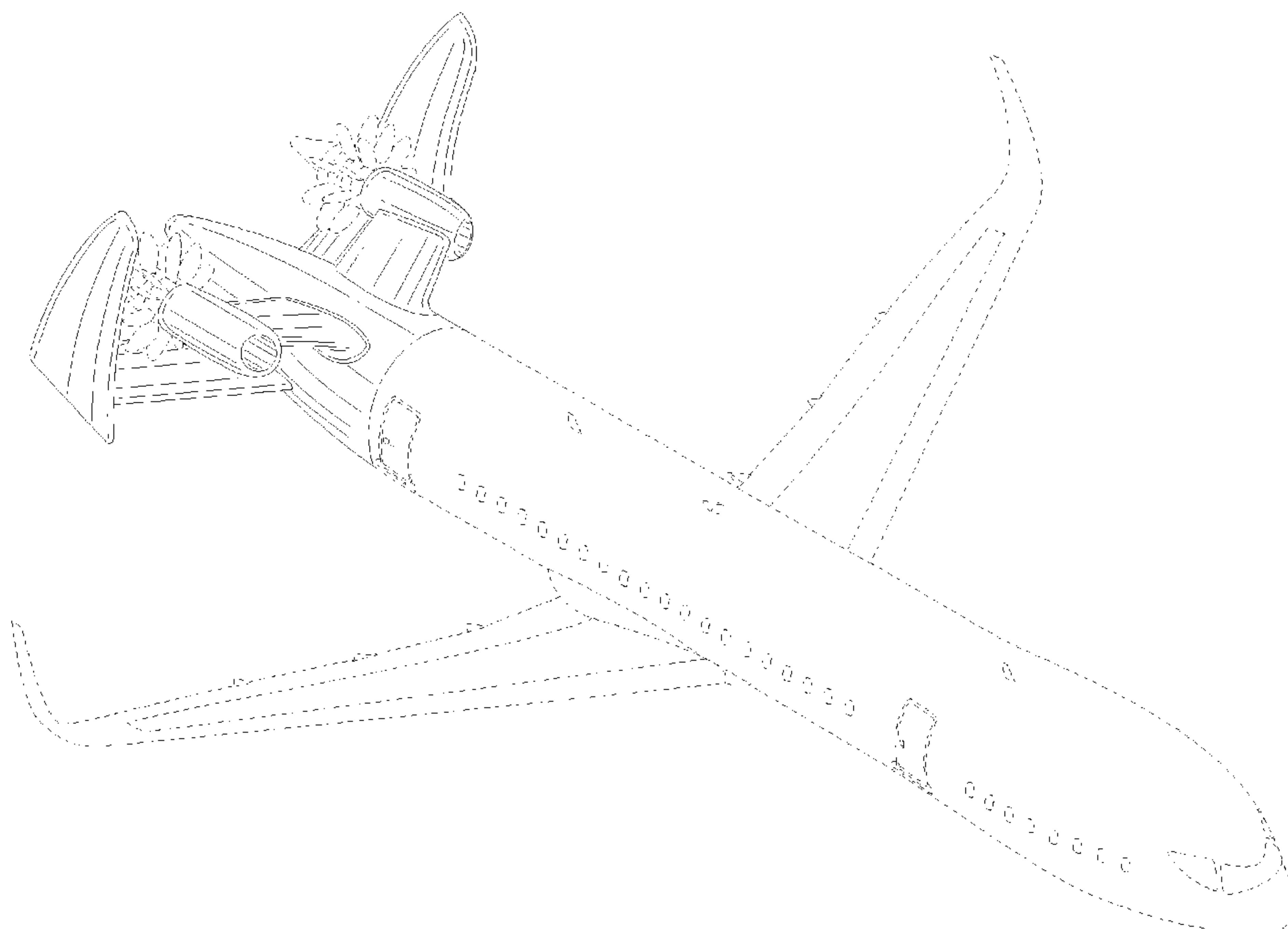
FIG. 4 is a rear elevation view thereof;

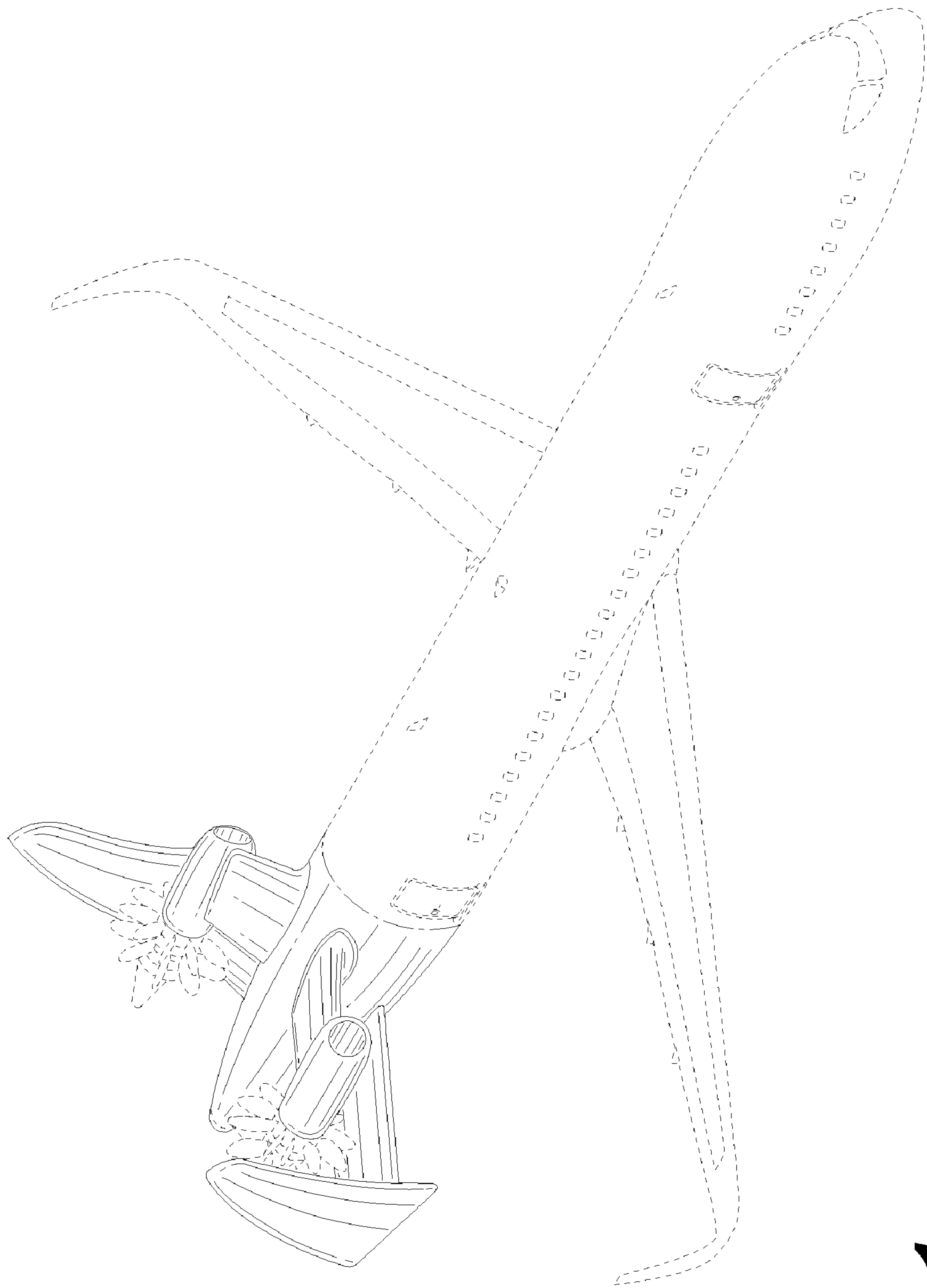

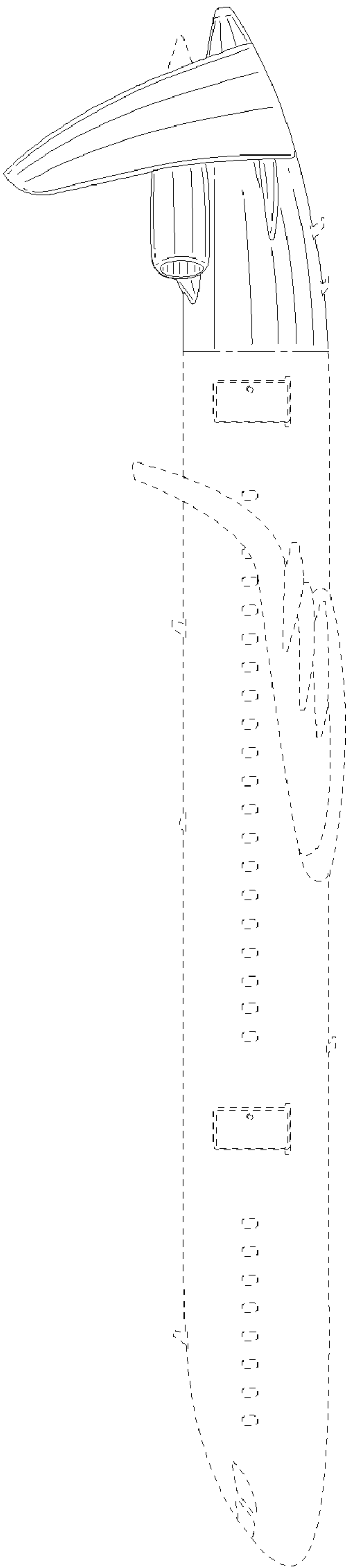

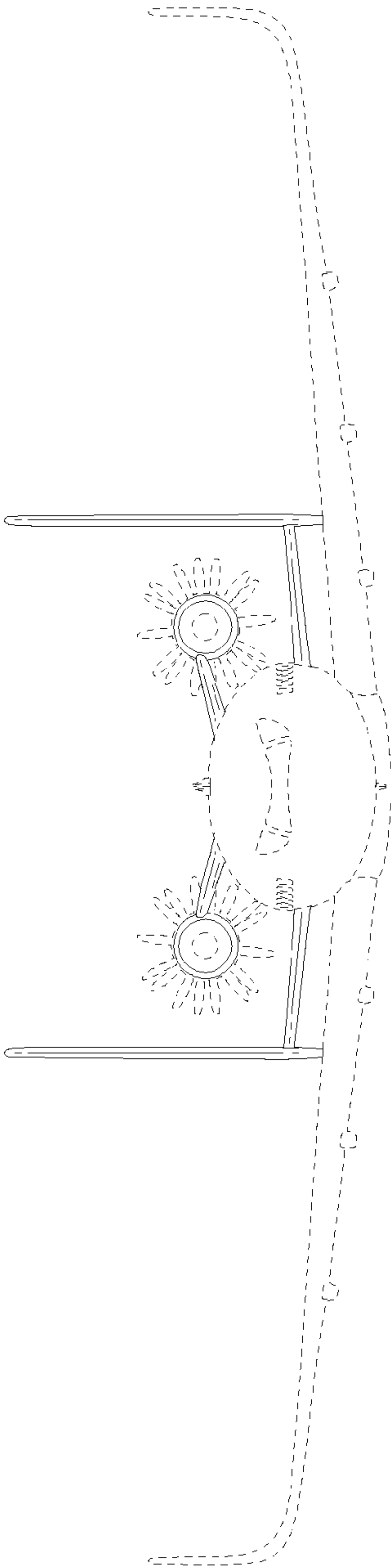

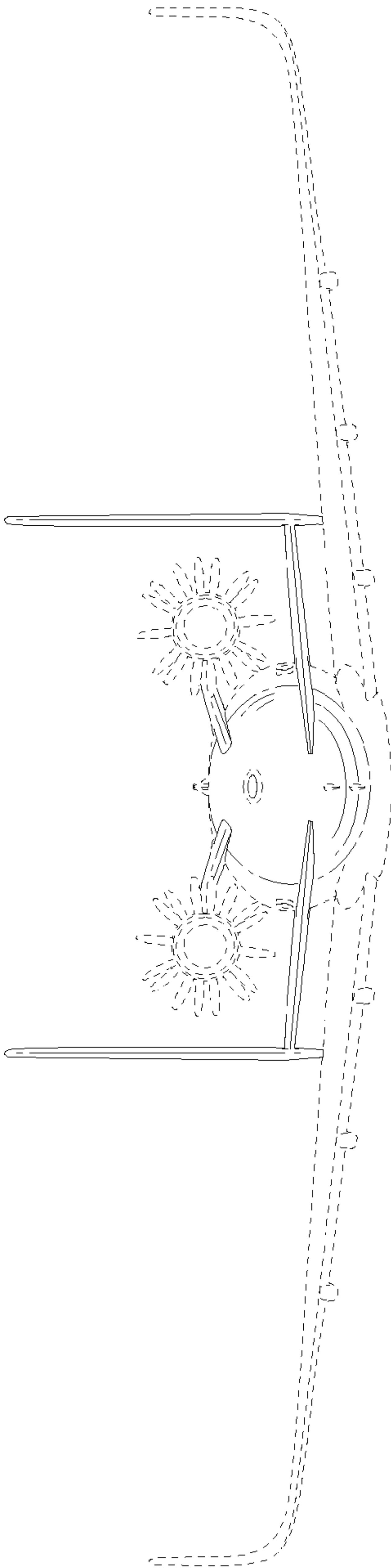
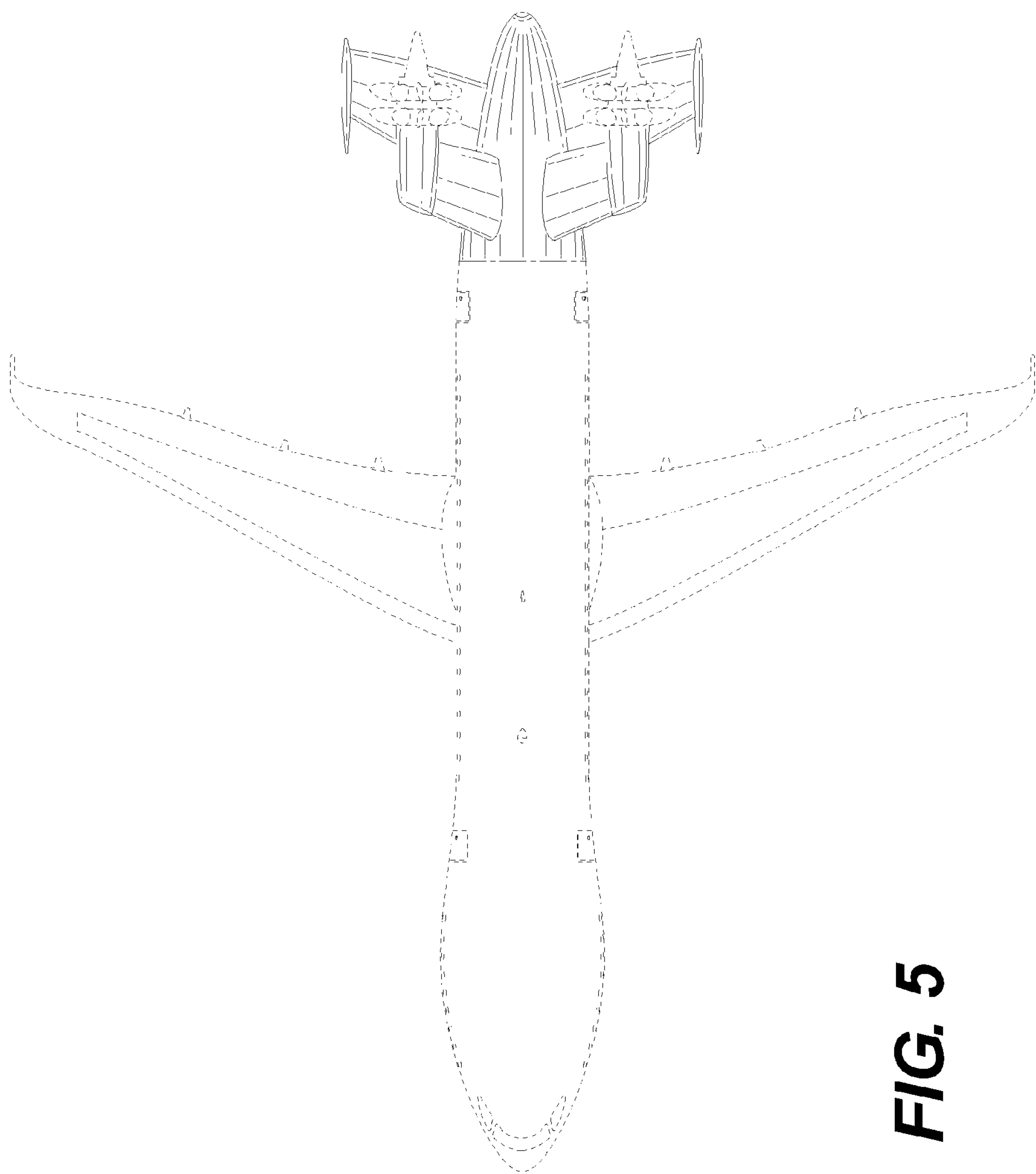

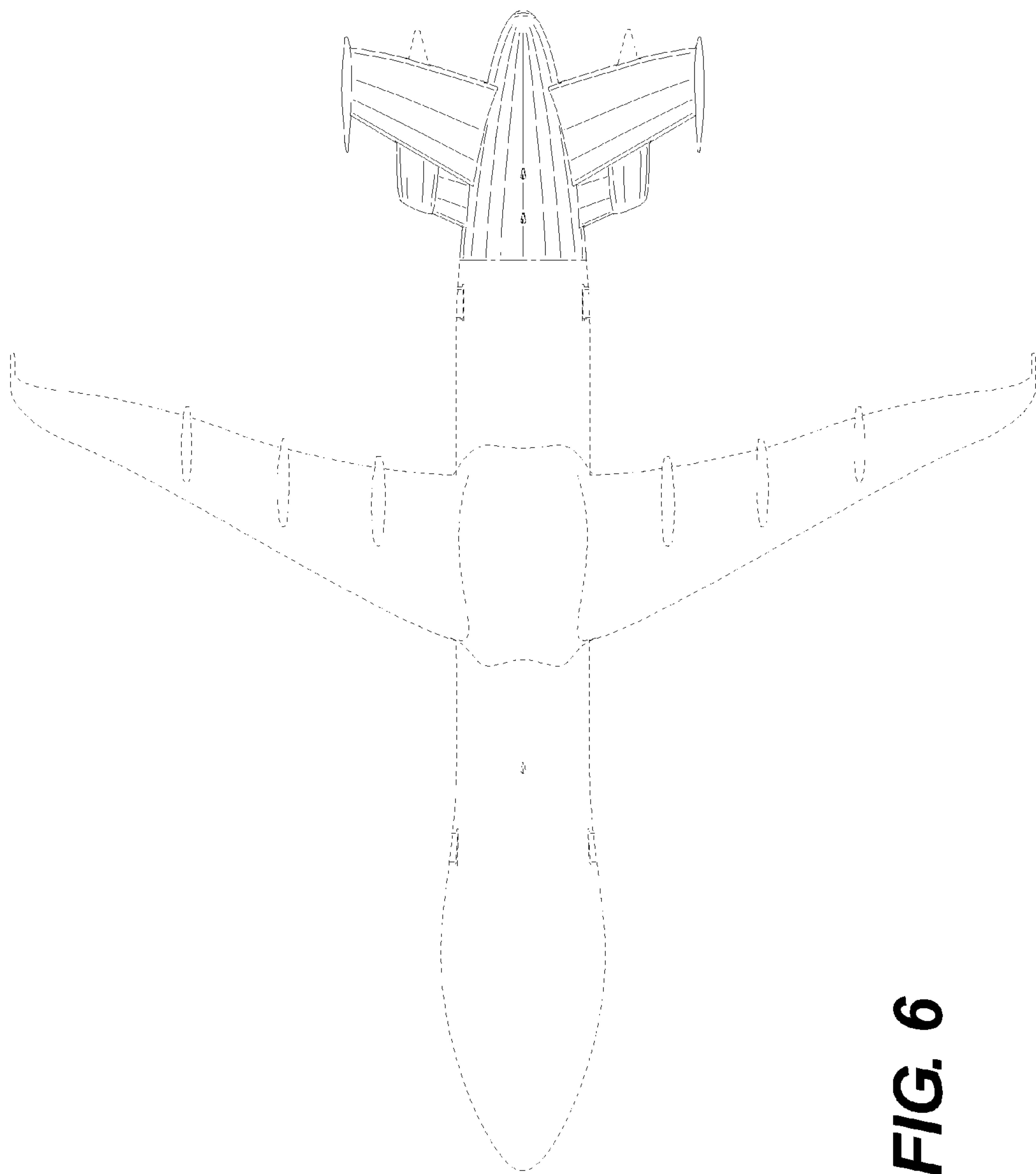
